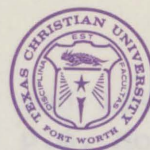
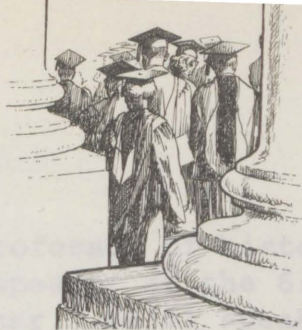

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TOMORROW IS HONORS DAY!

TCU/Fort Worth Week is well underway. Since its official opening ceremony and the magnificent TCU Symphony program with Pianist Lili Kraus last Sunday, a number of fine events have taken place.

Several are scheduled for later today (Wed.). This evening at 6 p.m. Dr. Harry D. Gideonse, Chancellor of the New School for Social Research in New York City, will speak on "The Knowledge Explosion and Our Future" to invited guests of the Evening College and its divisions of special courses and civic affairs.

At 7:30 p.m., in the Student Center Ballroom, the public is invited to hear Dr. James Silver of Notre Dame speak on "The Closed Society." The program is sponsored by the Forums Committee. Also at 7:30 p.m., in Room 206 of the Student Center, Dr. Bita May Hall will lead an orientation seminar on TCU's Summer Session in France. Anyone interested may attend.

Beginning at 10:45 a.m. tomorrow (Thurs.), the formal Honors Day convocation with Dr. Harry Gideonse as speaker will be the first of several special events planned in recognition of academic achievement at TCU. "Social Science and Future Planning" will be Dr. Gideonse's topic when he addresses the audience in Ed Landreth Auditorium. Presiding will be Dr. Floyd Durham, Honors Week chairman. Members of the University's Pre-Honors and Honors programs, students named to "Who's Who" and to Dean's Honor Lists will be introduced. Scholarship trophies will be presented and announcement made of recipient of the Faculty Recognition award.

Dr. Gideonse will participate in a forum starting at 2:30 p.m. in Room 205 of the Student Center. Recipient of the 1961 Bill of Rights Award for distinguished public service in the field of education, he will be joined in the discussion by Dr. John Wortham, chairman of the economics department. George Henderson of Pampa, Student Honors Cabinet member, will preside.

Dr. Frank Reuter, associate professor of history and 1967 Honors Professor, will be the featured speaker at the 6:30 p.m. Honors Day Banquet, to be held in the Student Center. He'll speak on "The Role of the Historian in the Contemporary World." Recipients of awards of Alpha Lambda Delta, Phi Eta Sigma, Phi Beta Kappa and Sigma Xi will be announced, and "Senior Scholars" will be presented during the evening. Tickets, priced at \$2.06, are available at the information desk in the Student Center.

...include tomorrow (Thurs.) evening's orientation session on Summer School in Spain with Dr. Antonio Rivares speaking on "Masterpieces of Spanish Art" in Room 218 of the Student Center. The public is invited to the 7:30 p.m. program.

On Friday at 7:30 p.m. in Room 205-6 of the SC, there will be a panel-forum program on "Challenge to Law and Order." Panelists will include Judge J. C. Duvall of the County Court of Criminal Law, Asst. District Attorney Jim Morgan and Deputy Chief of Fort Worth Police E. L. Giles. Open to the public, the program is sponsored by the government department and Pi Sigma Alpha.

Also scheduled for Friday evening is the TCU Research Foundation Annual Awards Banquet with members of the Scientific Advisory Council as guests. The program is by invitation and will be held at Ridglea Country Club. Dr. Werner A. Baum, deputy administrator of Environmental Science Services Admn. (ESSA), will be the speaker. Walter Humphrey, editor of the Fort Worth Press and a member of the Foundation's board of directors, will be master of ceremonies.

Beginning at 8:15 p.m. Friday will be the first of two performances of "Cosi fan tutte" (Women are like that), the Mozart opera that is being staged on campus by Robert Telford of the Wm. Edrington Scott Theatre in "modern" dress. Curtain time is the same for both the April 26 and 27 performances in Ed Landreth Auditorium. Fritz Berens will be musical conductor, and the 1968 version of the work written nearly 200 years ago promises to be colorful and lively with outstanding music. Tickets for faculty families and students are free (cost to the public is \$2 for adults; \$1 for students). They may be picked up at the music dept. in Ed Landreth--or through inter-office mail by calling Ext. 259.

