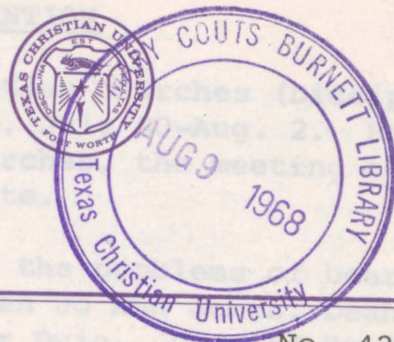

NEW \$100,000 HAWLEY MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP FUND ESTABLISHED

A second memorial trust fund to provide TCU scholarships to graduates of Tarrant County high schools has been established by John B. Hawley Jr. of Minneapolis. The Fort Worth native, sole owner of Northern Pump Co. and its subsidiary Northern Ordnance Inc., requested that the awards be created at TCU in the name of his mother, the late Sue Anna Terrell Hawley. An earlier \$100,000 scholarship was established at TCU in early 1967 in honor of Hawley's father, the late Major J. B. Hawley, a resident of Fort Worth from 1892 until his death in 1941.

From each of the \$100,000 memorial trusts, the University's scholarship committee will make academic awards to "those graduates of the county's high schools who meet requirements of the institution and who are selected by the committee's membership for the purpose of continuing their study at TCU."

Commenting on the gift, Chancellor Moudy said: "Through these unsolicited and very generous gifts of Mr. Hawley, Tarrant County students of modest means will be able to combine the economy of living at home with the challenging opportunity of attending a university. The confidence in TCU as implied by this second trust and Mr. Hawley's remarkable provision for coming generations of young people are extremely encouraging to us."

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'68-'69 PARKING PERMITS NOW AVAILABLE

Parking permits for both faculty and staff for the coming academic year are now on sale in the Security Office. Priced at \$6, the new permit stickers go into effect on Sept. 1. OVER 800 YOUNG PEOPLE ON CAMPUS FOR YOUTH CONVENTION

The 24th annual Texas Youth Convention of Christian Churches (Disciples of Christ) was held on the TCU campus last week, July 30-Aug. 2. Sponsored by the Texas Association of Christian Churches, the meeting attracted over 800 youngsters from across the State.

A number of TCU folks took part in coordinating the problems of board and rooming the students, including Dean of Women Jo Ann James, Dean of Men Bill Murray and Field Representative Don Ver Duin. Dean of Students Howard Wible welcomed the young people to the campus in behalf of the University. On Wednesday evening, TCU hosted a complimentary banquet for juniors and seniors. The admissions staff planned the program and Head Football Coach Fred Taylor was the featured speaker. He had to compete with the youngsters' anxiety to get to Casa Manana to see "Gypsy."

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FACULTY URGED TO HAVE PHOTOS MADE DURING SUMMER

The slow (???) summer months are a good time for faculty, administrative and other professional staffers to have their photographs taken. With the retirement of Mr. & Mrs. Orgain last year, the University has selected Don Barnett Photography, 1717 W. Berry, as the official studio to provide faculty and student photos for the yearbook. Faculty photos are also provided to the Division of Public Relations for publicity purposes.

There is no charge to faculty for this service, but there are a few rules of procedure: 1) The studio will provide one sitting free. If another sitting is desired, and there is nothing really wrong with the first proofs (i.e. your smile's not quite right), then you'll be charged personally for the sitting. 2) A faculty or staff member must pay a standard print charge for all photographs ordered by him for his personal use. 3) Additional poses and prints of a faculty or staff member requested for TCU publicity purposes, must be cleared in advance with the Public Relations Office (ext. 212).

FIXED EQUIPMENT CONTRACT AWARDED

A contract for fixed equipment for the Science Research Center was awarded last week to Taylor Manufacturing Co. of Taylor and Temple. The firm was low bidder with \$464,683, as announced by Vice Chancellor Cecil White, who was in charge of the bid-opening meeting held on campus. Included in the equipment will be built-in furnishings, including such items as benches, cabinets, shelving, stools, balance tables and sinks.

Earlier contracts, authorized for signing by trustees in March, went to Albert L. Smith Co. for general construction; Broyles and Broyles for mechanical work; and Shotts Electric for electrical work.

Target date for completion of the Sid W. Richardson Physical Sciences Building, begun in mid-May, is June, 1970. At that time Winton-Scott Hall will be converted for the life and behavioral sciences.

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BAKER NAMED DEAN OF ADMISSIONS

Former assistant to the vice president for development at Yankton, S.D., College, Dan Baker, assumed the duties of dean of admissions Aug. 1. The former dean of admissions at Kansas' College of Emporia joined the TCU staff in April. In a reorganization and enlargement of the admissions office, pointing toward greater activities throughout the United States, he will travel extensively in his new role.

