GENERAL FACULTY MEETING WEDNESDAY, NOV. 19

Next Wednesday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock, our third general faculty meeting of the year will be held in the Dan D. Rogers lecture hall. Our speaker will be Dr. Goodrich White, chancellor of Emory University of Georgia, one of the South's most famous educators.

Dr. White will fly in Tuesday afternoon and plans to spend two or three days on campus. He'll talk with many individuals and groups about the TCU program, especially in the graduate area and our planned Ph. D. program. A graduate of Emory, Columbia and Chicago, he has had a long and distinguished career in education. At Emory, he was dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, the Graduate School, was vice-president and became president in 1942.

Dr. White's meeting with the general faculty Wednesday will be the highlight of his visit. 'Tis hoped everyone can come. Put the time and place on that crowded calendar now.

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HOLIDAY SCHEDULE CLARIFIED

So that those planning trips may know, Vice-President D. Ray Lindley has sent out the following official info about Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays: All academic holidays will be observed according to General Catalog, i.e., Thanksgiving from 10 p.m. Nov. 26 to 8 a.m. Dec. 1 and Christmas 10 p.m. Dec. 19 to 8 a.m. Jan. 5.

Administrative and general offices will be on the following schedule: Thanksgiving, offices closed from 5 p.m. Nov. 26 to 8 a.m. Nov. 28; Christmas, closed noon Dec. 24 until 8 a.m. Dec. 29; New Year's closed 5 p.m. Dec. 31 until 8 a.m. Jan. 2.

"Believing that those staff members who may want to plan trips would prefer to do so at Christmas time rather than New Year's, the Administrative Committee has alotted a longer holiday period then and closing the offices only for one day at New Year's," Dr. Lindley pointed out.

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PRIZES OFFERED FOR ADDITIONAL SCHOOL SONGS

A prize competition for TCU school songs in addition to the present Alma Mater and Fight Song has been announced this week by President Sadler. Rules are as follows:

- 1. A prize of \$300 for a TCU song will be awarded to a winner in each of the following categories:
 - a. Presently enrolled TCU graduate or undergraduate students
 - b. TCU exes
 - c. TCU faculty or professional musicians.
- 2. To be eligible for the complete value of the award, a school song must have a lyric appropriate for TCU, and the music.
- 3. The contest will close at midnight Feb. 28, 1959. Entries must be postmarked or delivered by hand prior to that date.
- 4. A manuscript should be signed by the composer or composers and be accompanied by a brief identifying sketch to justify the category through which the contestant is entered.
- 5. Any number of compositions may be entered by each contestant. If two or more persons cooperate on a lyric and/or the music, the \$300 prize will be distributed according to their agreement among themselves, providing their composition receives the award.
- 6. The judges reserve the right to withhold an award if, in their opinion, no deserving work is received in a particular category.
- 7. Manuscripts should be sent to Dr. Michael Winesanker, Chairman of the Music Department, TCU, Fort Worth 9, Texas.
- 8. The prize-winning songs, along with the TCU Alma Mater and Fight Song, will be recorded for a special TCU long-playing record to be released in 1959.
- 9. Entrants are urged to keep copies of their manuscripts since the ones submitted cannot be returned to their composers.
- 10. If this experiment proves successful in securing three additional good songs for TCU, other experiments may be attempted to secure additional fight songs and marches.
