FRED TAYLOR BRINGS HOME A COUPLE OF FROGS

New head football coach Fred Taylor knows a good horned frog when he sees one and he's had his eye on two. He caught a former frog star, Marvin Lasater, down at Mesquite where he was serving as asst. coach and returned him to campus as new freshman coach. Marvin, who was a star offensive and defensive player for three straight years beginning in 1957, was a co-captain of the 1959 club and a unanimous all-SWC selection in 1958. In addition to coaching the Wogs, Marvin will assist with the varsity and recruit in East Texas. He's married to the former Gail Bowdon of Weatherford. They have two children.

Fred didn't have as far to go to get his other frog. In fact, Harvey Reeves has been the offensive line coach at Paschal since graduating from TCU in 1965. Harvey, a former guard and linebacker on the 1962-64 teams, will work primarily with the defense, especially the linebackers; do some scouting and will recruit in Central Texas. Reeves is married to the former Darla Jo Patton of Port Arthur. They have a two-year old daughter.

As Fred says, "Both will be a credit to our program. This completes the staff. Now to hit the recruiting trail."

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DISTINGUISHED PSYCHOLOGIST TO SPEAK

Dr. William Hunt, a specialist in clinical psychology noted for his studies concerning the measurement of human abilities, will speak tonight at 7:30 p.m. in the Faculty Center. The program, which is open to the public, is sponsored by the Psychology Dept. and the Institute of Behavioral Research. Dr. Hunt, head of Northwestern U.'s psychol-Ogy dept. since 1951, will speak on "The Experimental Investigation of Clinical Judgment".

NEW BOOK HOT OFF THE TCU PRESS

"Fine Texas Horses", Their Pedigrees and Performance 1830-1845" is the most recent volume to be published through the TCU Press and the first in a new series of monographs in history and culture. Dr. Malcolm McLean, professor of Spanish and assoc. dean of AddRan is author of the new 178-page volume which carefully documents the colorful history of the thoroughbred horse in Texas. The first copy of the book was presented by Dr. McLean to A. M. Pate, Jr. at today's Faculty Luncheon. Pate, who is president of the Tarrant County Historical Society, made possible this volume inaugurating the monograph series. Designed by Jim Lehman, the book will go on sale Dec. 19 for \$2.50 per copy.

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BILL MURRAY NAMED DEAN OF MEN

Col. J. W. (Bill) Murray (Ret.) is anything but "retired". Serving as assistant dean of men since Sept. 1962, Bill has been promoted to Dean of Men, effective Dec. 1. As you know, the position has been unfilled since Jewell Wallace resigned to full-time phys ed teaching this year. Bill served as TCU's fraternity advisor from 1962-66 and has also been advisor to our foreign students since 1964. Congratulations, Bill.

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TCU HAS SEVERAL FULBRIGHT APPLICANTS

Last week's <u>Faculty Bulletin</u> may have given the wrong impression when it reported that no students had applied for Fulbright honors. Though none were eligible to apply for the State of Texas Fulbright competition, three graduate students in history and six in Fine Arts did make direct application. The names of graduate and Fine Arts applicants are not sent to state competition. Honors Director Paul Wassenich also reports that 16 students have been nominated for Woodrow Wilson National Fellowships and five students for Danforth Fellowships.

"BATTLE OF CHANCELLORSVILLE "WILL BE WAGED DEC. 8

The Student Center Ballroom will be the scene of an illustrated lecture on "The Battle of Chancellorsville" at 11 a.m. tomorrow. Gen. Hamilton H. Howze, U. S. Army retired, will make the presentation which is being sponsored by TCU's military science and history departments, and the Forums Committee of the Activities Council. Howze will use two slide projectors, one to depict the military situation on a conventional map in color with signs and symbols, while the other will show actual color photographs of the landscape being discussed. The speaker is vice president for product planning for Bell Helicopter Co. In addition to the lecture, two Army helicopters like those being used in South Vietnam will be on display in front of the Student Center from 9-12 a.m.

TCU TO ASSIST IN PHYSICAL FITNESS PROJECT

A \$121,000 program will begin Feb. 1, 1967, within the Hurst-Euless-Bedford Independent School District to plan an ideal physical fitnessrecreational program for an entire community. The project will be partially supported by an \$82,500 grant under Title III from the U.S. Office of Health, Education and Welfare, the government's first grant for such a program. TCU's assistance will be through George Harris, director of our intramural program and asst. prof. of physical education, who will serve as professional advisor to the project.

Harris feels that "such a school-centered, total-community operation can serve as a unique training facility for our student teachers as the program progresses. The H-E-B district is a leader in the area of physical fitness and the system is known throughout the Southwest for its gymnastic program.

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SEARS FOUNDATION MAKES GIFT TO TCU

The Sears-Roebuck Foundation has presented an unrestricted grant of \$6,500 to TCU. Participating in the brief ceremony were Dr. Moudy, Dr. Leigh Secrest and Edward E. Harroz, the Foundation's Fort Worth representative. Moudy said the gift would be used for support of TCU's graduate research programs. Sears will give nearly \$50,000 to 34 privately-supported colleges and universities in Texas during 1966 and more than \$800,000 in scholarships and other educational programs during the current year throughout the U.S.

HOW DO YOU TEACH "ENGLISH" AS A FOREIGN LANGUAGE?

To find out, you're invited to attend six sessions which are being held at 4 p.m. daily, Dec. 5-10, in Room 201 Bailey Building. Edwin T. Cornelius, Jr., a 1944 TCU graduate and former language specialist for the U.S. 'government's overseas establishments, will conduct the series which is presented by the English Language Services Teacher Education Program. Cornelius will demonstrate some of the techniques and materials used in teaching English as a foreign language which will include five major workbooks, 164 8mm films, 117 pre-recorded tapes, 900 language cards, plus texts, readers, reference books and tests. The program is sponsored by the School of Education, the North Central Texas Center for Educational Services and the North Texas Office of the Southwest Educational Development Laboratory. The groups are headed by Drs. Herb LaGrone, Les Evans and Keith Turkett, respectively. The daily sessions are open to faculty, students and the public.
