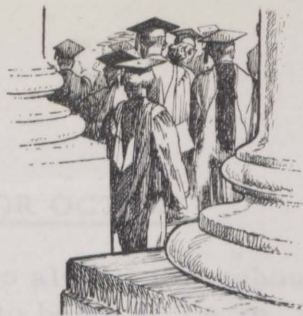

TCU EXPRESS ON THE TRACK FOR OCT. 21

The "all 'board" cry has gone out to alumni throughout the state to attend the 13th annual Alumni Conference, slated to begin at 9 a. m. Saturday (Oct. 21) with registration and coffee in the Faculty Center. The event, coordinated by Betty Jean Stocker of alumni, is planned for interested former students and graduates as an opportunity for them to meet administrative officials and faculty members in a discussion of the University's programs. Robert Buschman of San Antonio, Class of '46, is chairman for the 1967 meet.

Dr. J.M. Moudy will discuss "The Role of the Alumnus in Student Recruitment," and a question-answer period will follow Dr. W. Earl Waldrop's "Report to Shareholders of TCU -- Past, Present and Future." Giving a report on the recently begun class agent program will be its directors Dr. Earle B. Barnes of Midland, Mich., corporate director for Dow Chemical Co. Coach Fred Taylor will be guest speaker at the complimentary luncheon which concludes the orientation conference.

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SELECT SERIES OPENER TO BE FRIDAY

The first presentation of the 1967-68 Select Series, scheduled for Friday (Oct. 21), will be Rey de la Torre, Cuban-born classical guitarist. A prodigy at the age of 10, he began his formal training four years later with the famed teacher, Miguel Llobet, in Spain. The resounding success of his debut in Barcelona when he was 16 launched his concert career. A guest of many major television network programs, he supplied the entire musical background for the TV broadcast of Garcia Lorca's "The House of Bernarda Alba." Tickets for the program, to begin at 8 p. m. in Ed Landreth Auditorium, are on sale at \$2.50 each at the Student Activities office. Season tickets for the entire season's program of seven events are available at \$5 each for faculty and members of their families.

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ROTC SCHOLARSHIP DEADLINE SET

Applications for two-year and four-year Army ROTC scholarships for 1968-69 will be due between Dec. 1 and Jan. 15, according to an announcement by Lt. Col. Donald G. Thompson, TCU professor of military science. TCU is one of 34 schools in the Fourth Army's five-state area which participate in the program that will provide 800 new four-year awards and 845 two-year scholarships. Early announcement of deadlines is due to the requirement that high school seniors applying for the longer term awards take the College Entrance Examination Board test this fall. Five TCU freshmen, two juniors and two seniors are currently holding AROTC grants for their collegiate education.

Additional information is available from Lt. Col. Thompson if you have sons or friends who might wish to apply.

ACCOUNTING SEMINAR TO DRAW VISITORS

The accounting department of the M. J. Neeley School of Business will host an Oct. 21 seminar for representatives of 25 colleges and universities in the North East Texas area. To deal with the educational implications of research published in The Common Body of Knowledge of Certified Public Accountants, the event will be held in cooperation with the education division of the American Institute of CPA's. About 100 accounting teachers and practitioners are expected to attend the 9 a.m. -3:30 p.m. session. TCU coordinators are Dr. J.H. Key and John Stevenson. Harry Ward, president of the Texas Society of CPA's, will review research development to date and set the stage for discussion groups. Moderators will be Dr. William Giese, North Texas State University accounting chairman, and Dr. Roland Porth, who occupies a similar position at Southern Methodist University. Among the participants will be Dr. Allan Savage of the University of Texas at Arlington and Dr. Roderick Holmes of Baylor. Rogers Hall will be the scene of the seminar, and the noon luncheon is planned for Brown-Lupton Student Center.

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TICKETS ON SALE FOR AL HIRT SHOW

The famous Al Hirt, known as "America's greatest trumpet showman," will take the spotlight during TCU's Homecoming Show, Fri., Nov. 10. Tickets for the show, which will begin at 8 p.m. in Daniel-Meyer Coliseum, are on sale for \$2.50, \$3 and \$3.50. They're available at the Student Center information desk and from the Central Ticket Office and Amusement Ticket Service. Appearing with Hirt will be his jazz sextette, which includes the diminutive clarinetist, Pee Wee Spitelera. Make your reservations now for this great show.

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FACULTY COMMITTEE REPORTS ON SENATE PROPOSAL

Dr. Paul Wassenich, who is serving as chairman of the faculty committee on the senate proposal, reports that the committee has met numerous times, has studied constitutions of established senates at other universities, has written a basic document and has conferred with Chancellor Moudy and Vice Chancellor Newcomer. The document is now in process of being revised and probably will be presented at a general faculty assembly in November.

Prior to its being presented at the November meeting, the document will be mailed to all members of the faculty and administration for study.

TCU UNITED FUND EFFORT REACHES \$19, 966

Since last week's United Fund report, an additional \$419 has been turned in by TCU faculty and staff. This brings our total giving to \$19, 966.44 -- just a few dollars shy of \$20, 000 -- and 103% of our \$19, 233 goal for 1967. Out of 633 cards distributed to TCU employees, 610 persons (96.3%) gave. Our average per capita gift was \$32.73.

