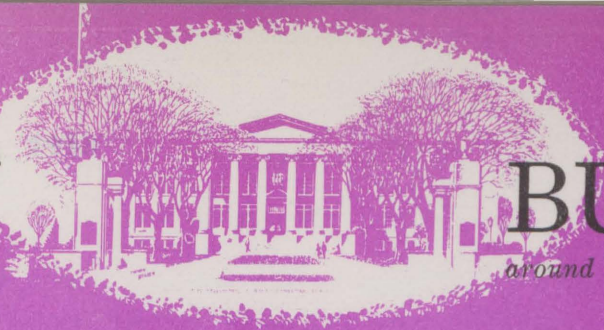

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REGISTRATION STARTS ON TUESDAY

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FINE PUBLICATION BY LEO HENDRICKS ✓

"Geology of Parker County, Texas," by our own Leo Hendricks of geology, has just been published by the Bureau of Economic Geology. Even a layman can tell at a quick glance that it is a scholarly, beautifully done booklet.

As Leo points out in the introduction, first work on the Parker County study was done in 1925-1930 by Dr. Gayle Scott, the well-loved onetime chairman of our geology department (and president of the Southwest Athletic Conference) and J. M. Armstrong of Prairie Oil Co. Many of the names and terms they used 'way back there have become official.

Leo has continued the work for several years, sometimes with the help of funds from the TCU Faculty Research Committee. Over 500 aerial photographs needed for stereoscopic coverage of the county were so supplied. Leo also gives credit to many former students including Henry Ohlen, Garner Wilde, Alfred Wright, David Knopp, Dale Hodgson, W. E. Russell, Frank Markovic and others for special help.

The publication is one of which we can all be proud, especially our Science Division. Congrats Leo on a wonderful job well done!