Associate Dean Anna B. Wallace and admissions assistant director, Mrs. Jewel Potter, will continue to have a major responsibility in Texas and neighboring states. Others in the division include Mrs. Jean Kemp, assistant director, Mike Adams, admissions counselor, and Dick Peacock who will join the staff as admissions counselor by early September.

TWO TEACHER WORKSHOPS IN PROGRESS

About 100 Fort Worth teachers and school administrators are participating in a Title I program workshop designed for teachers of culturally disadvantaged children which began Monday. The federally supported, three-week program, coordinated by Dr. Bonny Engemoen Ford and Dr. Robert Galvan, will include group discussions led by teachers who have been especially effective in this specialized type teaching. Films will be used in presentations, and materials for use with culturally disadvantaged groups will be displayed. Outstanding resource persons from throughout the nation and members of the Fort Worth public school administration will serve as guest lecturers.

Now at its mid-point is an elementary school workshop designed for teachers at Alice Carlson school and Fort Worth administrative personnel. Sponsoring the three-week session are the local system, the North Central Texas Center for Educational Services and the Education Services Center of Region XI. Coordinating the activities is Dr. Les Evans, NCTCES director. A number of outstanding educators are serving as consultants.

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"BUMBLING BASKETEERS" PRESENT GIFT TO KTCU-FM[✓]

An \$800 gift from the "Bumblng Basketeers," a group of personalities from KXOL Radio who challenge faculty members of Fort Worth-area high schools in cage games annually, was presented recently to the radio-television-film division. Making the presentation was Dick Osburn, KXOL general manager who earned his BFA degree at TCU and served as KTCU's station manager during his undergraduate career.

A portion of the proceeds from the admission charge at the basketball games, the gift will be used to purchase a new audio console for KTCU-FM, the University's fully licensed educational broadcasting station. The School of Fine Arts program in broadcast, production and teaching can be significantly expanded by the addition of a second modern, very well-equipped console board, explained Larry Lauer, instructor and faculty advisor for the campus station.

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MEETING SCHEDULE SET FOR FACULTY SENATE

Following its meeting last week, the executive committee of TCU's new Faculty Senate has announced plans for calling the Senate into session at 4 p.m. on the first Thursday of each month, beginning October 3. Arrangements have been made to hold the meetings in Room 218 of the Student Center. A number of important projects are being considered for discussion by the Senate. Those faculty members elected to the Senate will be notified as plans develop.

TCU ORGAN STUDENTS PRAISED IN EUROPE

Associate Professor of Organ Emmet Smith, who is conducting a European Organ Study Tour, writes from Lubeck, Germany: "Lubeck is a marvelous old town that does not appear to be overrun, yet, by fellow Americans. The hotel is very nice, excellent food and service and perfectly located in a very scenic spot near all points of interest. The students are having a fine time here.

"Our stay in Bonn was evermore satisfying than I had dared hope. The best ones (students) of the group played a splendid concert on Wednesday night to a pleased and surprised audience of organists. TCU can be justly proud, because the comment I heard repeatedly was that organ playing in America must be improving greatly. All that is the matter is that they have not heard TCU students play!"

Emmet and the tour group will return to Fort Worth August 14.

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SPECIAL COURSE FOR ACCOUNTANTS PLANNED

TCU's Division of Special Courses, headed by Dr. Leroy Lewis, is planning a series of four courses designed as review for certified public accounting candidates and supervisory accounting personnel. The first course, "CPA Accounting Practices Review," will meet on Mondays, Aug. 19-Oct. 28, from 7 to 10 p.m. in the Undergraduate Religion Building.

Leonard Brantley, local CPA, will teach the course. "In addition to serving as general review, these courses will provide continuing education for all accounting personnel," said Dr. Lewis.

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RESEARCH FOUNDATION CAMPAIGN 75% COMPLETE

Though the TCU Research Foundation annual fund campaign is running at a slower rate than at this time last year, it has achieved 75 per cent of its \$450,000 goal for 1967-68.

The number of individuals and firms giving support to the campaign is above that of 1966-67. So far, 252 contributors have pledged \$338,976. Last year at this time, 245 contributors had pledged \$368,387. Many calls are still to be made and the prospects for reaching the goal are encouraging.

TWO DEPARTMENT HEADS NAMED

LTC Kirksey N. Parker, ✓ who headed the navigation section of the United States' Yokota air base in Japan from 1965 until early this year, has assumed his duties as professor aerospace studies at TCU. LTC Parker fills the position held by MAJ Kenneth Thompson, who is being transferred this month.

A former resident of Dallas, LTC Parker was officer in charge of navigation at McClellan Air Force Base in California prior to his assignment in Japan. He holds the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Air Medal with two Oak Leaf Clusters and a number of other citations and honors.

