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### THE "SADLER LECTURE" NEXT TUESDAY NIGHT

ICU will have its own "former Communist" on campus next Tuesday night, May 6. He's Leon Volkov, onetime lieutenant colonel in the Soviet Air Force, who will deliver the hird annual "Sadler Freedom Lecture." The place is Ed Landreth Auditorium and the time 8 p.m.

The lecture will climax a program which will see Dr. Kenneth Wells, distinguished businessman and civic leader, present awards of the famed Freedoms Foundation of Valley Forge, Pa., to several Texans--one of whom will be our own Harold Lunger. Dr. Wells president of the Foundation and a nationally known figure.

Col. Volkov is not as famous--or controversial perhaps--as SMU's Comrade Gates. But he knows a lot firsthand, having been raised in the Soviet tradition and being a combat lying officer (86 missions against the Germans) before parachuting to freedom in the U. S. lone of Germany after World War II. His story was told by W. L. White in the book Land of Milk and Honey' and in the Saturday Evening Post. Today he's a contributing editor to Newsweek Magazine and an expert on Soviet affairs to the State and Defense Departments. Reports are that he gives a terrific talk and will present some new material here.

The occasion, of course, honors Pres. Sadler. Previous lectures in the series were given by Palmer Hoyt of the Denver Post and Dr. Robert Storey of the SMU Law School. Tis hoped that every member of the faculty and staff will attend Tuesday night. Also, everyone will be grateful if you will urge your students to attend. Many of them will benefit from the experience and discussion. Please make plans NOW.
