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ELECT SERIES" A SELLOUT

ew sort of situation hit our committee on "Select Series" last week. They flat sold tof \$5 season tickets for students and staff and a lot of people were too late. On thorization by Dr. Lindley, the Committee withdrew some of the tickets being offered outside folks for \$8 to make room for more TCU folks. But even this space was snapped

Landreth (where events will be held) seats 1,250. The Committee planned to sell out 1,000 "TCU tickets" and some 300 at \$8 to the general public in an effort to balance budget. But the demand exceeded all expectations—all the TCU tickets were sold to week and about half of those available to the public. Dr. Lindley, feeling that our people should come first even if the University would have to underwrite the Series a greater extent, suggested outside sales be stopped and all space left sold to our own idents and faculty. And, it was felt that our people who had bought the \$8 ticket should \$3 refunds.

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ROLLMENT RECORD FALLS FOR FALL
