Following my previous conversation with you regarding the matter of the distribution of American Airlines stock, I called Walter McLucas and asked him to send me the names of his particular brokerage friends in Detroit with the hope that you might be able to favor them with a share of the distribution when it does take place. No doubt your arrangements covering this matter have already been planned and the chances are that most of these dealers in Detroit are already on the list; however, I am taking the liberty of sending it along to you.

I am sorry to have disturbed you so early in the morning, especially Mrs. Emanuel. However, I realize it is almost impossible to reach you during the day and as the matter was of extreme importance to me, I took the liberty of calling you at home earlier probably than I should have.

I read in the paper this morning where the C.A.B. has asked the Aviation Corporation to reduce its stock holdings in the American to four per cent. I presume this is in keeping with what you had expected.