CHARTER DAY TO BE OBSERVED APRIL 27

The second annual Spring Homecoming, planned for Saturday by the TCU Alumni Association, will be the official celebration of the University's Charter Day. Recognizing the institution's receipt of its first charter from the State of Texas in April, 1874, the afternoon's activities will begin at 1:30 p.m. in Amon Carter Stadium with the annual Purple-White scrimmage.

The halftime program will include the presentation of the Royal Purple Award to Sam P. Woodson Jr. in recognition of extraordinary service and enthusiastic support of TCU and the Alumni Sportsman Award to Robert L. Lilly, former Frog athlete who is defensive tackle for the Dallas Cowboys. Other events will be included in the ceremony, in which Chancellor J. M. Moudy, Alumni Director Clyde Foltz and Alumni president Charles Floyd will take part.

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UCMS CHAIRMAN TO SPEAK AT CHAPEL

Dr. Thomas J. Liggett, executive chairman of the world mission division of the United Christian Missionary Society and executive secretary of the Latin America department, will be guest speaker for chapel on April 30. The Nashville native's first ministry was a mission church in the slums of Lexington, Ky., where he worked while attending Transylvania College. Formerly a minister in Buenos Aires, he did doctoral work at Columbia and Union Theological Seminary while on furlough in 1951-52. He served as president of the Evangelical Seminary in Rio Piedras, Puerto Rico, an interdenominational theological school, from 1957 until he assumed his current position in 1965. He has been awarded honorary doctoral degrees by Culver-Stockton College and Inter-American University of Puerto Rico.

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FACULTY WOMEN TO HONOR GRADUATES

Invitations to the annual Faculty Woman's tea honoring senior women have been sent to more than 400 coeds who will receive their degrees at May or August commencement. The "Springtime yellow" fete will be held April 30 from 3-5 p.m. at the chancellor's home, 2900 Simondale. Chairman for the event is Mary Charlotte Faris, and Mrs. Glenn Routt is serving as co-chairman. Always a "special" occasion for the senior women, this year's event promises to be "extra special" for both the honorees and the hostesses.

CHAMBER MUSIC CONCERT SET FOR APRIL 30

A faculty quartet -- featuring Dr. Ralph Guenther, Mrs. Carolyn Rankin, Kenneth Schanewerk and Mrs. Harriet Woldt -- will present a concert on April 30 in Ed Landreth Auditorium. Beginning at 8:15 p.m., the free public event, a part of the 27th annual Fine Arts Festival now in progress, will include works of Telemann, Martinu, Dello Joio and Brahms. Two TCU students, Margaret Tyson and Richard Pliler, will assist the faculty members with a selection by Brahms. The quartet recently presented a similar program at Jarvis Christian College.

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REVIEWS CONTINUE TO COME

Dr. James Newcomer's bicentennial study of the works of Maria Edgeworth, the almost-forgotten Irish novelist, published by the TCU Press in 1967, continues to receive fine reviews. In its March, 1968, issue The South Central Bulletin said: "If this brief study contained nothing else, one would still appreciate Dr. Newcomer's reappraisal of her most noted novel, Castle Rackrent.....It (this book) merits a place in any Edgeworth collection."

The Irish publication, Eire-Ireland, in its spring 1968 issue said: "All in all the monograph should prove valuable to readers at whatever level. The student will find it an excellent critical introduction to Maia's novels; the scholar will discover new insights in this book; and the critic will have to take another look at the comfortable cliches so often invoked in discussing her work. The general reader will find the book a valuable guide to a fuller appreciation of her achievement in the novel."

