I appreciate, as well as do Amon, Jr., and Ruth, your nice letters in acknowledgment of the Centennial covers from Gonzales on March 2nd. The youngsters started collecting stamps and I have become addicted to the idea. It is a lot of pleasure. I just wrote Jim Farley that I had spent a few thousand dollars with him in buying stamps from our good Government which would never be cancelled. I am anxious sometime for an opportunity of seeing your collection.
