

YOUNG WOMEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION PREPARING FOR CAMPAIGN TO RAISE \$1,000

Budget for Year Calls for Expenditure of \$1,125--Organization Very Active This Year.

Plans for raising a fund of \$1,000 for financing the work of the Young Women's Christian Association for the year were formulated at a recent meeting of the cabinet, and the project is being given publicity with a view to launching the campaign at once, according to Miss Lorraine Sherley, president of the organization. The money will be put immediately into the maintenance fund of the association.

It is estimated by the various chairmen of committees that a thousand dollars will just cover the budget for the year. The budget was made out and presented at the last meeting of the cabinet. It is based on the expenditures of the committees of last year, allowing, of course, for the increased cost of certain materials and the widened scope of the work of the young women this year. The estimate was reached after each committee chairman had submitted to the treasurer her needs for the work in her department. Following is the budget:

Estimated expenditures:

Administration (postage, stationery, printed supplies), \$30; Program Committee (outside speakers, expressage, foreign trunk slides), \$10.00; Social Service Committee, \$100.00; Social Committee, \$75.00; Conference Fund, \$250.00; publicity (poster's Association Monthly 2 copies, bulletin board), \$15.00; World Fellowship, \$150.00; Bible, \$20.00; House and Room Committee, \$475.00. Total expenditure, \$1,125.00.

Estimated Receipts (membership dues), \$125.00.

Amount yet needed, \$1,000.

That the Young Women's Christian Association is without exception the most active organization of the school is recognized by every observing person. Under the able and energetic leadership of its president, Miss Sherley, the organization is undertaking and putting over projects at which the average group of individuals would shy. The young ladies recently won the gratitude of all the city students and the admiration of everyone else by fitting up the rest room on the north wing of the main building with elegant furniture, making it a delight to the eye as well as an enticing resort from the standpoint of comfort. In many other ways, too, the Y. W. C. A. is making itself a factor for the uplift and spiritual welfare of the school, especially on the co-educational side of the campus.

The campaign is expected to begin early next week. Miss Margaret Stuckert, treasurer for the drive, declares that no time will be lost in bringing the matter before the student body. Miss Stuckert is confident that the workers will encounter little difficulty in pledging the amount of the budget without delay. It is understood that the pledges are redeemable at any time between now and February, 1921.

BAPTISTS VISIT LOCAL STUDENT VOLUNTEERS

Considerable impetus was given missionary activities in T. C. U. Thursday evening, when the local Student Volunteer Band was visited by the band from the Southwestern Baptist Seminary at Seminary Hill. The T. C. 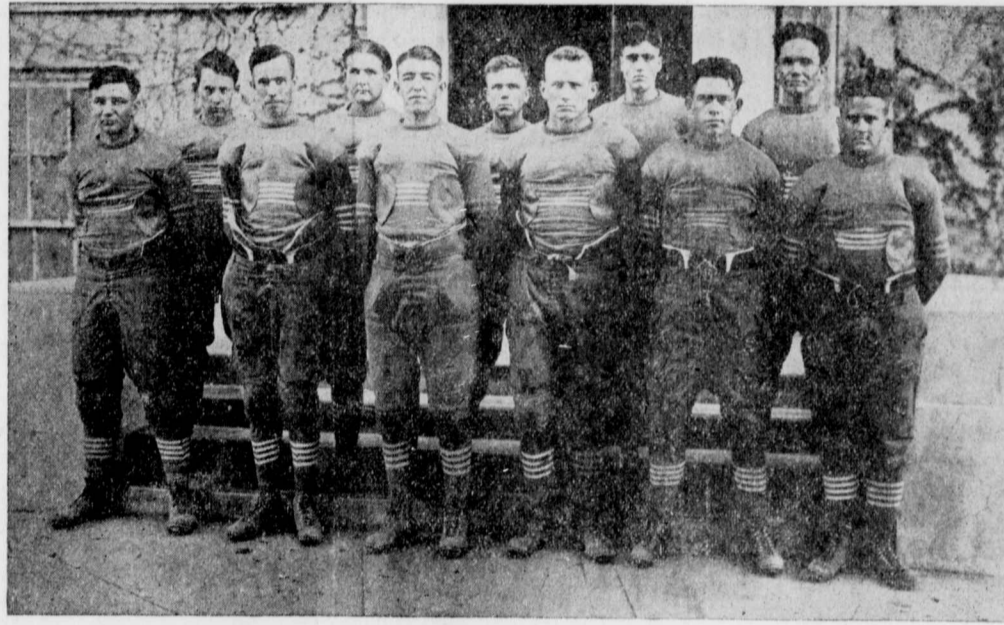

Initial Clash Will Take Place Monday, Fish Versus Uppers.

