Your letter of December 1 has been received during Mr. Carter's absence from the city. I don't know how you missed him at the Stork Club as he has been in New York a week and I am sure visited the club practically every night.

Your comment that T. C. U. had a bad team is very considerate as we had absolutely nothing and won only one game -- Arkansas. As you know, the school is very small and at best has little material from which to build a football squad and all that Dutch Meyer had was called into the service, eleven at one time; and he didn't even have good high school players. Anyway, maybe when the war is over, we will have another team to brag about.

Mr. Carter hears from his son, Amon Junior every four or five weeks and although he has lost 40 pounds and only receives two meals a day, the tone of his letters indicates that he is in good spirits and is making the best of his situation. He is in a camp in Poland and they are having severe winter weather now, so I imagine without sufficient clothing, heat and food, it is pretty tough going, yet he doesn't make any complaint.

Your letter shall be brought to Mr. Carter's attention when he returns and I am sure he will appreciate your writing him.
