### "CAREERS" FOR HIGH SCHOOL SENIORS

The high school seniors of our area, some 1,300 of whom are now due to attend our fifth annual Citizenship and Career Conference on campus Jan. 24, are running strong toward engineering, the sciences, business and secretarial science as possible careers.

The seniors are sent a questionnaire on which they mark their preference in 1-2-3 order. Tabulation of the first 833 replies showed the following first choices: Engineering (all <sup>forms</sup>) 105; Secretarial Science 98; Business Administration 60; Aviation (pilot, hostess, etc.) 48; Auto Mechanic and Machinist 47.

Others in order are: Farming-Ranching 36; Athletic Coach 35; Chemistry-Physics 32; Accounting 22; Military Service 22; Medicine 23; Art 20; Beauty Culture 21; Nurse 21; Music 19; Radio-TV 19; Religion 18; Elementary Teacher 18; Telephone Communications <sup>18</sup>; Journalism 16; Home Economics 16; Clothing Designer 16; Drama 15; Draftsman 12; High School Teacher 12; Social Service 10; Biology 9; Photography 7; Geology 5; Law and Government Careers 8; Architecture 4; Ballet 3; Public Relations 3; Advertising 1.

### MEMORANDUM TO: Members of the Faculty

SUBJECT: Danforth Foundation Graduate Fellowships

It will be most appreciated if you will inform members of your classes that the application deadline for the Danforth Graduate Fellowships is January 21. The Fellowships are open to all male seniors under thirty years of age who have not as yet begun their graduate work and who plan to proceed in their education through the Ph. D. level.

The three major qualifications that the Foundation seeks are:

- Outstanding academic ability and evidence of a vigorous searching mind;
- 2. A personality which contributes to classroom effort and which is interested in student affairs;
- 3. Sound character and integrity in the Christian tradition.

Financial assistance of the Fellowship is given according to need, providing for single men an annual maximum grant of \$1400 plus tuition and fees, for married men \$1900 plus tuition and fees with an additional amount of \$350 for each child.

If you have any senior male students in your classes which are especially qualified for this scholarship, would you please refer them to Ben H. Procter, Room 121, Administration Building, so that they may acquire application forms.

Please note that the deadline for receiving applications is January 21.
