Regular full time faculty are eligible for enrollment after completion of two years' service with the university, at which time the school begins paying an equivalent of 10 1/2% of the employee's salary into the retirement program.

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ABOUT SECOND CLASS MAIL:

Second class mail includes all School Bulletins plus such other material as THE TRAIL DUST, a periodic publication of Brite College, a single sheet describing programs of study for office positions published by the School of Business and other official University publications. It is important to remember that all such Second Class Matter must be indorsed, in printing, that the matter is second class and is entered as such at the Post Office.

At a recent Postal Clinic we were informed that Second Class Mail is processed as soon as it is received at the Main Post Office, therefore, the impression, that many of us have had that Permit Mail is allowed to wait until the Department can conveniently begin work upon them is wrong.

The use of Second Class Mail may result in substantial savings to the Department. For instance a single copy of the AddRan Bulletin when sent to Dallas first class, costs .24. When sent as third class mail it costs .09 but when sent as Second Class it goes at the rate of .01 cent per pound.

The privilege of using Second Class Mail requires several services to be completed by us. Mail must be sorted into three catagories: Mail for Fort Worth, other Texas Post Offices, and Mail for other States. Each month, a report must be made to the Second Class Mail Department at the Main Post Office. This inventory must include the number of individual Bulletins sent because the charges are determined by weight and each bulletin weighs differently.

It has been found that sorting the labels before they are attached to the envelopes containing the bulletins is more efficient. Therefore, upon receipt of the typed labels they are sorted into the three main classes; Fort Worth, miscellaneous Texas, and miscellaneous States. Within the category of miscellaneous Texas, any Post Office which is to receive six or more envelopes containing bulletins must be tied in separate packages. Within the classification of miscellaneous States, any state that is to receive 6 or more envelopes containing bulletins must be packaged separately and labeled as; Misc. Oklahoma. In addition, if there are 6 or more envelopes directed to a certain city within the state, these must be prepared as separate parcels.

After the above has been completed and the packages are placed in their labeled mail sacks, our Maintenance Department must be called to transport them to the Berry Street Post Office. (A Postal Regulation requires that Second Class Mail must be delivered to a Post Office and our TCU Station is not so classified). Due to the heavy call upon their services our Maintenance Department has requested that we call them before 11 A. M. on the day we have mail to be delivered.
