### Dr. Ferre, Nebraska Dean, Will Be Principal Speaker

Dr. Gustave A. Ferre, dean of Cotner College, Lincoln Neb., is the principal speaker for Religious Emphasis Week, March 8-11.

"RE Week is the special period each year when the campus focuses its attention on religious faith and its pertinence in the lives of students and faculty in the world today," the Rev. James A. Farrah, director of religious activities, said when he announced the date.

Dr. Ferre, according to Dr. Charles Kemp, professor of Christian Ministers in Brite College of the Bible, is considered one of the most popular professors of

religion. He has been well received in religious projects on other college campuses.

The speaker puts a considerable amount of humor in his speeches, says Dr. Kemp.

"I guarantee they will not be dull for the college audience, he says.

"Dr. Ferre is quite a person—very humorous, and he will not be boring to the students. Yet, he will have a lot to say of depth and importance," Dr. Kemp explains.

He went on to say that Dr. Ferre understands the students' minds. He is able to feel the spirit of his audiences, pace his addresses accordingly and challenge the student.

Dr. Ferre received his Ph.D. from Vanderbilt. This work concerned the place of religion in higher education. He taught in the undergraduate school at Vanderbilt while working on his Ph.D. He has been at Cotner School of Religion since September, 1957.

"The Inevitable Encounter—Sovereign, Self and Society" is the theme of this year's program. It is sponsored by the United Religious Council on campus.

University-wide convocations in Ed Landreth Auditorium, special services in churches of the community, dormitory discussion and devotion groups, club meetings and classroom lectures pertinent to the general theme have been scheduled.

Vesper speaker is the Rev. J. W. Matthews of the Christian Faith and Life Community in Austin.

Other speakers representing various denominational groups in Fort Worth also will lead discussions on campus during RE week.

## Original Work Makes Bow

BMOC best describes Ronald Edward Johnston, junior from Hot Springs, Ark.—B for big, busy, or ballet. All these apply to this gifted young man whose original ballet will be premiered in Ed Landreth Auditorium today and tomorrow, when the department of ballet presents its annual offering.

Ronnie Johnston entered TCU in the spring of 1956. Like all ballet majors, he minors in drama and music, and the combined activities have kept him busy on and off campus. Recently, he danced nightly in "Brigadoon" at Casa Manana while his day was filled with classes and ballet rehearsals.

Johnston's original ballet, which he calls "Black Pavane," is the result of a compelling story idea, relentless experimentation in choreography, lengthy record sessions to find the appropriate music, and constant encouragement from Ballet Master David Preston.

The story of "Black Pavane" first came to Johnston's mind over a year ago. Realizing its possibilities as ballet material, he began to work the story line into choreographic patterns. Oddly enough, he arrived at a final decision on the music only a few weeks ago.

After many hours spent in the TCU Fine Arts Library and haunting his favorite record shops, Johnston selected Samuel

Barber's Medea Ballet Suite, portions of Barber's Symphony No. 2, Bela Bartok's Divertimento for String Orchestra, and Bartok's Music for String Instruments, Percussion and Celesta.

In "Black Pavane," Johnston

dances the lead role, The Boy. Performing opposite him as The Girl will be Cynthia Cory, Borger senior. Trishka Bennage, Lewisburg, Pa., sophomore, appears as The Courtesan, and Preston, Turn to BALLET on Page 5

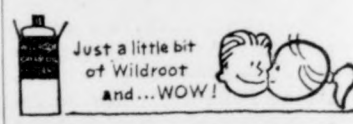


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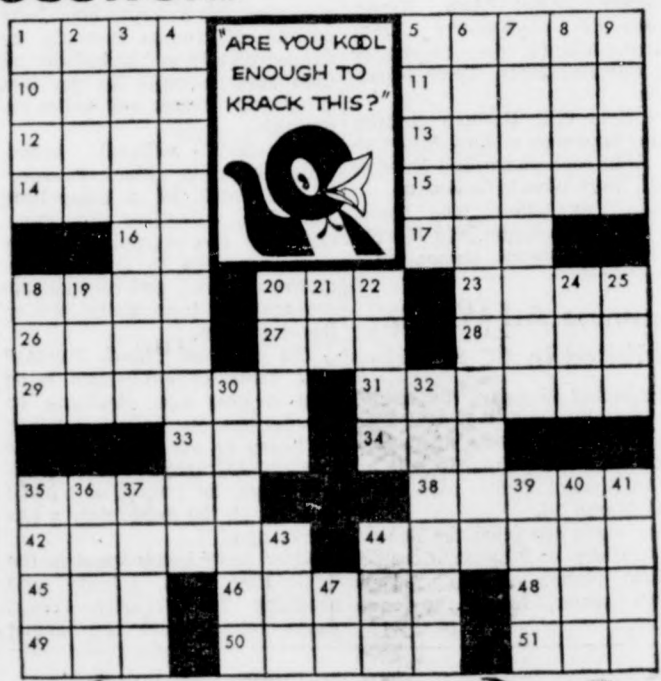

