"Youngest Man" of Frogland Reaches 83rd Year Today

"At 83 I feel as fit as ever, except for the necessity of a slower pace, which, after all, will enable me to count off more happy birthdays," says Dr. Clinton Lockhart, as he celebrates another milestone, his eighty-third, today.

Dr. Lockhart, president of T. C. U. from 1906 to 1911, during the time of the fire and removal to Fort Worth, has been professor of Old Testament in T. C. U. and later in Brite College since it was founded. But to his many friends he is "the grand young man of the campus," to whom many students return yearly for every occasion from weddings to funerals.

The birthday will be spent in traditional fashion, with friends and relatives dropping in to offer congratulations, between festivities of the day.

This morning Dr. Lockhart's "Bi-

ble boys," students of Brite College, will pay him a surprise visit in a body.

A birthday luncheon will be given in honor of the Lockharts by their two granddaughters, Mrs. Mack Faust and Mrs. P. H. Huntley, at Mrs. Faust's home.

Friends of the family, Mrs. M. J. Pilcher and daughter, Miss Louise Pilcher, will receive the Lockharts for a birthday dinner tonight at the Pilcher home.

The Disciples Class of the University Christian Church of which he is assistant teacher, will present Dr. Lockhart with an American Standard Version of the Bible as a birthday gift.

"I believe his strict adherence to good habits accounts for his long life. And you may say, also that I still consider him the perfect husband," commented Mrs. Lockhart.

Pittman Asks Aid, so—

Council Will Help Union Center Drive By Holding Dance

The Student Council agreed to aid Dean of Men Herman Pittman and his faculty committee in the movement to convert the Little Gym into a student union building Wednesday night at its weekly session. The Council agreed to hold a benefit dance at the Basketball Gymnasium Friday, March 7.

Pittman spent 30 minutes giving the plan in detail, answering any questions that arose and outlining the work that has been done so far.

The Council voted unanimously in favor of helping in the project. "We plan on converting the trophy room into a lounge, the basketball court into a dance floor and the auxiliary gym into a game room. This will have to be done little by little, with the lounge being first on the list as soon as we raise some money," Pittman said.

When asked how he intended to raise the money, the dean replied that there are several possible sources—contributions from exes, faculty members and members of the student body, and by holding a benefit dance.

Approximately \$1000 was the estimate made by Pittman as to the cost of the whole project.

The dance was then agreed upon as the best immediate source of money, and the date was set.

Mrs. Helen Murphy and Prof. Tom Prouse are co-operating with Pittman on the project.

Debaters Chosen To Make Trip

155 New Students For Spring Semester

T. C. U. has 155 new students this semester. Fifty-seven registered for the day school while 98 new students enrolled in the Evening College.

This brings the total to 1817 students for the year. This is about 10 per cent below last year's enrollment.

Trustees Will Appoint New Head of University For 1941-42 Session

President E. M. Waits has announced his retirement. Yesterday afternoon the man who has led Texas Christian University through a quarter of a century asked the Board of Trustees to relieve him from his duties.

"I have been in religious and educational work since 1896. After the stress and storm of 45 years of public service, when a man has done his stint, he deserves a few years of tranquility and of lessened responsibility," President Waits told board members in a formal statement.

The retirement will become effective whenever a new president for the University can be found by the board. It is expected that the new president will take over by the opening of the regular 1941-42 session.

President Waits will then have the title of "President Emeritus." He will continue to serve the institution in a capacity which he describes as "Ambassador of Good Will."

It was back in 1916 that the Rev. E. M. Waits, pastor of the Magnolia Christian Church of Fort Worth, was named president of T. C. U., to succeed Dr. Fredrick Kershner.

During the 25 years that have elapsed since then, under the leadership of President Waits, the institution has made vast progress.

Total assets of the school have grown from \$443,035 to \$5,871,457. Total income—\$90,700 in 1916—was \$602,785 for the fiscal year ending last August.

Enrollment in 1916 was 301. Enrollment for the last complete year (1939-40) was 2309—less duplicates, 2080.

In 1906 the faculty numbered 15. Now there are 86 teachers, and also an administrative and maintenance staff of 30 additional persons.

During the 25 years of President Waits' leadership, Brite College has been enlarged and expanded to the level of a graduate seminary. The Evening College has been established. T. C. U. has been recognized and accredited by all the great educational standardizing and rating agencies of the United States.

Included in his statement to the trustees was a plea by President Waits to the alumni of the institution to carry on:

"Alumni of T. C. U., into your hands I commit the great institution which is dearer to me than my life. Guard T. C. U. as your greatest treasure. Our troubled world awaits a new era. The pathway will not be smooth. It has never been, but T. C. U. must go on to render more efficient service to generations yet to come."

