ICU SEVENTH LARGEST IN STATE THIS FALL 🗸

A study by indefatigable Calvin Cumbie shows that TCU has the seventh largest enrollment (head-count) in the State this fall--also that it is the third largest "independent" school and the only church-related school among the big three to show an increase this fall. His tabulation:

According to the figures, SMU showed a decrease of 147 and Baylor lost 190 this fall. TCU was up 369, of course. And incidentally, did you see where SMU is expected to put in a tuition increase? Baylor upped rates this fall.

SOCIAL SECURITY RATE TO GO UP JAN. 1

Cecil White calls attention to the fact that starting Jan. 1, the Social Security tax rate goes up from 2 1/4% to 2 1/2%. The University makes a like contribution under the law, of course.

Also, it should be noted that these new rates apply to a base of \$4,800 instead of \$4,200 as before. This means that the maximum deduction from any salary during 1959 will be \$120 instead of \$94.50 as in 1958. The self-employed rate increases from 3 3/8% to 3 3/4% and is applied to the broader base also. Just thought you'd like to know. Incidentally, benefits under Social Security will also increase in some cases on Jan. 1. If concerned, might check on this.
