# PHOTOCOPY MACHINE IN LIBRARY

Glenn Sparks reports that the Library now has a photocopy machine which can reproduce lages in books and magazines. One use will be to copy pages in non-circulating laterials for library users (for a small fee, yet to be set). Another will be to save wear and tear of magazines when assignments are made for a class to read a specific article. The Library requests that in the future, before such assignments are made, the Loan librarian be notified far enough in advance that copies of the pages may be made and laced on reserve at the loan desk. Students can then be told that the article is available at the desk rather than in the magazine or volume.

Glenn also reports that if furniture and equipment arrive on schedule, the Library may gain be moved around June 2. Reserve lists for summer courses should be sent to the library as far in advance of the term as possible, beginning now, in order that they may processed before moving begins. Also, if any books now on reserve are no longer leeded for classes, please notify the Library so they can be returned to the stacks.