Purple and white sweaters with the year number of the class sewed on the front will be awarded to members of the winning combination in the class football set-tees to be held in the next week or two weeks. The first game is to be played Monday, Dec. 8, between the Freshmen and the Junior-Senior crew, and promises to be an interesting affair. On the next day the Academy boys will buck up against the Sophomores. The losers in these two events are to meet on the following Monday, Dec. 13, and the winners of the two preliminary contests will battle for all-T. C. U. championship on Tuesday, Dec. 14. The battles will serve a double purpose. These inter class games will not only serve to build up a wholesome class spirit and furnish a lot of entertainment during the otherwise dull period between the football and basketball seasons, but will give the coaches an opportunity to discover any green material that might happen to be lying dormant in the T. C. U. student body, and needs only a little coaching to develop into Varsity caliber. At the end of the season the coaches will select an all-class eleven, each member of which will be awarded a gold football, thereby rewarding individual proficiency in the game.

A total of about eighty men answered the initial call early last week, and some pretty likely material is being shown in the preliminary practicing of the squads on the campus. The whole school is agog with the spirit of friendly class rivalry, and arrangements are being made by the different classes with the aim of outshining the other classes in the rooting as well as in the game, as everybody thinks that his team is going to win the title. Varsity men are not being allowed to participate, but they are demonstrating their patriotism by coaching their respective class squads. Big Pete Fulcher is coaching the Freshman line, while Cherry is working the back field men. McAfee, captain and quarterback of the Pollywog team, is serving in the same capacities for the Freshmen. "Puge" Cross is running the squad representing the Sophomores, from the quarterback position, while Stephenson is captain. Douglass is drilling the Senior-Junior aggregation in football formations, and they expect to develop a good team by the time they meet the Freshmen in the opening game. Rowson has taken charge of the Academy squad, and reports a promising outlook.

MEN'S GLEE CLUB GETTING IN CONDITION

When the Men's Glee Club leaves for its tour after the Christmas holidays, it will be better prepared than ever before to give a first class entertainment, according to an announcement coming from the College of Fine Arts. Dan Baker, teacher of voice and director of the club, is working overtime whipping the men into condition, and reports gratifying progress.

The organization has a splendid nucleus of old and experienced glee club men, and to this has been added a number of excellent new voices. The club will be composed of about sixteen selected men who will constitute the personnel on the tour. Mr. Baker

will take along an orchestra, for which T. C. U. is already famous, and a jazz band. He is expecting to introduce considerable novelty into the program, doing away in large measure with the staid performance of the average glee club.

The first performance of the male aggregation will be given on the University stage, December 17, and Mr. Baker expects to have an excellent program worked up by that time. The program will consist of a variety of popular numbers, seasoned with several selections of a heavier nature, such as the Barcarolle from "Tales of Hoffman," an opera which was played recently in Dallas by the San Carlo opera company. "Sorter Miss You," is expected to score a hit, and humorous numbers, such as "Go Ask Papa" and "She Felt of Her Belt at the Back," will add variety to the repertoire.

The announcement that a male quartet will accompany the club is also of interest. It is composed of Haire, first tenor; McFarland, second tenor; Douglas, baritone, and Dudney, bass.

EXCHANGES.

Texas A. & M. College, which won first place in the International Livestock Judging contest held in Chicago last year, was placed ninth this year. Purdue took first honors, with Iowa second.

George Gipp, the star half-back of Notre Dame's undefeated aggregation, was injured in the contest with Northwestern University, and was unable to enter the Thanksgiving game. As usual, Notre Dame has a very strong team, and challenges Ohio State's claim to having the best team in the west. In nearly every season Notre Dame has the fastest out-of-the-conference eleven.

