Dear Mrs. Sims:

Your letter of June 3 acknowledging Mr. Carter's letter of May 29 has been received during his absence from the state.

Inasmuch as you have not been able to make any contact with your nephew, Lt. Loyd Taylor, may I suggest that you write him using the same address we have for Mr. Carter's son. Of course, you are supposed to have his prisoner of war number from the War Department, however, that space may be left blank and I am sure the mail will eventually reach him. Enclosed is an addressed envelope to be used as a sample. When you have written your letter and sealed it in an envelope addressed as this sample, then place it in a plain envelope which is addressed "Postmaster-Prisoner of War Mail" and leave it unsealed. In your case, since you are in a small Post Office, if it is convenient you may just hand the original letter to your Postmaster. The purpose of this is to prevent any cancellations to be placed on the envelope, which is one of the regulations of the German censors.

Meanwhile, we shall pass the word along to Amon that you have heard from Lt. Taylor and that you are all well.
