CONTRACT LET ON NEW BOYS' DORM

Bids from 10 companies on the new boys' dorm (to replace Goode) were opened March 12. The contract went to Thomas L. Byrne Co. for a bid of \$629, 400 which includes building and some built-in furnishings. Three companies were very close and our officials (headed by M. J. Neeley who is chairman of the Board's Buildings and Grounds Committee) took duite a while before determining the low bidder.

Work will start at once on the sturcture which will house 252 boys. Plans call for us to but it into service by midterm (February) next year.

NEW DEPARTMENT IN FINE ARTS

FRATERNITY GRADE AVERAGES

C. J. Firkins supplies the grade-point averages of our fraternities during the fall semester. The report shows that 375 men are associated with the groups-or 20% of the men enrolled on a fulltime basis in Day Colleges.

Grade averages on "actives" ranged from 1.543 for Kappa Sigma to 1.167 for Sigma Chi. Among the pledges, the range was from 1.577 for Delta Tau Delta to 0.971 for Lambda Chi Alpha. Perhaps the most significant figures were for the "combined" averages -- both ^{actives} and pledges--which were: Kappa Sigma 1.561; Delta Tau Delta 1.529; Phi Delta Theta 1. 421; Phi Kappa Sigma 1. 366; Sigma Alpha Epsilon 1. 312; Sigma Phi Epsilon 1. 285; lambda Chi Alpha 1.241; Sigma Chi 1.095. The all-fraternity average was 1.365. Pretty ⁸⁰od on the whole, C or 1.0 being medium work.
