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SYMPHONY TO GIVE CONCERT DEC. 17

In its second appearance of the current academic year, the TCU Symphony Orchestra will be presented in concert on December 17 in Ed Landreth Auditorium under the baton of Conductor Fritz Berens. Kenneth Schanewerk, assistant professor of violin and theory, will be featured as violin Soloist at the event, set to begin at 3 p.m.

The Symphony will perform Beethoven's "Three German Dances," orchestrated by Berens. The conductor has been a member of the TCU faculty since 1966 and is widely recognized in this country and abroad as a musical director, conductor and composer. The soloist will be featured in Sibelius' "Violin Concerto in D. Minor, Op. 47." Also on the concert program will be Schubert's "Symphony No. 7 in C. Major."

the Chancellor's office. Participating were John S. Morrison of Atlanta, Ga., distribution manager for American Oil and District Manager Kermit Fry Of Dallas.

L. W. Moore of Chicago, the foundation's president, described the grant as having no restrictions "as long as it is used currently to improve education and not for endowment purposes." The gift is one of more than 116 unrestricted awards being made in 1967 directly to outstanding private universities and colleges by three foundations--Standard Oil, Pan American Petroleum and American Oil. The three organizations contributed more than \$1.9 million in support of education in 1967 and over \$12 million since 1952.

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TCU GIVES TAPES TO HEMISFAIR EXHIBIT

Students from TCU's departments of speech, theatre and radio-TV have made several tape recordings which will be used in a unique manner during the HemisFair which opens in San Antonio, April 6, 1968. The recordings are being built into walls and panels to take the place of the usual labels and explanatory reading material at the space exhibit in the fair's Convention Center. The tapes, which represent about 60 hours of rehearsal and recording time by the TCU students, were made under a special arrangement with Speech Chairman George Tade. The effort represented the first Contribution by a major university to the theme exhibit.

HEMISFAIR EXHIBIT, Contd.

The theme exhibit is a joint effort of HemisFair, the Smithsonian Institution, NASA, the Department of Defense, the Federal Aviation Agency, the Environmental Sciences Services Administration and Comsat, Inc. At the space exhibit visitors will take a simulated trip to outer space. The visitor will enter a capsule, where dramatic lighting and photography will transport him into orbit around the earth, using actual film shot by astronauts.

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PANEL WILL DISCUSS JUVENILE DETENTION

Problems and procedures involved in Tarrant County's detention of juvenile delinquents will be the topic discussed by a panel presented by the Forums Committee at 8 tonight (Dec. 13) in the ballroom of the Student Center. Open to the public, the presentation will follow the locally produced film documentary, "A Home for Lonnie." Moderator will be Charles Eastham, TCU junior from Borger.

Panelists will include County Judge Scott Moore; Lynn Ross, county juvenile probation officer; Larry Meeker, chairman of Tarrant County's committee for detention study; and Mrs. Edward Kimble, a member of that committee.

The plight of juvenile delinquents in the county has become a matter of intense concern to many persons within the last few months, Eastham said, and this program will provide an opportunity for students, faculty and community members to learn of present policies and suggestions for improvements.

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ALLSTATE FOUNDATION PRESENTS AWARDS

Under a program begun in 1960 by Allstate Insurance Co., two Harris College of Nursing students received scholarships for 1967-68 in presentation ceremonies Friday in the office of Dean Virginia Jarratt. Jack Wisener of Dallas, public affairs manager for Allstate, made the presentations to Janice Baughman and Judith Fisher of Everman.

A junior from Fort Worth, Miss Baughman was awarded her third scholarship by the Foundation. It was a first-time honor for Miss Fisher, a freshman.

Funds for a third award were presented to Harris College, whose administrators will select another coed. Selection is made on the basis of academic ability and future promise. The scholarships are renewable for up to four years. Of 12 awards given this year by the Dallas district office, 8 went to Texas institutions.

SPEAKERS ANNOUNCED FOR MINISTER'S WEEK

TCU Minister's Week, set for Jan. 8-11, 1968, will feature four distinguished Christian spokesmen: Dr. Waldo Beach, professor of Christian Ethics and director of graduate studies in religion at Duke University Divinity School; Dr. Dwight E. Stevenson, professor of homiletics, Lexington Theological Seminary; and Dr. Browne Barr, minister, First Congregational Church, Berkeley, Calif. The fourth speaker is a leading ecumenical statesman, Dr. George G. Beazley, Jr., president, Council on Christian Unity of the Christian Churches (Disciples of Christ).

The annual Minister's Week program is planned for ministers and their wives of Christian churches in Texas, Louisiana and New Mexico. The event will be held in the facilities of University Christian Church. Bill Tucker, assistant dean of Brite Divinity School, is Minister's Week chairman.

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TOURS PLANNED FOR SUMMER STUDY ABROAD

Resident study at the University of Nantes, France, and at the University of Madrid, Spain, will be available to qualified students during the summer of 1968 through programs sponsored by TCU. The summer study tour at the University of Madrid is offered by the foreign language department in cooperation with The Institute of European Studies, July 1-26, and includes a four-week resident study program in Madrid preceded by a traveling study trip to Paris and the surrounding area, Southern Spain and Granada. Students will live in the homes of Spanish families while in Madrid. The program is under the direction of Dr. John Hammond, chairman of the foreign language department. Following the study program, an optional field study trip has been scheduled for July 27-Aug. 22 to other parts of Spain, Switzerland, Italy, Austria, Germany, Belgium and England.

Dr. Bita May Hall will direct the summer program at the University of Nantes, France, which is a cooperative effort with the European Extension Division of the Institute of European Studies. The six-week field study trip is scheduled for June 18-July 26 with an optional study tour from July 27-Aug. 26 to Eastern France, Switzerland, Italy, Austria, Germany, Belgium and England. During the month-long study at the University of Nantes, students will live in the homes of French families. An alternate Field Study Trip II, offered on an optional program, will include touring six other European countries with lectures by authorities in culture and history in each area.

Both foreign study programs are open to students from other schools provided they meet TCU's admission requirements. High school students ^{may} apply if they will have graduated by June, 1968. Additional information on the programs may be obtained from Dr. Hammond or Dr. Hall in the foreign language dept.

SORORITY OFFERS GRANTS IN HUMANITIES AND ARTS \checkmark

Alpha Delta Kappa, an international honorary sorority for women in education, is searching for the first of three women to whom it will give grants of \$8,000 to finance research in the United States in the arts and humanities. The first grant will be awarded in 1969, the second in 1971 and the third in 1973, at biennial conventions of the sorority which is headquartered in Kansas City, Mo.

Any women with work completed for a master's degree are eligible to enter a project in the cultural or educational fields. The projects for which the grants will be awarded will be selected for their continuing benefit to mankind. Preliminary screening of applicants will be made next summer with the top five selected for personal interviewing early in 1969. A winner and alternate will be announced at the sorority's convention in Kansas City later that year.
