So far the group interested in personal has no chairman. Mrs. C. R. Sherer, one of the faculty advisors of the "Y", will assist this group.

Plans are being made for a George Washington tea to be held in Jarvis Hall Sunday afternoon, Feb. 23, from 4 until 5 o'clock. The entire school will be invited. Those on the committee for plans for the tea are Misses Dorothy Chaney, Dorothy Pope, Jeanne Horsley, Elizabeth Rice and Lamorne Lawrence.

Plans are being made by Miss Boggess for a retreat to be held at Lake Worth. This will be probably during the last of March. Definite plans will be made and a committee will be appointed later.

The new Y. W. C. A. officers, who will be elected later in the spring, will meet with the officers of the "Y" of T. W. C. and have cabinet training.

According to Miss Boggess, the "Y" plans to have a joint picnic with the group from T. W. C. later in the year. This will be held in Forest Park.

Elbert Haling Tunes in on New York-London Conversation.

Overhearing a two-way radio telephone conversation between a young woman in New York and a man in London, England, on a wave length of 60 meters was the novel experience of Elbert Haling, T. C. U. student, last week.

No difficulty was experienced in receiving the New York station but the London transmitter was barely audible with Haling's two-tube short-wave receiver. The transmission was in the nature of an experiment and lasted nearly an hour with comparisons of the time, weather and distance between the two speakers being made. The Englishman said he would send the girl his photo and card in confirmation of the communication.

Haling, who resides at 1621 South Jennings and operates his station from there, has been in the amateur radio game about eight years and is licensed by the government as W5HY.

Cy Leland Tells New York Race
Experiences in Wire to Skiff

RICHMOND, Ind., Feb. 10.—I am writing this on the train between Washington and St. Louis in order to insure its getting into the Skiff this week. I left New York immediately after the meet and spent all day Sunday in Washington. There were several novel features of the twenty-third annual Millrose games. One of these was that it started exactly at 8 o'clock. This is one of the few meets in the country that delays the opening gun for no one.

The games were very well officiated, but the ordinary track fan would hardly have thought that he was witnessing a track meet. Every official was in full dress. Most of them had on derbies, too, and the remainder were wearing silk topers.

Johnny McHugh, veteran starter, also had on the conventional tuxedo, but he topped it off with a light grey fedora.

The track itself is made of pine and built in sections. It is 150-yards around, or 11 laps to the mile. The curves at each end are banked to about a 30 degree angle. The straightaway is built inside the circle. When the dashes are being run one end of the track is removed and the straightaway is extended to a length of about 80 yards.

Only one thing happened during the entire evening to delay the meet in any way. In the finals of the girls' international 50-yard dash, the four girls were over anxious and jumped the gun seven times. On the eighth try they got away with the gun, but one of them had jumped it again, so they were called back. They were given 15 minutes rest while two more events were run off, but this did not help much. After jumping the gun four more times, they got away on the fifth, and Stella Walsh of Cleveland set a new world's record.

One of the most interesting races of the evening was the international two-mile "miss and out" race. This was 22 laps around the boards. Fifteen entrants started the race, but after eight laps were run the last runner in each lap was stopped until only seven men were left. This event was won by Paul Rekers of Penn State College in a driving finish over Stanley Petkiewicz of Poland.

William Rogers has been elected as delegate to attend the Council of the Scholarship Societies of the South, which will hold its annual meeting with the chapter of the East Texas State Teachers College at Commerce on Feb. 21-22.

Rogers is president of the T. C. U. Scholarship Society. Miss Anna Harriett Heyer, corresponding secretary, is the alternate. Dr. John Lord, sponsor, is going to attend the meeting.

Dr. S. H. Whitley, president of E. T. S. T. C., will welcome the visiting delegates, and W. P. Davidson of Southwestern University will respond. Miss Bessie Shook of N. T. S. T. C. will deliver the president's annual address, and Dr. H. Y. Benedict, president of the University of Texas, is scheduled to speak.

Apparatus Installed
Three Horse-Power Boiler Added
to Chemistry Laboratory.

