lowever, it was good to note that there were 3,448 in undergraduate day schools, an Acrease of 296 in "fulltime" students. Graduate School was also up (404 against 376) and Brite had 154 against 147 last year. Only loss was in Evening College (1955 to 480) but it had been expected.
