Thirty-Five File for Wednesday Election

Nine Types of Events Scheduled On Summer Recreation Program

Activity Booked for Each Tuesday, Thursday; TCU History Presentation, Dance to Be Features; Wednesday Afternoon Set Aside for Swimming

Nine different types of events have been scheduled for the summer recreation program under the direction of Miss Kitty Wingo of the physical education department, aided by Miss Bonnie Enlow, of the Faculty Social Committee, and J. W. ("Red") Brothers, president of the student body.

Included in the events are dancing, swimming, movies, concerts, volleyball and soft ball, stunt night, and a 75th Anniversary history of T. C. U.

Highlighting the schedule will be the Seventy-fifth Anniversary history of T. C. U. to be given June 29 and an open-air dance to be given on the tennis courts July 1.

Each Wednesday afternoon has been set aside for swimming. Student swimming hours are from 3 to 4 o'clock while faculty members may swim from 4 to 5 o'clock.

A movie of the recent T. C. U.-S. M. U. football game will be shown June 22. The site of the showing will be announced later.

Dean T. Smith McCorkle, dean of Fine Arts, will stage a band concert as a tie-in with the band clinic. Date of the concert has been set for June 24.

Softball and volleyball will take the spotlight July 8 when the faculty men meet the girls in a softball game and the faculty men get together with the boys in a volleyball game.

A square and old-fashioned dance will be given on the tennis courts July 13.

Thursday, July 15, which will bring to a close the recreation program has been set aside for stunt night. Each department and each dormitory will be responsible for one stunt.

The committee sponsored a "Sports Nite" Thursday which featured swimming, ping-pong, shuffleboard and badminton. It was the second social event of the (Continued on Page 2)

Ben Hearn, John Shirley Seek Top Student Body Post

Nine Candidates Compete for Three Upperclass Representative Positions — Abshire, Pierson, Beach, Cook Run for Student Body Vice-President

Thirty-five candidates filed petitions for 22 student body offices before the deadline, midnight Wednesday. With at least two candidates competing in each of the four Student Body Officer races, and with applicants for 18 other offices, competition will be unusually keen in the summer election to be held next Wednesday.

Petitions for upperclass representatives led the list with nine candidates competing for three upperclass posts. Seven students filed for six lowerclass representative positions, and four are seeking election as student body vice-president.

There are two candidates each for student body president, secretary and treasurer.

Candidates were required to meet yesterday afternoon in the Student Body Office, where election rules and procedure were explained. Eligibility of the petitioners will be confirmed prior to preparation of the ballots for next Wednesday's vote.

The four student Council members remaining from last semester, who were to form the election committee, are candidates for summer offices; therefore, arrangements for a new committee will be made.

No petitions were filed for vice-president, secretary and treasurer of the individual classes, although it was announced in The Skiff last week that these offices were to be filled. It is assumed that the individual classes will hold "private" elections to fill these posts at a later date.

Thirsty Students Will Get Relief From "Drought"

Many students, particularly those living in the dormitories, have often complained about the difficulty of obtaining sufficient water pressure for drinks, baths, or other uses from about 3 p. m. to early evening.

The "why" of this situation and a hope that it might be remedied in the not too distant future were revealed this week by L. L. Dees, superintendent of buildings.

The T. C. U. area has grown so rapidly that water mains to "the Hill" have been inadequate for carrying enough to meet peak demands in lawn watering season, he explained. But a new water main is now being installed on Berry Street, he added, and pointed out that it should provide a source of supply equal to the demands so that sufficient water pressure can be had at all times.

To Re-engage West Point Foes—

T. C. U. Planning to Conduct Recorded Debate Tournament

A debate tournament "in absentia," first of its kind ever to be held, will be conducted next November by the T. C. U. speech department when the 16 top ranking debate teams of the nation will compete in a pre-seasonal national tournament, and yet be hundreds

of miles apart at the time the actual debate takes place.

The tournament will be composed entirely of recorded debates by 16 of the 34 teams who competed in the West Point Debate Tournament last April. The T. C. U. team originally expected to win the West Point meet, placed fifth. In a previous tournament, the T. C. U. team had defeated N. T. S. T. C., the West Point champions.

According to present plans for the recorded tournament, originally drawn up by Dr. E. L. Pross of the University speech department, each participating school will record three negative and three affirmative cases for each debate.

Summer Vets Number 1209

More than 1209 veterans are in school this summer. Dr. Thomas F. Richardson, coordinator of veteran's affairs, reported this week in revealing two announcements for the group.

Veterans who wish to file claims for additional dependents and receive more pay under the new law, Dr. Richardson stated, must have these in his office before July 1, otherwise there may be difficulty in getting the raise.

He also warned veterans to follow regular procedure in dropping courses. The student has not dropped a course by not attending class and the V. A. is getting more strict on drop rules, he added.

Harvard, NYU Among 1200 Buying "History of TCU"

Harvard, Princeton and New York University are among the 1200 purchasers of Dean Colby D. Hall's book, "History of Texas Christian University." These schools along with nine others bought the book for use in their libraries, reports Noel E. Keith, chairman of the university press committee.

6 Flying Frogs to Compete In National Meet Tomorrow

Six members of the undefeated Flying Frogs left this morning aboard an Army C-47 bound for the National Intercollegiate Flying Meet at Ann Arbor, Mich., where the group hopes to capture the first national title for T.C.U. since 1938's great football team

Campus workmen started tearing down the Arbor, which has connected Jarvis Hall and the Administration Building, on Tuesday. Reasons given for its demolition were that the vines were beginning to die and that it has become a trash catcher.