A three horse-power boiler for use in the distillation and heating of certain chemicals is the latest addition to the Chemistry laboratory, according to Prof. J. L. Whitman of that department. Organic chemistry 34 will be the class to use the boiler most.

The boiler and connecting apparatus was installed at a cost of approximately \$300 and will produce over ten gallons of distilled water per hour. It is equipped with automatic steam and water shut-offs, the steam pressure being blown off when a pressure of 70 pounds is reached. Forty pounds is the normal operating pressure and a portion of the boiler is connected to a tin pipe which carries the steam to the interior of a tin-lined copper tank with a ten gallon capacity. Before entering the tank, however, the steam enters a condenser which condenses the steam to pure distilled water. Another outlet from the boiler conveys the steam to the laboratory tables where it is readily accessible.

Has Devoted Over 25
Years to Study of
Astronomy.

IS CO-AUTHOR OF BOOKS

Has Presented Travelogues to
Audiences in 26 States in
Past 10 Years.

Dr. A. M. Harding professor of mathematics and astronomy and also director of the general extension service of the University of Arkansas, will speak at T. C. U. Tuesday, Feb. 18, at 8 p. m. on "Other Worlds Than Ours."

Dr. Harding is a graduate of the University of Arkansas. He has devoted more than twenty-five years to the study of science, a part of which time was spent at the University of Chicago where he was awarded his A. M. and Ph. D. degrees for work in mathematics and astronomy. The astronomer has developed his lectures into "Celestial Travelogues" which are illustrated by hundreds of lantern slides taken through some of the largest telescopes in the world. While at T. C. U. Dr. Harding will take his audience on a trip into different parts of the universe. Stops will be made on the moon, sun, seven planets, and as many other heavenly bodies as time will permit.

During the past ten years Dr. Harding has presented his travelogues before audiences in twenty-six states and has appeared before leading teachers' colleges, chateaus, and lecture centers of America. He is co-author of the following textbooks on mathematics: Plane Trigonometry, College Algebra, Analytic Geometry, and Plane Trigonometry (different co-author from the first book of the same title). He is also author of "What's in the Sky Tonight?" a weekly radio feature which is being used by educational broadcasting stations. Dr. Harding is the father of Dr. Arthur L. Harding of the faculty of the School of Law of Southern Methodist University.

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ABRAHAM LINCOLN'S EXAMPLE

The sixteenth president of the United States, whose birthday we celebrate next Wednesday, had the total of one year of schooling in his entire life. This man was Abraham Lincoln, who rose above his environment and advantages to the highest place of honor in this nation.

This does not, however, mean he had only one year of education. As a boy "Abe" Lincoln read everything which he could find in the homes for miles around. He traveled a number of miles each day to borrow a newspaper in order to keep up with what was going on in the world. Though living far out in the country where people were interested in only their little group, Abe kept himself informed and was always able to discuss intelligently current topics.

Is there not a lesson in this phase of the life of Abraham Lincoln for the young man and woman of 1930? We, who have the advantages of a college education and libraries of books, do not always make the most of our opportunities. Do we make the proper use of our spare time as this national hero did? Are we interested enough in being informed to go out of our way to gain knowledge of things not required in school? Too often we are not. Let us consider the example of Abraham Lincoln.

BOOKS AND THINKING

"Reading is the basis of all our thinking," said Mr. Henry L. Cecil, lecturer in chapel last Monday. He further said that "books are our great inheritance and that they are our tools."

If reading is the basis of all our thinking, it is no wonder that some college students do so little thinking. When students brag that they have passed a course "without cracking a book," that they have a stack of borrowed outside reading reports and therefore will have to do no library work for an English course, when students not only admit that they are not reading in college but even boast that they have not even been near the library, what good is this inheritance, of what use are their tools to them?

In a recent survey made by a member of The Skiff staff, it was estimated that T. C. U. students spend 47 minutes a day reading magazines, books and newspapers other than required work. The questionnaire was answered by 102 students and its probable that they represent with no small degree of accuracy, the whole student body. It might be safe to estimate that each one of these students spends about two hours each day preparing lessons. This makes a total of two hours and forty-seven minutes spent each day with books, which is unusually low.