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TCU DEBATERS CLOSE WINNING SEASON

Two freshmen, John Heike of Fort Worth and Ransom Ellis of Springfield, Mo., brought the first-place trophy in men's debate home from the recent Shreveport, La., competition. Cited as the only superior team in that division, the duo -- newcomers to intercollegiate debate -- competed against representatives of 16 other universities from Texas, New Mexico, Arkansas and Louisiana in the senior (varsity) debate division of the Pi Kappa Delta-sponsored event.

The Frog debate squad, none of whom will be lost to graduation, concluded the season with the coveted first-place award. The 1967-68 competition began with a third-place win in Murfreesboro, Tenn., and included 22 meets during the year under the capable direction of Dr. Ben A. Chappell.

FULBRIGHT AWARDS, RECOGNITION TO FIVE ✓

Three TCU seniors, chosen from among 4,058 applicants, have been named Fulbright Scholars for foreign study in 1968-69, and two other students have been chosen as alternates. The trio -- Frankie Denton of Houston, Susan Ferre of Fort Worth and Allen Pote of Cushing, Okla. -- are the first three selected from the University in one year since 1961. Susan and Allen, both majoring in church music and both students of Associate Professor Emmet Smith, are the fourth and fifth TCU organ students to be selected for the distinguished honor within the last decade...and the first two from a single department to be named in one year. Susan, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Gus Ferre, will study at the National Conservatory of Music in Paris; while Allen will spend his Fulbright year at the conservatory in Antwerp, Belgium. The third awardee will concentrate her efforts on the field of Germanistics at the University of Hamburg.

Alternates for Fulbright honors are Ellen Marie Weaver of Dallas, an English major, and Maurice R. Williams of Fort Worth, graduate student in history (and son-in-law of financial aid director Logan Ware).

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U.S. SAVINGS BOND PROGRAM A GOOD WAY TO SAVE

All faculty and staff members should have received by now a letter from Chancellor Moudy describing the U.S. Savings Bond program. Many TCU folk are enrolled in the program which provides a 4.15 per cent interest on bonds held to maturity. There's also a new U.S. Treasury Savings Note (Freedom Shares), which pays 4.74 per cent when held to maturity of 4½ years--and when purchased in combination with the Series E Savings Bond.

FACULTY TRAVELERS MUST GET TAX EXEMPTION FORMS

Faculty members traveling on official University business -- conventions, professional meetings and such -- must get tax exemption forms if they are traveling by plane. The form saves TCU 15 per cent of the fare because of the University's exemption from federal excise taxes.

The business office reports that several recent expense accounts have been submitted where the individual did not secure the tax exemption form and was personally charged for the ticket, including the 15 per cent tax. The University will not reimburse faculty members for federal excises taxes paid. So, if you want to avoid paying the tax, obtain the form before you travel. The forms are available from the office of the vice chancellor for fiscal affairs.

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REMINDER ON USE OF INTER-OFFICE MAIL

When using the University's inter-office mail, remember to use only the brown (kraft) envelopes which can be requisitioned from Printing and Mailing. Occasionally some forget and use the regular TCU white envelopes instead.

It would also be helpful if you would put your name and/or department in the upper left hand corner of the envelope. Mail is sometimes incorrectly addressed and should be returned to the sender.

NEW FINANCIAL AID PROGRAM FOR NORTH TEXAS STUDENTS

A new financial aid program for high school seniors who will graduate this semester from North Texas high schools has been established at TCU. The program is designed to make it possible for qualified students who might otherwise be unable to attend a university for financial reasons to enroll in TCU in September.

The scholarship plan is limited to students who will reside at home and commute to the campus for classes and other activities. To be eligible, students must have SAT scores above 1100 and must rank in the upper one half of their graduating class. The amount of financial aid will vary and could be up to an amount equal to full tuition, depending on the demonstrated need of the individual. Aid granted will be renewable if the student maintains a 3.0 grade average in his TCU studies.

Speaking about the plan, Dr. Moudy said, "We believe this new program will make it possible for most of the students from Tarrant and surrounding counties to attend TCU if they have these qualifications. Many of our better students have financial problems, and we want this new program to help as many as possible."

Students wishing to apply for financial aid under the new plan should write to Logan Ware, director of financial aid.
