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BY THEIR WORKS SHALL YOU KNOW

Although the campus was plunged into deep gloom over his loss last week, TCU could also feel a reassuring surge of pride for the life and works of Milton Daniel. For the chairman of our Trustees was truly a product of the University's educational philosophy and processes. As he often said, the two greatest influences in his life were the Orphans' Home at Waco that cared for the young Daniels at the turn of the century and TCU.

On the other hand, Milton Daniel has left a deep mark on the University. He became a student in our old academy in 1905, moved up to college work, captained our football team in 1911, coached the Frogs in 1915-1916 after taking a law degree at the University of Texas. He became a trustee in 1927; was made chairman in 1953. He played a major role in many areas and decisions.

And for all his great skill in business, his intensive interest and endless contributions to civic matters, he had a great "humanness" that made him loved by all. He had a wonderful sense of humor and was fond of telling the story of what happened to him at a Frog game some years ago. A rabid fan sitting just behind kept criticizing everything Coach Dutch Meyer did. Finally Milton called the loud-mouth's hand on some decision which caused the fan to retort: "What do you know about football?" Replied Milton: "A little. I used to coach TCU and Dutch Meyer." The fan, after a moment of reflection, came back with: "No wonder Dutch doesn't know one thing about the game!" Milton always laughed louder than anybody over the story.

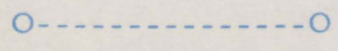
All of us are happy that in a small way, at least, we recognized Mr. Daniel during his lifetime. He was our "most valuable alumnus," given an honorary degree and lived to know that one of our dormitories will always bear his name. Not enough perhaps for all his contributions. But something, anyway. But more to the point is the fact that Milton Daniel lives on in the hearts of his fellowmen. We spoke with several men who said: "He was the best friend I ever had. He helped me and my family back there when no one else could." You couldn't help wondering just how many lives he had touched and influenced for God.

Especially, do YOU know where the spirit of Milton Daniel lives in your classroom? Yes, if men--and universities--can be proud of their works and products, we can take great pride in the life of Milton Daniel. Sometimes when the daily grind is too great and the world too much with us, the thought that we can help to produce such men can give us all new courage and faith. Perhaps that is the greatest legacy of Milton Daniel. A truly wonderful man.

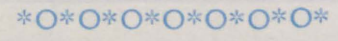