To avoid the "naked" feeling which those familiar with the campus will get as they view the to-be empty space between Jarvis and the Administration Building, plans are being considered for building a similar arbor in the future. Only definite action now on the schedule, however, is the destruction of the present Arbor.

Mrs. Eckols, a member of the Library staff for the past seven years, is a 1940 graduate of T.C.U.

Shaw, Wendt Are Repeaters—

5 Win Drum Majorette Positions With Band for 1948-'49

Nina Shaw, Fort Worth sophomore, and Nancy Wendt, Alice, freshman, drum majorettes from last year are among five girls named this week to front the T. C. U. band next year, Band Director Leonard Breeden has announced. Three high school girls who will enter T. C. U. in the fall will complete the ranks, he added.

Misses Shaw and Wendt; June White, Bowie; Gloria Gibbons, Marshall; and Martha Ann Swain, Houston, were chosen from among

11 candidates from 10 Texas cities who competed in try outs over a period of three weeks on the T. C. U. campus, Breeden said. Darlene Boren, Uvalde, was named alternate majorette.

Breeden and F. R. ("Woody") Woodward, Odessa, drum major, judged the candidates and the winners were selected on the basis of twirling ability, scholastic record and general fitness for the T. C. U. band program.

The three new members have been majorettes of their high

school bands, and have won various awards in high school competitions.

Miss White, winner of 11 medals, was selected as "Drum Majorette of 1947" by the School Musician, national music magazine, and named by Drum Major Magazine as "Drum Majorette of the Month" in July, 1947. She has won six first division honors, and has been champion of contests at Wichita Falls, Waurika, Okla., and Sam Houston Teachers College.

Miss Swain boasts a straight

"A" high school record in addition to her twirling laurels. She is possessor of one of the few first class twirling certificates ever awarded by Chicago's Vandercook School of Music, and is an advanced graduate of Hackney Twirling School.

Head majorette of the Marshall High School band in 1947-'48, Miss Gibbons won first division in twirling contests at Nacogdoches and Longview. Miss Boren also won first division in twirling contests in 1947 and 1948, and has taught twirling classes.

An affirmative team will record its first speech and send it to a negative team. The negative team will hear the recording, record its reply and return it via air mail to the affirmative team. Following this same pattern, the second speeches and the rebuttals will be made.

When the debate is completed, the recordings will be sent to a neutral judge for a decision and for a rating of the individual debaters.

Of the 16 teams entered in the meet, eight will be chosen to participate in the quarter-final round. From the quarter-final teams, four will be chosen for the semi-finals, and from those the two finalists.

Dr. Pross says he hopes that arrangements can be made for the two top ranking teams to broadcast the final round from their respective home towns over a national radio network. If arrangements are made, the program will be conducted somewhat on the order of the "Quiz of Two Cities."

The tournament, called the "Pre-seasonal National Recorded Debate Tournament," is expected to be completed by the first of 1949, according to Dr. Pross. The only cost to the schools will be \$2 entrance fee to be used to purchase prizes and the cost of the recording blanks used in recording the debates.

Says Dr. Pross of the tournament, "It is a great opportunity for the competing schools to compare debate cases before the official debate season begins. Much should be gained from the comparisons and the plan should provide well-prepared teams for the regular debate season."

'Religious Math' Gives Students Double Course

Have you ever gone to a math class which the teacher opened with a prayer and closed with scripture reading? If not, then sit in on one of the classes taught by Joseph V. West.

A student at the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, he teaches here in the day classes and also in Evening College.

Faculty Adds 3 Members

Colquitt, Agee, Clay Will Assume Math, Journalism, Government Posts in Fall

Three new faculty members—one each for the departments of mathematics, journalism and government—have been added to the teaching staff, according to President M. E. Sadler. Two of the new faculty members are T. C. U. exes. All three will assume teaching duties in September.

Landon A. Colquitt, A. B. '39, who will receive his Ph. D. degree from Ohio State University in June, will become assistant professor of mathematics upon his arrival on the campus next fall. A 1935 graduate of Paschal High School, Mr. Colquitt received his A. M. degree from Ohio State two years after graduating from T. C. U., where he held a triple major in English, math and physics.

His schooling was interrupted in 1941 when he entered the Air Force as a meteorologist. His tour of duty included service in the European theater, after which he returned to Ohio State to complete his work on the doctor's degree.

At one time a candidate for the Rhodes Scholarship, Mr. Colquitt now holds a teaching fellowship at the Ohio University. Upon his return to his hometown of Fort Worth, he will reside with his mother, Mrs. M. L. Colquitt, 2124 Fairmount.

Warren K. Agee, A. B. '37, will become the first additional full-time teacher in the history of the department of journalism. A 1933 graduate of Paschal High, Mr. Agee graduated cum laude from T. C. U. in 1937. Since then, with the exception of a three-year tour of duty with the United States Coast guard, he has served as reporter for the Star-Telegram.

While at T. C. U. he was a member of Sigma Tau Delta, Alpha Chi, and the Dana (now J. Willard Ridings) Press Club. In 1936, he was awarded the Fort Worth Press journalism award, and served as student assistant in the journalism department in 1936-37.

A member of Sigma Delta Chi, professional newspaper men's fraternity, Mr. Agee won the first annual Sigma Delta Chi award of \$100 for his excellence in reporting in 1937.

Dr. Comer Clay of Austin is the third person added to the faculty. In September, he will become assistant professor in the department of government. Now at Austin as student and instructor in government in the University of Texas, Mr. Clay expects to receive his Ph. D. degree in August.

This test is the standard test given in 45 states and the District of Columbia, and is 19 hours long. The examination was taken by about 300 people in Texas and only about one-third of the candidates are expected to complete it successfully.
