\$92,400 GRANT FOR SUMMER SCIENCE INSTITUTE

A \$92,400 grant has been received by TCU from the National Science Foundation to conduct a Summer Institute for Senior High School Teachers of Science and Mathematics. Dr. Joseph Morgan, chairman of the physics department, will be director of the Summer Institute, which will be held on campus starting around June 8.

Course work on the graduate-seminar level will be offered in four fields: physics, mathematics, biology and chemistry.

TCU's weekly television program, Telerama, will begin a new series of three shows on the theatre. Saturday morning's program (at 11:30 a.m., over Channel 11, KFJZ-TV) will be on "Costuming," with Cleve Haubold discussing the secrets and tricks of the costumer's trade, including a survey of fashion through the ages and a word on those "quick-change" costumes.


Dear Colleague:
