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### THERE'LL BE MUSIC, EXHIBITS AND DISPLAYS!

Only one annual spring event on campus commands such widespread attention and offers as much flair and flavor ... and it's scheduled for April 8-9. The seventh annual International Festival will be held in Daniel-Meyer Coliseum this weekend under the co-sponsorship of the TCU Activities Council and the International Friendship Club. The displays, exhibits, entertainment and refreshments will be characteristic of the 22 countries represented in the University's current student body.

A flag-raising ceremony, set for Thursday (tomorrow) at ll a.m. in front of Sadler Hall, will proclaim officially the coming event. Ihsan Bitar, senior from Amman, Jordan, and president of the International Friendship Club, will speak briefly, and American students Will assist their foreign-born counterparts in the rites.

The April 8 session, planned for 2 to 5 p.m., will be primarily for children and groups. Hours for April 9 will be 2 to 5:30 p.m. Activities on both days will be free and open to the public. Foreign students from SMU and North Texas State will join the TCU students in presenting music and dance which will express their cultures and traditions. None of the entertainers are professionals and they will Perform at 2:30 and 4 p.m. each day.

A special feature, which has attracted so much attention from young and old alike the last two years, will be the souvenir signature Cards. As in years past, displays will include art objects, hand-Crafts, books, magazines, charts and pictures to help visitors gain insights into the countries being featured. The displays will be set up and arranged by these students, who will dress in native costumes.

Committees, headed by general chairman Adrienne Kilpatrick of Downey, Calif., have been busy making preparations for this annual event, Which spreads the door of TCU hospitality open to friends in this area of the state.

# BOB CARRELL NAMED ACTING CHAIRMAN OF JOURNALISM

Effective Sept. 1, assistant professor Bob Carrell will become acting chairman of the journalism department. He'll succeed Dr. Wayne Rowland, chairman since 1959, who is leaving TCU to join the faculty of the Syracuse University School of Journalism in Sept. as chairman of the newspaper department.

It will be difficult to see Wayne and his family leave the campus. They've contributed greatly to the life of the University. The Rowlands and their five children (two are TCU students) were in the Philippines last year at Silliman University. While they were gone, Bob directed the activities of the busy department. Bob has his B.S. and M.S. from East Texas State U. and will soon complete requirements for the Ph. D. in mass communications at the U. of Illinois.

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# SCHLUMBERGER AWARDS RENEWED

Chancellor J. M. Moudy has been notified of the 13th renewal of the \$1,000 grant authorized by managers of the Schlumberger Foundation of Houston. Originally awarded to TCU for the 1954-55 academic session, the grant was set up by the Schlumberger Well Surveying Corporation and its president, Pierre Schlumberger, to provide financial assistance to <sup>c</sup>ollege students of special promise in engineering and scientific fields. The Foundation's scholarships, known as the "Schlumberger Collegiate Awards, " provide \$500 annually to a student and a \$500 matching grant to the University.

Notification of the renewal came from the Foundation's executive secretary, Clifton Iverson. Recipient of the award for 1967-68 will be announced within a few weeks, Logan Ware advises. Current holder is Gary Wayne Smith of Corpus Christi, who hopes to receive his degree in August. He is majoring in physics and minoring in mathematics.

Offered through Special Course Division, the medically-approved class will meet from 7:30 to 9:40 p.m. in Room 105 of Rogers Hall. "What Do We Mean 'Heart Disease'?" will be the topic of Dr. Virginia Vollmer, of TWU and U of T Southwestern Medical School. Currently engaged in cardiovascular physiology research at Southwestern, she will conduct the initial session. On Apr. 17, Mrs. Doris Ohan, assistant professor of nursing at TWU will discuss "Living with Heart Disease; the Patient and His Problems." On the same date, Dr. August Johnson of TCU's psychology department will give attention to "Problems of the Family, the Employer and the Community." Two Fort Worth physicians, Dr. Robert E. Carr and Dr. Ed Etier, will conduct the final meeting on April 24.
