## WATER WILL BE OFF SATURDAY

The campus will be without water all day Saturday, July 26, announces L. W. Ramsey, director of buildings and grounds.

A 10-inch water main is being laid across the campus from University Drive to Tom Brown Hall. Workmen will be making connections Saturday between the new main and existing water lines on campus, necessitating the shut-down.

## SENIOR CLASS GIFT ANNOUNCED

Six oil paintings by Fort Worth artist Jean de Toit have been given to the university as the traditional senior gift of the Class of '58. They are hanging in Rooms 210 and 216 of the Student Center and are a splendid addition to the university's art collection.

They were selected by Jerry Daniel, Fort Worth senior, chairman of the class gift committee.

The paintings include: "Shabby Gentil," a study of a clown; "The Rogue," portrait of a bandit; a landscape in Estes Park, Colo.; "Morning Flight," a painting of a heron in flight over the Florida Keys; "The Flower Market," painted by Mr. de Toit in Paris; and "Home from Work," which he painted in Mexico.

## THE SUMMER SCHEDULE

Events to come this summer include:

1. A Marching Band Workshop, July 27-Aug. 1, sponsored by the School of Fine Arts. Clinicians are James A. Jacobsen, director of TCU Bands, and Ted C. Tagenhorst, director of instrumental music in the Mansfield, O., public schools.
2. A three-week institute for church leaders on "The Role of the Church in a Multiracial Society," conducted by Brite College of the Bible, Aug. 5-22. The Institute is directed by Dr. Harold L. Lunger, professor of Christian ethics.
3. The annual Texas Youth Convention of the Christian Churches, Aug. 6-9 at which some 1350 students are expected. Featured speakers will be Rev. Bob Richards of Laverne, Calif., former Olympic pole vault champion; Milton Patton of the United Christian Youth Movement of New York; and Dr. M. Jack Suggs, professor of New Testament in Brite College.



4. The second Twirling Clinic of the summer, Aug. 10-15, sponsored by the School of Fine Arts and directed by F. R. "Woody" Woodard.
5. Two more plays by the Horned Frog-Community Summer Theatre: Edith Sommer's delightful comedy about teen-age problems, "A Roomful of Roses," July 24-25-26-31, Aug. 1-2; and Benn W. Levy's farce on the pitfalls of the "good life," "Springtime for Henry," Aug. 7-8-9, 14-15-16. The plays are presented in the air-conditioned TCU Little Theatre; curtain time is 8:15 p. m.
6. Summer commencement exercises Friday evening, Aug. 22.

Co-author with Dr. Lyles is EARL W. GARDNER who will join the biology faculty in the fall.
