PLANNING COMMISSION TO TAKE HARD LOOK AT UNIVERSITY

Meeting for its first session last Wed. and Thurs., TCU's new "Future Planning Commission" wrestled with the role and scope of the University and selected certain areas to receive special study by task force groups. Of the twelve members comprising the Commission, only Dr. Earle Barnes, trustee from Freeport, was unable to attend. Those present were Trustees M. J. Neeley, Dr. Oliver Harrison, Andrew A. (Jack) Bradford--Administration: Vice Chancellors James Newcomer, Cecil White, Earl Waldrop, and Dean of Students Howard Wible--Faculty: Drs. Bill Watson, Jim Corder, Allen Self and Frank Reuter.

Chancellor Moudy serves as chairman of the group, with Board Chairman Lorin Boswell, serving ex-officio. Special resource person meeting with the Commission was Dr. Lester Harrell of the Coordinating Board, Texas College and Univ. System. Francis Pray, of Frantzreb & Pray Assoc. of New York, was unable to attend because of illness. Other resource persons attending were: Dr. E. Leigh Secrest, Dr. O. James Sowell, Calvin Cumbie, Dr. Paul Parham, Dr. Herb LaGrone, Clyde Foltz and Jim Lehman.

This first meeting of the Commission served a four-fold purpose: 1) to review the university's history, philosophy and objectives so the group would have a common ground of understanding for discussion; 2) to hear from Dr. Harrell of the developments in higher education on the state level and the need for coordination and cooperation among both public and private institutions of higher learning; 3) to discuss freely the role and scope of TCU's educational program now and for the future; and 4) to establish certain specific areas which would receive in-depth study by the Planning Commission.

Task forces from the Commission, with additional resource persons to be called upon as necessary, will study these areas initially:

- Financing the University's needs
- Student population--desired size and characteristics
- Programs and Facilities (to include university-community response, curricular and extra-curricular programs, interdisciplinary possibilities)
- Techniques for faculty development and evaluation
- University organizational structure
- Institutional research--setting quantitative goals
- The University and its constituents

A plan for rotation of Commission members was adopted by the group, with no member serving less than two or more than four years. Among the trustees, Drs. Earle Barnes and Oliver Harrison will each serve 2 years; M. J. Neeley, 3 years; A. A. (Jack) Bradford, 4 years. From the faculty, Frank Reuter and Allen Self will serve for 2 years; Bill Watson, 3 years; Jim Corder, 4 years.

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POLICY SET ON SUMMER TEACHING LOAD FOR FACULTY ✓

Speaking at the faculty orientation in September, Chancellor Moudy reported that lighter teaching loads could be expected during the Summer Sessions. The following plan has been approved:

"Each regular full-time faculty member is assigned during each semester (18 weeks) a teaching load of 12 semester hours or its equivalent.

"Each such faculty member, if he so elects, will, in addition, be employed during one six-weeks term of the summer session, and the normal full load during each such term is 6 semester hours or its equivalent. Beginning with the summer session 1967, which is a part of the 1966-67 fiscal year, the University will guarantee a summer teaching load of 75% of full-time during one six-weeks term, or an average of 4½ semester hours per summer. In order to achieve this average, each faculty member will carry 3-hour and 6-hour loads in alternate summers, and salary payments will be smoothed so as to reflect an average load of 4½ semester hours".

SOUTH AFRICAN "FREEDOM FIGHTER" TO SPEAK

Sponsored by the Forums Committee of the Student Activities Council, Franz T.J. Lee, of South Africa, will speak tomorrow afternoon at 3 p.m. in the Student Center ballroom. Lee, whose topic will be "Oppression in South Africa", attended Anglican and Roman Catholic mission schools in his home land, pursued philosophy and political science at the Univ. of Tuebingen in West Germany, and is currently studying at the Univ. of Frankfurt. The meeting is open to the public at no charge.

Ralph Yarborough on "A Senator Looks at Vietnam" (Nov.17), Congressman Joe Pool on "The House Committee on Un-American Activities" (Dec. 1), Zbigniew K. Brzezinski of Columbia U.'s Russian Institute on "Current Soviet Foreign Policy" (Feb. 21--tentative), and Dr. John Stoessinger of the Dept. of Political Science, City College of New York on "polycentrism" (Feb.24--tentative).

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FILMS ON "PLANET EARTH" WILL BE SHOWN

The TCU Research Foundation and the Geology Dept. are co-sponsoring the showing of several films called the "Planet Earth Series" which were made during the International Geophysical Year. The first two films, "The Inconstant Air" and "Cosmic Rays", will be shown this afternoon (Nov. 9) at 4:30 p.m. in Dan Rogers Auditorium. Other films in the series are "The Shape of the Earth" and "The Nearest Star"--Nov. 30; "Secrets of the Ice" and "Challenge of the Oceans"--Dec. 12; "The Hidden Earth" and "Magnetic Force"--Jan. 11. (Having recently viewed H. G. Wells' "First Men on the Moon", this series sounds very down-to-earth.)

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NORDANS ADD \$50,000 TO FINE ARTS SCHOLARSHIPS ✓

Dr. and Mrs. L. A. Nordan of San Antonio, recently provided \$50,000 to TCU which will be added to a fund already established by the couple to give aid to students of outstanding ability and promise in music, art, drama, ballet and related areas in the fine arts. Eleven awards, known as the Nordan Fine Arts Scholarships, were presented for the 1966-67 academic year. TCU conferred the honorary LL.D. degree on Dr. Nordan in 1963, citing him for leadership and devotion to religion, cultural, civic and educational betterment.

BRONZE BUST OF M. E. SADLER TO BE UNVEILED FRIDAY

A bronze bust of the late, beloved M. E. Sadler will be unveiled and presented to TCU this Friday at the annual Century Club Luncheon. Created by Sculptress Electra Waggoner Biggs of Vernon, the memorial bronze is slightly larger than life-size and will be mounted on a 10-inch brass block atop a three-and-a-half foot pedestal which will be placed in the foyer of Sadler Hall. It will bear a plaque with the inscription: " Dr. M. E. Sadler, Chief Administrative Officer, TCU, 1941-1965; Executive Chairman, Board of Trustees, 1965-1966. Presented by alumni, trustees and friends, Nov. 11, 1966. Electra Waggoner Biggs, Sculptress". The presentation will be made by Board Chairman Lorin Boswell and Bob Ward, former president of the TCU Alumni Association. Chancellor Moudy will receive the bust in behalf of the University. Mrs. Biggs is a well-known artist whose works include the statue of Will Rogers on Amon Carter Square, Harry Truman, Dwight Eisenhower, Knute Rockne, Amon Carter, Sid Richardson and others.
