These questions were being asked today by Oscar. E. Monnig, an amateur astronomer from Ft. Worth. He has been trying unsuccessfully to determine the background of a well preserved sony meteorite.

The object is now on display at the Streker Maseum at Baylor thru the courtesty of Mrs. J. E. Hawkins of Waco.

The 11 3/4 pounds meteorite was in the collections of the late Dr. J. E. Hawkins. He taught German atBaylor University until he retired in 1964.

It was recognized by Dr. R. L. Bronaugh of the Geology Department, who brought it to Monnig's attention.

Dr. Hawkins did much searching for Indian artifacts as a hobby which enabled him to get outdoors in field trips. He may have found this personally. Perhaps he got it from a feldow collector or even the original finder.

Unnappily ne left no notes about the object. Mrs. Hawkins kindly furnished mames of a number of family members and friends, but no one seems to have any basic information.