Again, we extend our most sincere thanks to everyone for sharing in this most important campaign.

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NARCOTICS SURVEY PLANNED

Officers of the National Institute of Mental Health and a number of special consultants met on campus Monday and Tuesday of this week to make plans for a nationwide survey of treatment of narcotic addiction. The meeting was the first major step in a two-year research program conducted by Dr. S.B. Sells, director of TCU's Institute of Behavioral Research. The NIMH is sponsoring the research.

Consultants attending the meeting were: Dr. Isadore Chein, professor of psychology at New York Univ.; Dr. Daniel Glaser, sociologist at U. of Illinois who was chosen to head narcotics work for New York State's Dept. of Mental Health; Dr. Richard Brotman, psychiatrist who directs research in addiction at New York Medical College; Dr. Gilbert Geis, sociologist at California State College at LA who pioneered development of the "half-way house;" Dr. Jerome Jaffe, U. of Chicago psychiatrist.

According to Dr. Sells, the survey is planned to help locate and describe every program and kinds of facilities used for treatment of drug addiction in the United States, to look at the methods used, the concepts followed, and get a picture of all that is being done in this field. The new survey--the first of its kind--will try to find out when the addict is considered rehabilitated by those who treat him and what kind of follow-up on him they conduct.

Working with Dr. Sells is Dr. James F. Maddux, director of the NIMH Clinical Research Center in Fort Worth. Also taking part is this week's meeting were Dr. Roger E. Meyer and Patrick Hughes of the NIMH Center for Studies of Narcotic and Drug Abuse and Dr. Robert Peterson, coordinator of research for NIMH. All are of Washington, D. C.

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SKIFF URGES FACULTY HELP IN OBTAINING NEWS

Occasionally there is some hesitancy on the part of the faculty members to give news to a Skiff reporter when the same news has already been given to the University News Bureau. Though the News Bureau sends copies of releases to the Skiff, the student reporters still have a responsibility to their editor and to the paper's faculty adviser to check-out facts about a story, to look for another "news angle," and to interview faculty.

Student reporters are assigned "beats" as part of their journalism lab work. The reason for this is to enable the Skiff to cover all areas of campus life, including academic and administrative areas, so that everyone will have a chance to be heard. Next time a Skiff reporter calls on you, try to give him (or her) your cooperation, even though it may mean repeating information you've already passed on to the News Bureau. Remember, the students are learning how to become good newspaper men and women. They can do a better job with your help. If there is some question about whether or not a story should be released, the following rule of thumb may be followed: All public announcements of an official or policy-making nature MUST be released through and by the University's Division of Public Relations. If any doubt exists, please check with that office.

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FELLOWSHIPS ANNOUNCED FOR CROSS-DISCIPLINARY STUDY

The Society for Religion in Higher Education is offering a number of post-doctoral fellowships to encourage the growing interest in the relation of scholarship in religion to scholarship in other fields of study. Grants are available to scholars in the humanities, social and natural sciences for a year of study in religion and for scholars in religion for a year of study in another discipline. Applicants must have a Ph.D. degree or its equivalent plus at least three years of teaching experience.

The Society is also offering fellowships on a competitive basis for 1967-68 to faculty members who are responsible for teaching Asian religion to undergraduates and whose teaching could be substantially improved by a year of study and travel. Applicants must submit a plan of study and be prepared for a full academic year of study with at least four months in Asia.

Completed applications for both fellowship programs must be received by the Society by Dec. 1, 1967. Requests for applications will be honored until Nov. 17 and awards will be announced before Jan. 31. If you are interested, additional information may be obtained from Mr. David R. Major General C.A. Dahlen, deputy commanding general from Headquarters, Fourth U.S. Army, made his first visit to the TCU campus yesterday (Oct. 17) afternoon to look over our Army ROTC detachment. General Dahlen was accompanied by Col. N.M. Locke, assistant deputy chief of staff, Reserve Forces, Fourth Army, and 1st Lt. S.N. Montgomery, aide to the General. Lt. Col. Donald G. Thompson, professor of military science who heads our Army ROTC unit, was host to the group. Their campus visit included a meeting with Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs James Newcomer and a "coffee break" with members of TCU's Military Affairs Committee.

George Fowler gave a paper on "The Meaning of the word 'Torah' in the Prophetic Literature of the Old Testament" at the Oct. colloquium.

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THEOLOGICAL ASSOCIATION TEAM TO VISIT BRITE

Dr. Raymond Morris of Yale Divinity School and Dr. Parry Le Fevre, dean of Chicago Theological School, will be among those visiting Brite Divinity School, Oct. 23-24. The team, representing the American Assn. of Theological Schools with which Brite holds accreditation, will be on campus to evaluate the School's new curriculum plan which resulted from last year's self-study. The seminary has been continually upgrading its program and recently replaced the former Bachelor of Divinity degree with the Master of Divinity degree. Additional degree programs are being proposed. Elmer Henson is dean of Brite which was founded at TCU in 1914. It is one of the finest Disciple theological seminaries in the country.