The statement made early in 1920 that the University of California has the largest number of students in the United States, has been verified by the Registrar of the University of the City of New York. The University of Michigan stands second, and Columbia third. California U. has more than eleven thousand students.

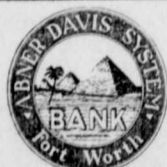

**INTEREST NOW
ON OLD MEN'S**

Interest which for the most part has settled upon football this term has, with the successful completion of the grid season, been transferred to other activities, not the least of which is the Old Men's Declamatory Contest, the date of which has been set for Friday, December 10. The event is an inter-society meet between the Shirley and Add-Ran Literary societies, and is an annual affair. It is always marked with the most enthusiastic society spirit. Last year, first and third places in the contest were won by the Add-Ran society, and second place was won by the Shirleys.

The Shirley society held its preliminary tryout Wednesday evening and selected a team composed of Blalock, Dudney, and Ligon to represent the organization in the Old Men's; Blalock is recognized as one of the best speakers in T. C. U., having won laurels in declamation and intercollegiate debate repeatedly. The Add-Rans have not yet selected their team, but are said to have some good material. The event promises to be one of the closest of its kind ever held.

**SQUAD WORKING
AT BASKETBALL**

The football squad is spanning the gap between its Thanksgiving success and the New Year's day battle with the Centre College Praying Colonels by daily workouts on the basketball open for practice. The basket ball season doesn't start until the first of February, active interest is beginning to be shown in it, and a large squad of material is expected to answer the first call for practice. The basketball schedule will be arranged at the T. I. A. A. conference to be held in Dallas January 9. Varsity men of yore who will try out for the Purple and White quintet include "Dutch" Meyer, Haire, Douglass and Council. These men will serve as a nucleus around which Coach Driver will develop his combination. Other men who have won laurels on other courts will turn out for practice, and a combination will result which, it is not too much to expect, will uphold the records established by last year's baseball nine, and this season's victorious football machine.

The Society for American Field Service Fellowships for French Universities will offer for open competition among graduates of American Universities fellowships to the amount of ten thousand francs for the purpose of encouraging advance study and research in French universities during the year 1921-1922. The number of fellowships is limited to twenty-five, but the advanced study may be in any department of learning.

Georgie Tech has instituted a co-operative course modeled after the ones in operation at the University of Cincinnati and the municipal vocational school at Akron, Ohio. This course is a system for training engineers whereby they can earn their way and at the same time gain the technical education. The students are divided into halves, one of which works in the industrial plants of the respective communities gaining practical knowledge, while the other half attends classes and laboratories,

ception held in the State Capitol. Those who didn't care to partake in the dancing were entertained

in the Senate Chamber. The visiting cadets from A. & M. were guests at the celebration.

and alternating every two weeks. The advocates of this plan claim that this is not only

a more economic system, but that it turns out more efficient engineers.

**A. & M. WILL
TRAIN AVIATORS.**

College Station: Major Clinton Russell recently commanding officer of Barron Field at Fort Worth who has been assigned to the A. and M. College of Texas to head the air service unit of the reserve officers' training corps, is expected to arrive here in a few days to begin the work of establishing the unit at this college.

Major Russell will be assistant professor of military science and tactics under Major L. R. Dougherty, and for the present will be the only officer in the air service unit. However, as soon as the equipment has been ordered and received at least one other regular army officer and two non-commissioned officers will be detailed here to assist him in the work and giving instruction in flying.

A. and M. College of Texas is the only school in the South to receive an air service unit of the R. O. T. C. by recent order of the war department and there are only four others in the United States to be so distinguished, these being the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, University of Illinois, University of California and University of Washington, the four largest schools in the whole country. The fact that A. and M. is one of this group of prominent institutions picked to give instruction in aeronautics is very gratifying to the authorities here. President Bizzell considers it as the most fitting recognition that could be paid to A. and M. by the war department, and as an example of the importance it has among other higher institutions of learning with the war department.

This makes five units of the R. O. T. C. for this college, which is the largest number in the United States.

