

Widow, Five Sons Present

Celebrities Are Gathered For W. R. Hearst Funeral

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 17 (AP). Final tribute is being paid Friday to William Randolph Hearst, the millionaire miner's son who founded one of the greatest publishing domains the world has ever known.

Public funeral services for the 88-year-old publisher were scheduled in Grace Episcopal Cathedral, atop Nob Hill, a few blocks from his birthplace.

As he stipulated before death, he will be buried in Cypress Lawn Cemetery near the tombs of his parents, former U. S. Senator George Hearst and Phoebe Apperson Hearst.

Scores of friends and distinguished persons began arriving here as early as Thursday for the funeral.

Messages of condolence arrived by the hundreds for his widow, Mrs. Millicent Wilson Hearst, from whom he long was separated, and his five sons.

Four of the latter—George, William Randolph Jr., Randolph and David—were with their father when he died in Beverly Hills Tuesday. The fifth, John,

flew here from New York with his mother.

MANSION IS CLAIMED FOR MARION DAVIES.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 17 (AP). An attorney for former Actress Marion Davies says that she owns the Beverly Hills mansion where Publisher William Randolph Hearst died last Tuesday.

A. Lawrence Mitchell, the lawyer, made the disclosure Thursday in explanation of a codicil in the publisher's will that bequeathed the residence to Miss Davies, his long time friend and business associate, and another codicil revoking it.

Miss Davies purchased the residence under her legal name, Marion Douras, in 1946, county records disclose. She decided it to Hearst six weeks later. The indicated value was \$120,000.

Mitchell said Hearst returned the deed to the residence to Miss Davies in 1948. County records indicate Hearst still is the owner but Mitchell said it was not necessary that the transaction be recorded, since it was a gift. The codicil revoking the bequest to Miss Davies was drawn after she had been given the deed, the attorney claimed.

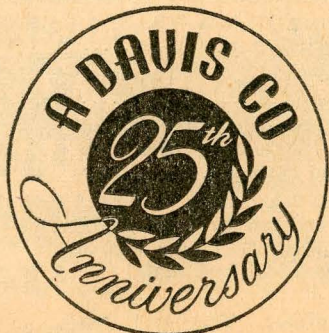
