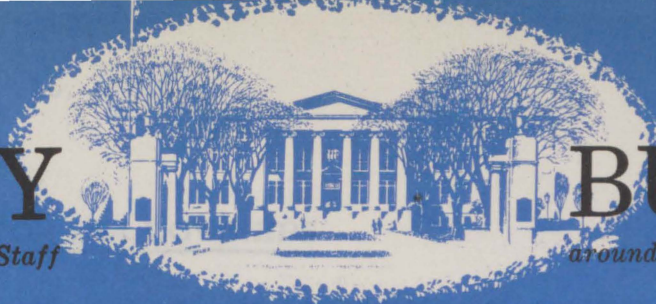

PROCESSIONAL SATURDAY MORNING

This weekend will be one of Fall's biggest on campus what with the coming of the mighty Texas Aggies and the formal dedication of our new buildings. The help of all faculty folks is needed.

Dr. Noel Keith, chairman of the dedication planning group, announces that there WILL be a processional to open ceremonies in Ed Landreth Saturday morning. It is set for 9:30 a. m. and everyone is asked to be on hand not later than 9:15 on the walk south of Fine Arts. In case of rain, the assembly will be inside the building along the south corridor. Everyone with academic robes is urged to wear them and to march together at the head of the processional. However, all others are also urged to take part even without robes. The faculty will be seated on the stage for the event along with 100 singers from the Tri Delta sorority and Sigma Chi fraternity.

Pres. Sadler will preside and Dr. D. M. Wiggins, former president of Texas Tech, will give the address. Ike Harrison will read a litany for Dan D. Rogers Hall, Dean Elizabeth Shelburne will give one for Colby D. Hall Dormitory and Dean C. J. Firkins one for Milton E. Daniel Dormitory. Following the ceremonies in Ed Landreth, conducted tours of all three of the new structures will be held.

Other members of the committee are Larry Smith, Elizabeth Youngblood, Deans Harrison, Shelburne, Firkins and Jim Lehman. Don't forget Saturday morning. Let's fill up the Auditorium for this event.

DEADLINE NEAR ON TOP FELLOWSHIPS

The new committee (as yet unnamed) to coordinate information on faculty and graduate scholarships and fellowships had a first session last week. It was discovered that deadlines are very near on applications for some of the choice awards. So the information is passed on here to everyone so they may act NOW if interested.

Ford Foundation, International Relations Fellowships: For those with Ph. D. degrees (by Feb. 1958), one year postdoctoral study in international and foreign affairs. Good stipend. Applicant applies himself. Deadline is Nov. 1, 1957.

Ford Foundation, Foreign Area Training Fellowships: For seniors, grad students, scholars with doctorate interested in Asia, Near East, Soviet Union, Africa. Study in U.S. or abroad. Good stipend. Applicant applies himself. Deadline, Nov. 1, 1957.

Woodrow Wilson Fellowships: For first-year graduate work leading to a career in college teaching in humanities, social sciences, natural sciences and mathematics. Stipend \$1,400 plus amount to cover tuition. Special consideration for married Fellows. Note: ANY FACULTY member may nominate ANY eligible student. (The committee hears that 1,000 of these will be given this year--against some 270 last year. This is a wonderful opportunity for some of our top scholars and everyone is asked to check over their seniors to see if we might have some candidates.)

The info here is sketchy, of course, Please call or drop by Dean Jim Moudy's office for details on each opportunity. Dr. Moudy is chairman of the new coordinating committee with Comer Clay and Amos Melton members.

PLACEMENT BUREAU BUSY SPOT

Raymond (Bear) Wolf, the reformed football coach who now directs our Placement Bureau, has filed a most interesting report on operations Sept. 1956-Aug. 1957. For instance, didja know that 132 representatives of 102 of the country's biggest firms held 571 interviews with our students on careers from Oct. 29 to May 10 last school year?

Seeking fulltime jobs, 152 seniors, 44 alumni and 29 others (wives, etc.) registered with the Bureau while 753 students sought part-time posts. Accepting positions were 83 seniors, 14 alumni, 12 others, while there were 465 placements among the part-time workers. That's a very fine record indeed.

BUSINESS TEACHERS TO MEET HERE