When universities have students who spend most of their leisure time in the libraries, then universities will have thinking student bodies.

INFANCY IN COLLEGE

Those who enter college at 16 or an earlier age, are superior in both behavior and scholarship to those entering at later ages, according to President Lowell of Harvard. Of this the Boston Transcript says: "If Mr. Lowell really intends to advocate 16 as an age none too young, we beg leave to differ."

We beg leave to differ, too. As it stands, many students finish their high school work at 16 and enter college immediately. Some of them take up their advanced education with ease and ability, but others find it difficult to meet the requirements of a college program. They are too young to realize the importance of an education, and often regard the actual learning as a secondary motive. Their primary objective is to enjoy themselves.

The fact that some youthful freshmen display keen and active minds does not mean necessarily that boys and girls should start on their higher education at 16. Capacity to learn is not the only consideration. Moral and social responsibilities enter into college life with force. Sixteen-year-olds are often not mature enough to make the necessary adjustments.

The boy who graduates from college at 20 isn't prepared to commence his profession. He's too adolescent in regard to the world of business men and women. There is no need for this hurrying through school from the first grade on up. College years are too precious to be placed in the background so soon.

"Miss B. B. A." to Be Announced at Banquet Feb. 26.

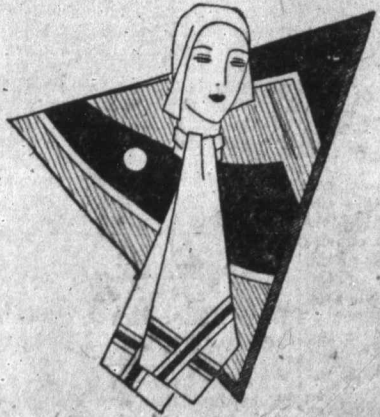
Rainey Elliott has been elected toastmaster for the annual banquet of the business administration department to be held Tuesday, Feb. 26. He was elected by all the students in this department.

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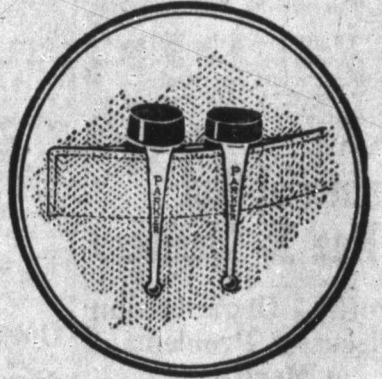

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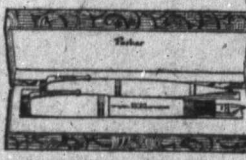

NE of the most talked of athletes in the entire nation today is Cy Leland, T. C. U.'s "Texas Express," or whatever title you like best for the modest Frog track captain and football ace. Leland is without a doubt the greatest athlete that the Purple institution has ever produced. He has gained more fame and recognition for himself and for T. C. U. than the entire collection of athletes that have performed in Purple spangles.

Last season, when the blond sprinter was winning fame in meets with Claude Bracey, George Simpson, and various other stars of the country, he was placed in the same class with "Rags" Matthews, former Frog all-American football end and one of Art Shires' contemporaries, as the athlete who caused T. C. U. to be put on the map, athletically speaking. He and Matthews were in a class to themselves. Today, Leland has far outstripped the great Matthews in fame, and it is quite safe to say that the flying Frog will for years to come, rank as the greatest in T. C. U.'s history.

It was to Leland's credit, as well as to the entire Southwest's good, that the Christian flyer was invited to participate in the Millrose games last Saturday. No other Southwest athlete was invited. Columns of publicity were carried in papers throughout the nation about the appearance of Leland against such renowned speed kings as Elder, Jimmy Daley, Chester Bowman, and others.

