Brite to break ground on housing complex during Ministers Week

Groundbreaking ceremony for the approximately \$7 million Brite Divinity School student housing complex will take place at 2 p.m. Tuesday, Feb. 9. Site is the Sandage Avenue side of the 3.7 acre block bounded by McCart Avenue, Bowie and Lowden Streets where the apartment-style units will be constructed.

The complex is to be named Leibrock Village to honor Robert and Prudie Leibrock of Midland who made the initial gift of \$200,000 and paved the way for fundraising efforts for the project.

Participants in the groundbreaking include Chancellor Michael R. Ferrari, David Murph (church relations), Stanley Hagadone (Brite), Austin attorney Roy C. Snodgrass III (chairman, Brite trustees), Nathan T. Digby (moderator, Brite student government) and Mr. and Mrs. Leibrock. The Rev. Janet A. Long of Elyria, Ohio, immediate past moderator of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) will give the prayer.

The new complex, owned and managed by Brite, will replace three far-flung apartment units which currently house divinity school students and their families...Princeton House Apts. behind Beasley Hall, Bellaire Apts. near the stadium and a quadplex of ministerial apartments on Bowie between Waits and Lubbock. According to David Murph, it is hoped that a sense of community among Brite students will be created by bringing them together in one residential complex.

The groundbreaking will occur immediately after the Brite Luncheon, a highlight of the annual TCU Ministers Week which is set this year for Feb. 8-11. Lunch

will be at 12:15 p.m. Tuesday in the Student Center ballroom. Guest speaker will be the Rev. Ralph Glenn, regional minister and president, Christian Church in the Southwest.

Three Brite graduates will be honored with Distinguished Minister awards: Janet Long; Gilbert Davis, former director of church relations at TCU and Roy S. Martin, past University minister and chaplain emeritus, Cook Children's Medical Center.

Ministers Week begins Monday night when Chancellor Ferrari opens the program at University Christian Church by introducing Dr. Paul Scott Wilson who will deliver the Wells Sermons at 8 p.m. Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. His topic is *Faith and a Changing World*. He is professor of homiletics at Emmanuel College in the University of Toronto where he has taught for 18 years.

Dr. Molly T. Marshall will present the Scott Lectures at 9 a.m. Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. Her talks are titled *The Comforter Comes: A Constructive Pneumatology*. An ordained Baptist minister, she is professor of theology and spiritual formation at Central Baptist Theological Seminary in Kansas City, Kan.

Dr. David L. Balch will give the McFadin Lectures at 11 a.m. Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. Professor of New Testament at Brite since 1983, David will discuss *Early Christian House Churches (as seen from Pompeii)*.

The week's events will close with a complimentary luncheon at 12:15 p.m. Thursday in the Student Center ballroom. Chancellor Ferrari will be guest speaker. ♦

EIGHTY-FIVE CHRISTIAN VOLUNTEERS are being sought nationwide for an English as a Second Language program July 6-Aug. 8 in China. Locations are Amity Foundation, Nanjing, and Guangxi University, Nanning.

A college degree or ESL certificate is required. Teachers will use a variety of methods to teach English, with emphasis on conversation. The approximate cost of \$2,500 covers international travel, lodging and food.

Teachers must be in good health, able to walk at least a mile a day, climb many stairs and withstand hot, humid weather. Air conditioning may not be available.

TCU'S ALCOHOL AND DRUG Education Center has received a grant from the American College Health Association to assess the current HIV prevention activities on campus. ACHA project directors will be here Feb. 9-10 to meet with campus and community leaders to conduct a preliminary study.

A local Innovation Team will be recruited to share information on effective HIV prevention strategies for reducing HIV related risk behaviors in college students, identifying gaps in current prevention activities, prioritizing target populations and facilitating the development of a plan to reduced targeted risk behaviors. ♦