New chairman of the accounting department in the M. J. Neeley School of Business is Dr. James W. Edwards. ✓ The appointment becomes effective Sept. 1. Dr. Edwards, whose research on effects of federal income taxes on capital budgeting will be published this fall by the National Association of Accountants, was an associate professor of accounting and finance at Western Kentucky University last year.

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RECENT FACULTY APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED

Dr. Richard M. Fenker Jr. ✓ and Louis S. Leland Jr. ✓ have been named assistant professors in the psychology department. Dr. Fenker, coming to TCU from Purdue University, will also hold an appointment as a research scientist in the Institute for the Study of Cognitive Systems. Leland is coming from the University of Tennessee, where he expects to be awarded the Ph.D. degree this summer.

Dr. Luther Bryan Clegg, ✓ who received his doctorate in education at Texas Tech in June, joins the faculty in September as assistant professor of education with special responsibilities for the School of Education's instructional aids center (formerly audio-visual).

Dr. E. Elaine Freeland, ✓ formerly a speech correctionist for Denver and Portland public schools, has been named associate professor of speech and audiologist effective in September. An assistant professor at Louisiana Polytechnic Institute before assuming the position of director of speech and hearing for a rehabilitation center, Dr. Freeland has been a part-time speech pathologist and for four years was senior instructor in surgery at the University of Colorado Medical Center.

Army CAPT William Wright Crouch, ✓ who served in West Germany, Austria, Italy, Switzerland and Southeast Asia before coming to TCU, has been named assistant professor of military science. Serving in the Army since 1963, he has been awarded the Army Commendation Medal and the Silver Star.

Mrs. Danna Elliott Strength joins the faculty as an instructor in Harris College of Nursing in September. A 1959 TCU graduate from the nursing school, she earned her Master of Science in Nursing degree in June at Washington University in St. Louis. Before beginning her graduate study she was medical surgical supervisor at Methodist Hospital in Dallas and head nurse at Denton State School.

Odes W. Sapp Jr., well-known as a technical director for Casa Manana musicals and for the William Edrington Scott Theater, joins the faculty in September as instructor and technical director for the theatre arts department.

Hatcher A. Pickens, Fort Worth business executive, has been named adjunct professor in M. J. Neeley School of Business, effective in September. He currently heads the Fort Worth office of Arthur Young & Co., one of the "Big Eight" accounting firms in the nation, and plans to retire in the fall after almost half a century of accounting work.

Robert Clarence Thompson will assume duties as instructor in sociology in September. Formerly a Baptist minister for congregations in Arkansas and East Texas, he will receive his master's degree from TCU at the August commencement service. He held a teaching assistantship in sociology here last year.

Dr. Robert R. Galvan has been named associate professor of education and director of the Reading Improvement Services. Former director of reading services at Delta State College, he began his duties at TCU last month working with the Institute for Teachers of the Educationally Deprived sponsored through the North Texas Center for Educational Services.

Mrs. Kirsten Beck Harrington will assume duties as instructor of art in September. She has been teaching assistant in the art department of Tulane University while earning her master's degree.

John L. Buchholz, who has been a teaching assistant here since 1967, has been appointed as instructor in English, effective in September.

Mrs. Allene Jones, formerly head nurse at Fort Worth's U. S. Public Health Service Hospital and now clinical supervisor at St. Joseph's Hospital, will join the faculty as instructor in Harris College of Nursing in September.

GIFT RECEIVED FOR PASTORAL CARE AND TRAINING CENTER ✓

A \$1,500 cash gift, a portion of a \$9,000 pledge, has been received by Brite Divinity School from the family of the late H. Parr Armstrong of Fort Worth, for the School's Pastoral Care and Training Center.

Armstrong, a well-known Christian church minister-at-large who died in July, 1966, came to Texas in 1948 as director of the Laymen's League of the Texas Convention of Christian Churches. Prior to that he was executive secretary of the Oklahoma City Council of Churches. Participating in the memorial pledge along with their mother are the former Marian Armstrong and her husband, Ted McElroy of Waco; the former Dorothy Armstrong and her husband, Lew Davis, missionaries in India (Lew taught in Brite last year in Bill Hall's absence); and Roger Armstrong and his wife of New Haven, Conn.

The Pastoral Care and Training Center, to be directed by Rev. Charles Sanders II, associate minister of University Christian Church since 1964, is scheduled to open next month. It will provide counseling services for laymen of all denominations and all faiths who are referred by their ministers as well as for non-church members who may seek help in the solution of personal problems.

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RELIGIOUS DEVELOPMENT OF CHILDREN COURSE OFFERED

TCU's Evening College will offer a course this fall which will examine the possibilities of religious experience and personality development of children. Open to all interested persons, "Religious Development of Children" will be offered on Monday evenings from 7-9:40 p.m., beginning Sept. 23.
