ALL CONVOCATION AT 11 A. M. THURSDAY

Faculty folks are reminded to be prompt for the processional which will open our annual All Convocation Thursday morning in Ed Landreth Auditorium. Be sure to end classes plenty of time--and don't forget to urge ALL your students to attend. Let's fill every seat.

Henry G. Harmon, president of Drake University, will deliver an inspiring talk. He is one of Iowa's top speakers and will have some very worthwhile things to say. President Lindley will preside and award the honorary LL. D. degree on our guest.

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"SELECT SERIES" A SELLOUT

A new sort of situation hit our committee on "Select Series" last week. They flat sold out of \$5 season tickets for students and staff and a lot of people were too late. On authorization by Dr. Lindley, the Committee withdrew some of the tickets being offered to outside folks for \$8 to make room for more TCU folks. But even this space was snapped

at Ed Landreth (where events will be held) seats 1,250. The Committee planned to sell out 1,000 "TCU tickets" and some 300 at \$8 to the general public in an effort to balance the budget. But the demand exceeded all expectations--all the TCU tickets were sold out last week and about half of those available to the public. Dr. Lindley, feeling that our own people should come first even if the University would have to underwrite the Series to a greater extent, suggested outside sales be stopped and all space left sold to our own students and faculty. And, it was felt that our people who had bought the \$8 ticket should get \$3 refunds.

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ENROLLMENT RECORD FALLS FOR FALL

Although a trickle of registration is still expected through the week, we had already smashed all enrollment records for a fall semester on Monday. Calvin Cumbie reported 6,451 signed and sealed vs. the old mark of 6,155 in 1956. The breakdown: Day School Undergrad 3,779; Evening College 2,038; Brite 156; Grad School 478. All are new records except Evening College. Mr. L. C. White is back-patting himself. His guess for last spring: 6,428.

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REPORT ON CHOLERA RESEARCH PUBLISHED

Studies on the Antigenic Structure of Vibrio Cholerae, by our own Sanders Lyles and Ed Gardner, is published in the July-August issue of the "Journal of Infectious Diseases." In addition, of course, a report on the important cholera research "Sandy" has been carrying on in that guarded lab on fourth floor of Science Building.

... a right scholarly discussion and summarized: "It has been demonstrated that rough L-rho antigens of Vibrio cholerae grown on beef infusion peptone agar were not agglutinated, or were agglutinated to a very low titer, in antiserums prepared against both steamed antigens grown on similar medium, when the agglutinating antigen was added in the untreated state." Yep, that's exactly what we always thought--just didn't know how to say it. Wonder if them antigens could block an Arkansas tackle? They go around agglutinating all the time.