Brotherhood Dinner Held At University Church

Patrick Henry, secretary of the Texas Christian Missionary Society spoke at the University Christian Church brotherhood dinner Wednesday evening. Rufus Garrett presided and Registrar S. W. Hutton and the Rev. Granville Walker led the worship service.

A mixed quartet made up of two boys and two girls, Miss Mary Ruth Scott, Miss Georgia Norris, Arthur Arney and Jimmy Moudy, sang.

Prof. Sammis Named College Music Chairman

While attending a meeting of the Texas Music Educators Association in Waco Friday, Prof. Claude Sammis was named chairman of the college division of the association. He was accompanied to Waco by Rex Beene, Julius Winkler, David Montgomery, Miss Nell Gurnee, Miss Elizabeth Martin and Miss Elizabeth Barbour.

"Pros" Hold Slight Lead Over "Cons" in Campus Discussion of Five-Day-School Question

It should be a fight to the finish if the movement to abolish Saturday classes goes much farther. Arguments pro and con are brought out in the poll taken this week by students in the journalism department.

The campus is about evenly divided, with both faculty and students on both sides. Fewer class cuts and the possibility of students' getting Saturday jobs led the arguments in favor of the change.

The necessity for afternoon classes that would be brought about by the change is the main objection against the five-day week. According to a number of opinions, more jobs would be lost by the need for afternoon classes than would be gained by the free Saturdays.

Many students prefer to have Saturday free to study. Faculty members say that this day could be used for research work which is impossible under the present system.

"Because of forced interruptions that occur so frequently on Saturdays, I am inclined to favor the five-day week," Dr. H. R. Mundhenke says.

"If the Brite College Graduate School can be run on a four-day basis, I don't see why the undergraduates can't get along on a five-day schedule," remarks Dick Crews.

"While I do not believe in 'all work and no play,' I am convinced that six days' work cannot be done in five days," Dr. Gayle Scott explains.

This week's poll was conducted by The Skiff in order to get a representative cross-section of student opinion on the proposal to institute a five-day school week.

Interest in the matter is widespread, as it is being discussed at present on all fronts. The proposal thus far has gone before the Student Council and the student-faculty committee. An open-forum letter has been printed in The Skiff.

"Students of today should spend more time on a university campus, not less," declares Prof. F. W. Hogan.

Student Body President Malven Stevenson

thinks that "those who play football and work in the afternoon would be hurt by this plan."

"Lefty" Alexander says that "anything is better than going to school in the afternoon."

"This system would bring about many difficulties in arranging the credit hours and in my opinion the five-day week is very inferior to the system we have now," says Dean Colby D. Hall.

"We tried the five-day week many years ago and found it feasible to change to the present system," he added.

"Looking at it from a lazy man's attitude, I believe having Saturday off to do as we please would help us during the rest of the week in classes," says Bob Johnston.

"I see no reason to change to a five-day week."

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To Benefit The Ill-Informed

Arlington Heights Senior High School will play host to five students: Mildred E. Smith, English and journalism; Rusty Cowart, physical education; R. D. Madland, history; Jack Odle, commercial arithmetic; and Monroe Bicknell will observe in music.

North Side Senior High School will have eight teachers-to-be: Logan Ware, physical education; Vera Williams, history; Arleen Brammer, history; Jane Manning, public speaking; Mrs. Dorothy Estill, shorthand and typing; Helen Jane Thomas, shorthand and typing; and Mildred Ann Rawdon, art. Julius Winkler will observe in music.

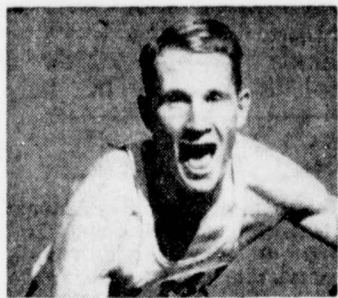
Adams Is Porker Star

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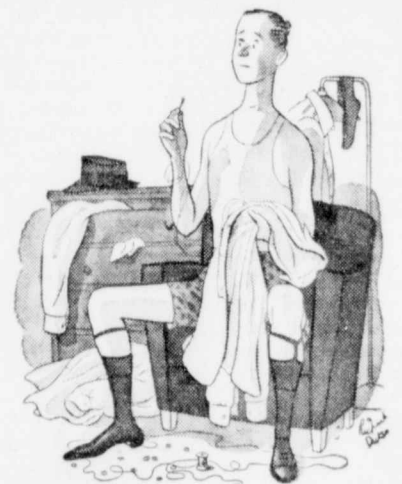

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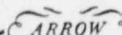
