# PUBLIC PROGRAMS COMMITTEE

Don't know if you noticed this new faculty committee in the Faculty Handbook but it needs to be brought to the attention of all. It was set up by Pres. Sadler last spring and will be playing an important role on campus. In short, it is to have supervisory responsibility for ALL PROGRAMS on campus attended by the GENERAL PUBLIC.

Jim Farrar is chairman with Noel Keith, Ralph Guenther, Elizabeth Youngblood and Amos Melton as members. They've had one meeting already--working on plans for our formal Fall Convocation on Oct. 2.

The Committee has three functions: 1) On occasions where a standing committee or person has been charged with planning a public program, the Committee will review plans, give suggestions and approve the program before public announcement is made; 2) In the event of a major university activity (Baccalaureate, Commencement, etc.), and even if a standing committee or person is charged with the planning, the Committee will take a more active role in the planning, making any recommendations for changes to Pres. Sadler; 3) On occasions where there is no standing committee or person charged with an event, the Committee may become the primary planning body.

The objective, of course, is to make sure that ALL of our public programs are well planned and presented. This is most important. There may be some confusion at first but things will work out in time. In any event, everyone should have these points in mind:

- 1--Any person or group planning a public meeting is responsible for submitting its plans to the Public Programs Committee PRIOR to any announcement of the event. Sufficient time must be given to permit the P.P. Committee to consider the plans make adjustments, give approval.
- 2--Any person or group planning such a public meeting shall indicate the needed facilities to the P.P. Committee which will delegate responsibility for arrangement of property and physical facilities
- 3--The scheduling of facilities and properties for a program to which the public is invited will be made through the P.P. Committee chairman. In the event of conflict, a university function will take precedent over that of any school or department. Early planning should be done to avoid conflicts.
- 4--In the event of any doubt as to whether a given event falls within the purview of the P.P. Committee, Pres. Sadler shall decide.

All of which sounds a bit involved, perhaps. To make it more simple, if you or your group is planning a meeting on campus to which the public will be invited, call Rev. Farrar at Ext. 327 just as soon as possible for information. That's ANY PUBLIC MEETING at all
