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## A SIGNIFICANT WEEKEND FOR TCU

Things really happened in rapid-fire order on campus last weekend and in case you missed them in the public prints, perhaps a recap is in order. Chronologically, the developments were:

The Executive Committee of the Board, on the recommendation of Pres. Sadler, voted to give about \$100,000 of income from the Milton E. Daniel Estate to close personal friends and relatives of the late Board chairman and to institutions in Breckenridge in which he was deeply interested. This action has had a fine response from all quarters and the enthusiastic support of the entire Board at a called meeting on last Saturday.

Secondly, it was voted to accept the offer of the Amon Carter Foundation to take the famous Lewis Collection of rare books and manuscripts as an outright gift. It now belongs to the University and plans have already been made to make much greater use of many rare items. Dr. Sadler said that a volume will be prepared giving a careful description of each item in the Collection. A plaque acknowledging the gift from the Foundation will be placed near the "Lewis Room" in the new library.

Thirdly, the full Board at a called meeting elected Lorin Boswell<sup>✓</sup> as its new chairman. He's a TCU grad, of course, and a top businessman and civic leader of our area. The selection seemed to please everyone and under Lorin's leadership, the University's great progress of the last two decades will continue.

Also, it was voted to name the new boys' dormitory "Clark Hall" after Founding Fathers Addison and Randolph Clark and their descendants. Mr. M. J. Neeley, chairman of Buildings and Grounds, pointed out that old Clark Hall probably will be torn down to make way for a new building. While nothing is definite as yet, many plans are cooking.

On the recommendation of Deans' Council, honorary LL. D. degrees were voted for Jack Dancinger, Fort Worth oilman and leader in better relations with Latin American countries, and Dr. Henry Harmon, president of Drake University. Honorary D. D. degrees will go to Rev. Lloyd Mottley of Lufkin and Rev. Hugh Riley of Oak Cliff Christian Church. They will be awarded at Summer Commencement and Fall Convocation.

Yes, a very busy and significant weekend. Looks like things have been cleared for progress in all directions.