As to his failure to finish better than third in the feature 60-yard dash of those of you who are inclined to shed tears and be disappointed over the fact might well save your sorrows and regrets. Leland needs no sympathy nor does he want any. All he needs, experts at the Garden agreed after the race, is a few more such races under his belt. No one that understands the circumstances of the race doubts that Leland had any idea whatever that he would finish first under the circumstances. He got just what he needed—experience under fire, the "fire" being the critical and searching eyes of approximately 20,000 spectators.

While we are on the subject of Leland, it is worthwhile to know that on motion of Senator Julien C. Hyer, Fort Worth, the State Senate unanimously extended its best wishes to Leland while he was in New York for the race. As far as we know, it is the first time in history that a Texas athlete has been so honored. It is our guess that the body will have numerous other chances to honor the same athlete within the next year or two. Barring injury in football, Leland will be one of the three fastest, if not the fastest, men in America either this year or next. That is no wild guess. No man in America can beat Leland to the tape when he learns to get away from the blocks with other sprinters.

Three more games and the Frogs' basketball season will be at an end for the 1930 season. The Frogs have yet to play the Longhorns one game

Frog Cagers Are Losers to Texas By 5-21 Score

Schmidtmen Build Impressive Lead, but Lose It.

Eury Is High Point Man

T. C. U. Wins First Baylor Game by Employing New Foot Loose Attack.

Although completely outplaying their opponents in the first half to lead 16 to 9, Coach Francis Schmidt's Horned Frogs were crushed by a brilliant Longhorn comeback in the final period and ended up far in the rear of the Texas University cagers Saturday night in the Frog barn. Sensational basket looping in the final 20 minutes brought victory to Coach Walker's Orange and White quintet by a score of 35 to 21. By virtue of the loss, the Christians broke even for the week in their conference play, having scored an impressive victory over the Baylor Bears the preceding Tuesday night by a 33-to-22 score. The Baylor tilt was also played on the Frog court.

The Christians have not looked better all season than in the first period against the tall Steer basketballers. Leland Finishes In Third Place

T. C. U. Star Races at Madison Square Garden Meet.

Getting away to a slow start which prevented him from quite closing the gap between him, Jack Elder and John Fitzpatrick, Cy Leland, T. C. U.'s renowned track and grid star, raced down the board track at Madison Square Garden Saturday night to place third in the 60-yard feature of the Millrose A. A. games. "The Texas Express," who left Fort Worth last Saturday week for New York, was the Southwest's only representative in the Millrose meet, classic of the indoor meets during the winter season. Although failing to place higher than third in the special 60-yard dash, the Texas speedster showed plenty of class in his initial race on the board track. He finished only a yard or so behind the winning Elder, and was coming fast at the tape.

The defeat of Leland came as no surprise to coaches and fans of the Southwest, not one of whom expected the T. C. U. ace to win the event. Nor does the defeat come as a dire disappointment. Everything — the shortness of the dash, the board track, and the experience of his opposition — was against him from the outset, and Leland should be acclaimed for the notable showing made against the speed kings of America.

Elder, famous Notre Dame football and track star, got a flying start off the blocks in the race and jumped into the lead at the outset, never to be headed. Leland, away to a poor start, sped down the short track with lightning speed to overhaul the field with the exception of Elder and Fitzpatrick, Canadian sprint artist. Leland failed by inches to nose out Fitzpatrick, but at the tape was fast closing the distance between himself and the event.

In the 50-yard event, open to winners of first and second in the 60-yard race, Leigh Miller, little known Canadian star, outran Elder, Daley, and Fitzpatrick to capture the event. Fitzpatrick finished second ahead of Elder.

Leland's performance in the New York classic meet, won recognition for himself and for the Southwest in general. Only by special invitations could one participate in the events, and it is to the general credit of Leland and the Southwest that he was allowed a chance to show his wares. 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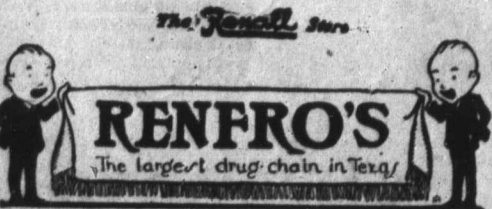
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
