Thanks for the nice work on the meteorite pieces. There is no telling where these have been or what has been done to them by former owners. The dealer I got them thru will not say anything about his source, but the Glorieta slice was checked with one in the American Museum of Natural History in New York and apparently was taken off right next to theirs, which I think came from the Morgan-Bement collection. This is apparently from one of the first or at least older pieces of the Glorieta.

I have been at or near the location of this find several times. Once, as part of a vacation lark, a young friend of mine and I walked around over one hill and vicinity aimlessly looking and of course found nothing. Later, more seriously, I tried to pin point the real original location but the nearest I came was finding the place and the family from whom Lincoln La Paz secured the last find. I didn't push that any further because you know La Paz!

It was quite thoughtful of you to get the good inscription in Harvey's book, and I wrote and thanked him for it. I'm glad to have it. In a remote sort of way I have somewhat lived thru this era with him!

I'll keep the shattercones. While it is true they are about the same as some smaller samples I have (except for one big one I got that I think is what they called charnockite). I can perhaps use them in a display at the local museum if I ever get around to it. Checks are enclosed.

I am not familiar with the Barwise stone you mention. Can you fill me in on that a little on the enclosed card? I would like some day to see this or a picture of it. I still have established nothing about the "Turkey" stone. It is not mine and I shall probably not be able to get it, as it will likely go to Baylor U.
