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#### THE NEW ENROLLMENT RECORD

Calvin Cumbie's final figures on fall enrollment showed an increase of 369 students over 1957, an overall increase of 6 per cent. It is, of course, a new record for fall semester-the old mark being 6, 155 in 1956. All divisions showed increases over last year and three of the four Calvin uses set new alltime records. 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#### FACTS ON FRATERNITY RUSH

C. J. Firkins has made a thorough report on this fall's Fraternity "Rush." The figures: 179 boys registered for the event, 166 completed the first round parties, 14 dropped out for reasons unknown, 8 dropped out although they had party bids (6 were found to be ineligible), 11 refused bids and only 1 boy who went through the entire program failed to receive a bid. In all, 125 were pledged. At present, we have 398 men either as pledges or active members of our eight fraternities. A good report.
