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LETTER FROM CHINA

Sadler, who gets a flock of "peculiar" letters, got a topper recently from Hong Kong. It begins: "I am very delightful to inform you that by this letter, however, to take up a lot of your time for which I beg your pardon first. But I think that we are working the same line of education, so I wish both to describe myself in detail and am obliged to declare my sincerest wishes for you."
