PARENTS' DAY WELCOMES 3000!

TCU rolled out the red carpet for some 3000 parents Saturday to mark the largest Parents' Day attendance in the event's history. In charge of the student planning committee, which did an excellent job all around, was Senior Betty Taylor of Roswell, N. M.

Parents who arrived Friday witnessed a torchlight parade and pep rally at which TCU President M. E. Sadler called the TCU-Texas score within 2 points (as you may have heard, it was 22-8; he prophesied 21-7!).

Nearly 1300 parents registered at the coffee Saturday morning. Dormitory open houses after the game overflowed with visitors. And the banquet was sold out days in advance. Dr. O. James Sowell, executive director of university development, was banquet speaker.

The plaque for traveling the farthest distance to attend Parents' Day was won by Mrs. C. H. Wilson who came 1365 miles by air from Havana, Cuba. She's the mother of TCU freshman Carol Wilson.

The student planning committee wishes to express its thanks to all faculty and staff members for their cooperation in making Parents' Day such a success.

SOUTHERN FELLOWSHIP FUND SUMMER GRANTS

TCU is permitted to nominate two persons to receive grants-in-aid for summer study in 1959 from the Southern Fellowship Fund. Applications must be made by Dec. 10.

Applicants should be pre-doctoral candidates and must have completed most of the courses and residence requirements for doctoral candidacy; have a "carefully formulated plan of study or research which can be carried out during a summer period of at least six weeks at an appropriate institution, in the south or elsewhere;" and have taken or arrange to take the Graduate Record Examination (Aptitude Test and Advance Test in field).


