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SUMMER COMMENCEMENT ALL SET

Two weeks from Friday night (on Aug. 26), our Summer Session comes to a close and we'll award some 300 degrees in Commencement ceremonies in Daniel-Meyer Coliseum. Starting time will be 7:30 p.m. As it did in June, the faculty in full regalia will lead the processional and Marshal George Fowler has again urged everyone to assemble as early as possible after 7 o'clock. Chancellor James Moudy will lead the platform party and preside during the program. Dr. David L. Stitt, a former TCU undergrad and president of the Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary for more than two decades, will give the Commencement address. He's to receive an Honorary Degree as is Rev. Ray Bristol of Dallas, a grad of TCU and Brite Divinity School.

Indications are that for the second straight calendar year we'll award more than 1,000 earned degrees. Last year (1965) it was 1068. This June's graduating class of 754 was an all-time record for Spring. It also appears that we may have the largest group of Ph. D. winners since we started offering the highest degree. Those closest to the situation believe that 11 candidates will make the grade--including our first in Chemistry. We wish them all luck.

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DEAN RESIGNS--ERE HE REPORTS

That explosion you heard on campus Aug. 1 came from the office of Dr. Howard Wible, Dean of Students. That morning, Mr. Stanley R. Hicks of Oklahoma, newly-appointed Dean of Men, was to report for full-time duty. The plan was for him to work with Jewell Wallace, the former DofM, learning the ropes, buildings, etc. and etc. Instead of Mr. Hicks came a letter of "resignation" which said, in part, "I know I'm leaving you in something of a hole".

He put it rather mildly, we think. Having interviewed and discussed the post with a number of other people, Dr. Wible is now left without a key man in his office--with the start of Fall semester only a few weeks away. He's burning up the telephone lines-- and would probably like to singe Mr. Hicks a bit.

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"THANKS" FOR HELP ON INSTITUTE

Dan Jarvis, Director ofthis year's Summer Institute in Science and Mathematics, reports that another fine event came to a successful ending July 22. A three-page evaluation of the program, completed by the participants, indicated that all but a few were most pleased with the work accomplished. Some 100 high school teachers took part.

As something of an indication of just how many University divisions are involved in such an Institute, Dan sent "special thanks" to workers in the offices of the Registrar, Dean of Students, Security, Grad School, University Store, Public Relations, Printing and Mailing, Post Office, Business Office and Jaunita Owens of Student Center. "Without the patience and concern of these folks, the Institute had no chance of functioning," Dan wrote.

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ENROLLMENT FIGURE UP--AGAIN

Registration for the second six weeks of Summer Session (with a few names to be added for late-starting Grad classes) was 1,897, according to Associate Registrar Joe Enochs. That's up 158 over the same period last year. The 1,362 undergrads in Day Schools was an increase of 117. Grad School listed 284 (up 20), Brite had 56 (off 6) and E.C. 195 (up 27).

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SPEAKERS BOOKLET READY

Within the next few weeks, Public Relations will be sending out our annual "Speakers List and Special Programs for 1966-1967". As prepared by Jim Lehman's office, it contains a listing (alphabetically and by subjects) of our faculty and staff members who have indicated they'll be available for speaking engagements. They will go to civic clubs, church groups, educational groups, professional and business organizations of the North Texas area.

Once more, it is being carefully pointed out in the publication that all arrangements for speakers, entertainment groups or other programs from TCU must be made with the people involved. SLIGHT DECREASE IN NEW STUDENTS SEEN

As of Aug. 3, Director of Admissions Anna Byrd Wallace predicted that our freshman class this Fall will show a decrease, the number of transfer students will increase—and that overall the total number of new students will be down slightly from last year. Her latest figgers show that 1,470 new students (1154 freshmen, 316 transfers) have been approved for enrollment, This compares with 1,575 (1273 freshmen and 302 transfers) at the same period last year. All of which is about as expected. Our 20% tuition increase (to \$30 per semester hour) goes into effect and last Fall's record increase of 28.4% in freshmen isn't likely to be duplicated for some time.

ADDITIONS TO STAFF, FACULTY CONTINUE

Appointments to faculty and staff continue as we make ready for Fall semester. Among the latest announcements: Don C. Nix (B.A. from Texas Tech and LL.B. from SMU) as Instructor in Business Law. He spent 1964-65 working in London.

Tomislav H. Landikusic (B.A. from East Carolina College and M.A. from Indiana) has been named chief catalog librarian. Born in Yugoslavia, he attended UofZagreb, worked for the Library of Congress, is a member of the U.S. Army Reserve.

Nicholas M. Rose (B.B.A. and M.B.A. from TCU), joins our Development Division in September as a "development officer". Young "Nick" (he's 35) has been director of corporate relations at SMU since last Winer. He'll work under Dr. O. James Sowell in planning and conducting various campaigns and programs.
