

Eisenhower Here to Lead In Unveiling

Public to View Statue,
Portrait of Rogers
At Ceremony Today

The general with the GI touch is here to help pay homage to the humorist-philosopher who was everybody's next-door neighbor.

The five-star Army chief of staff, Dwight D. Eisenhower, came to Fort Worth especially to unveil a life-size statue and portrait of the beloved Will Rogers.

Accompanied by Mrs. Eisenhower and his aide, Maj. Robert L. Schulz, the Texas-born general arrived on the Santa Fe's Ranger at 10:10 p. m. Monday.

Greeted by Carter.

General and Mrs. Eisenhower were greeted by Amon Carter, officially, and several hundred admirers of the famous general, unofficially.

Cries of "Hi, Ike" increased the size of the well-known Eisenhower smile as the general followed his wife from the train.

He answered the calls with a ready "hello," posed with Mrs. Eisenhower at photographers' requests, signed some autographs and shook some hands thrust at him.

The general's wish that he be treated as a private citizen was responsible for the fact an official delegation wasn't at the station for his arrival.

Whisked Away.

So, with little more than an exchange of handclaps and initial greetings, the visitors were whisked to the Fort Worth Club where they spent the night.

Easing the party through the traffic were four war-veteran members of the police motorcycle division, V. U. King, R. I. Evans, W. R. Shockley and J. C. Parrish, who volunteered for the duty.

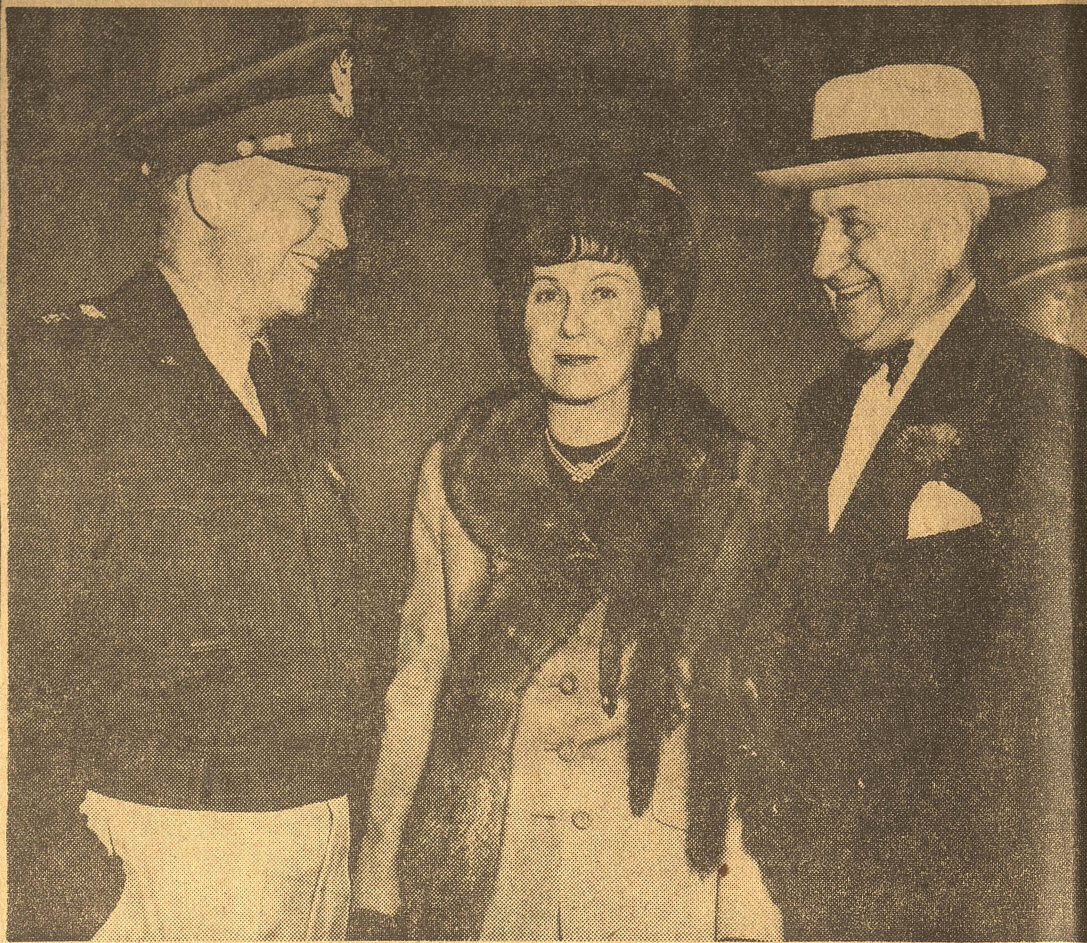
The dedication ceremony in front of the municipal coliseum and auditorium named in honor of Rogers will take place at 3 p. m. Tuesday. The speaker's stand is constructed in an arc adjacent to the bronze statue at the front of the memorial grounds. West Lancaster will be closed to traffic to provide additional space for the public to see the ceremony.

After unveiling of the statue, the work of Electra Waggoner Biggs of Fort Worth, Vernon and New York, the ceremony will shift to the coliseum foyer where the general will unveil the painting, by Seymour M. Stone of New York.

Lanham to Preside.

Former Congressman Fritz Lanham will preside. Rev. James K. Thompson will give the invocation, Miss Margaret Truman, daughter of the president, who arrived here Sunday, will sing Rogers' favorite song, "Home on the Range." Introduction of special guests will precede presenta-

Special Tax Study Group Offers 46 Major Changes

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3 (AP).—Controversy developed Monday within a 10-man special tax study committee which Tuesday is expected to recommend a general revision of federal taxes to the House ways and means committee.

A majority of the group, it is understood, will recommend 46 major changes in tax laws, 33 of them affecting individual income levies.

Reports circulated on Capitol Hill that AFL Vice President Matthew Woll, labor's member of the

committee, will file a minority report contending that the majority proposals would:

Shift the tax load from those best able to pay to those least able to pay.

Disregard revenue needs for European aid.

Severely reduce federal revenues.

It is understood the other committeemen will sign the majority report.

The study group was set up by the ways and means committee, with Roswell Magill, New York lawyer, as chairman.

Magill was an assistant treasury secretary during the early administration of Franklin D. Roosevelt. He supported the \$4,000,000,000 tax cutting bill which President Truman stopped twice with vetoes earlier this year.

Both the majority and minority reports will be made public Tuesday when they are filed with the House committee as it resumed its studies looking toward general revision of tax laws.

This study is separate from the announced plan of Chairman Knutson of Minnesota to press again for a \$4,000,000,000 slash in federal income taxes immediately upon the return of Congress Nov. 17.

Knutson informed newspapermen Sunday the recommendation

WIDE AREA CLEAR FOR DEDICATION

All others—as many as the large area can accommodate—who may not be able to witness the ceremony, can hear it through the amplification system that has been installed.