Dr. Bizzell states that the instruction will be restricted to ground training and the summer camps will give the instruction in flying. The addition of this unit will increase the military equipment at the college approximately \$200,000. Just what this equipment will consist of will be known as soon as Major Russell arrives and makes his requisition from the war department.

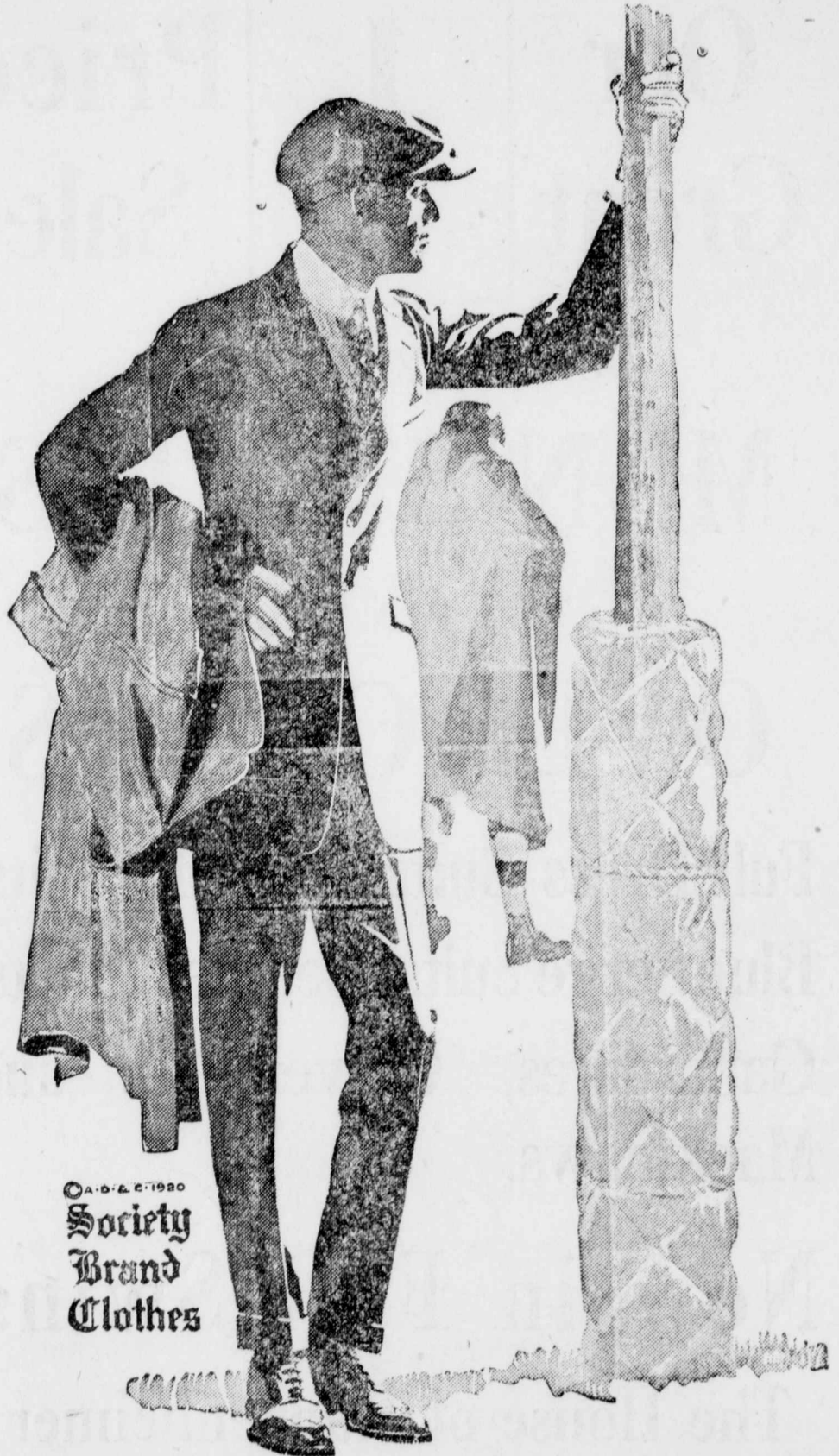
