

ROGERS SHRINE COMMITTEE CHOSEN

OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 12
Scores of friends of the late Will Rogers today were being notified of their selection for a national commission to prepare a memorial for the noted Oklahoma humorist.

Among those chosen by Gov. E. W. Marland for the commission were outstanding leaders in varied spheres of public life. The movement for a Rogers memorial was started shortly after he crashed to death with Wiley Post, 'round-the-world flier, in Alaska.

Marland believed memorials would be erected in Hollywood, Oklahoma City and Claremore, Okla. Members selected for the commission included:

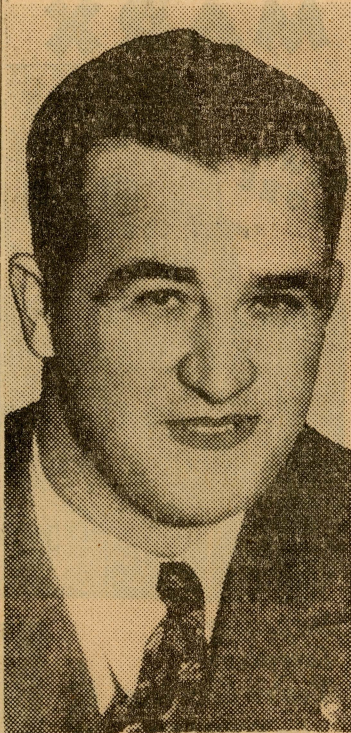

Blimp Refueled While in the Air

MOSCOW (I.N.S.).—Fuelling a dirigible in flight is the latest aerial experiment made here. The old airship V-1, recently constructed, has been fitted with an apparatus with which it can pick up tanks of gasoline from the ground, while itself at a height of from 120 to 150 feet.

In a recent test, the dirigible took aboard enough fuel to last for 13 hours. The same apparatus can be used to load and unload cargo, without landing or stopping the ship, it is claimed.

U. S. USES NEW LAW TO CHECK SMUGGLING

Sharp growth of rum row activities off the East Coast yesterday prompted the Government to invoke the new anti smuggling act by which President Roosevelt is establishing so-called "smuggling zones."

Two secret Executive orders creating zones 50 miles out to sea from New York city harbor and the New Jersey coast area including Atlantic City, were signed by President Roosevelt and will be announced next week.

Other Orders Due

Other orders, due to new ocean going rum laden steamers appearing off the New England coast are being prepared and are to be signed by President Roosevelt. The Coast Guard yesterday was preparing to enforce the orders getting reinforcements in boats and men.

The Coast Guard reported a new foreign rum row steamer had appeared off Montauk Point, the eastern tip of Long Island, N. Y., and that five speedy vessels had joined it evidently for the purpose of bringing smuggled liquor ashore.

Eight Coast Guard vessels were ordered from the New London, Conn., base, and are trailing the foreign ship and its convoy, headquarters reported. All are staying out of the 12-mile treaty limit. Under the new anti smuggling law, however, the Coast Guard has a right to halt and board a American registered boats operating in the liquor smuggling racket outside the treaty limit.

40 Vessels Spotted

Approximately 40 vessels carrying as much as 25,000 cases of liquor each have been spotted by the Coast Guard. Officers believe there is a rush to get as much smuggled liquor ashore as possible before President Roosevelt issues other orders blanketing the New England coast with "smuggling zones."

Coast Guard officials estimate the Government would lose a million dollars in liquor import duties and internal revenue if the two score rum row were successful in landing cargoes.

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