**Life Is Not Dull For TCU Nurses**

A sultry blonde waltzed into the infirmary not too long ago with a serious complaint. She had broken one of her fingernails. Would it be possible for the nurse to put it back together? The five infirmary nurses are not often bothered by such serious complaints, but Supervisor Mrs. Lucille Steers says life is not totally dull in the east end of Waits Hall.

Mrs. Steers arrived here in 1948. Previously she had served as an Army nurse in France, England and Germany, where she earned her nickname, "General."

Upon arriving here she was promised a new building within a year. Eleven years later she still is waiting. Recently it was announced a new infirmary would be built within five years. "Just in time for me to retire," she says laughingly.

She strives for a homelike atmosphere for her nurses. Two nurses, Mmes. Sherrel Terry from Dallas, and Mariet Robinson from Colorado City, live in the infirmary with Mrs. Steers.

Usually the nurses don't stay too long as they frequently marry one of their patients. An exception is Mrs. Jack Rader, who met her husband when he had the job of carrying the food from the cafeteria to the infir-

mary. She still is part of the staff.

One nurse, Miss Shirley Rogers, lives in Waits Hall, although she is an R.N. Due to her lack of height she frequently is mistaken for a high school girl when out of uniform.

Often a patient will smell exotic whiffs of foreign foods coming from the infirmary's modern kitchen. All the nurses like to cook and Mrs. Steers loves to experiment with foreign dishes. The interest was heightened this summer when she and Miss Robinson spent the summer in Europe with the TCU study group.

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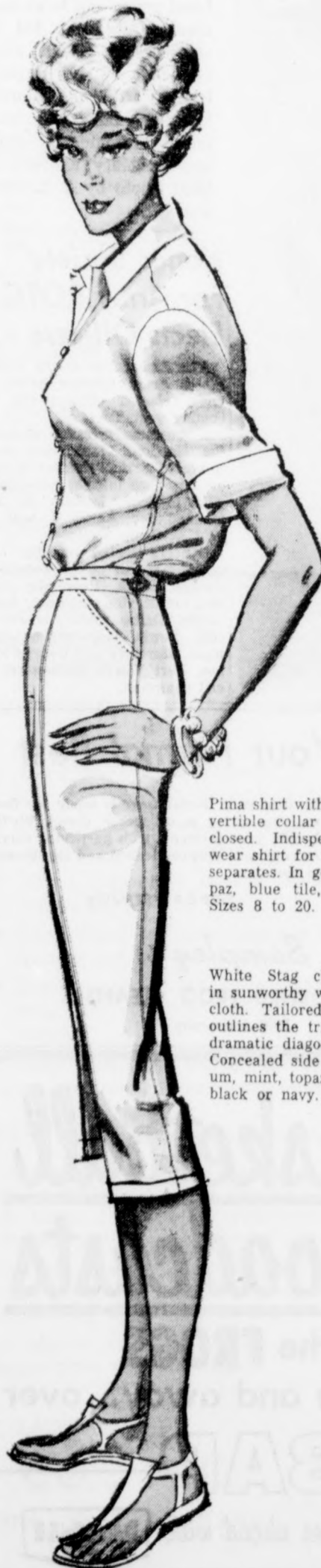

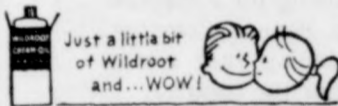
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### WHAT'S THAT HICK TOWN?

According to Lester Jordan, sports publicity director for SMU, there still are plenty of tickets left for the fracas and they may be purchased at the TCU Gymnasium.

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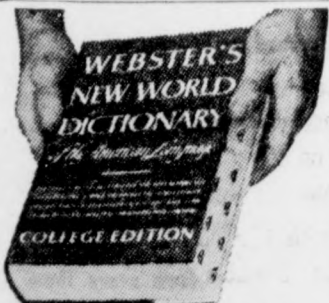
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## from the sideline

At least more of an impression than Fort Worth's Public Schools Gym. It's going to be hard indeed to get a top-notch player to spend the next four years performing in a 3,700-seat high school gym.

But then, maybe some day, we too will have a fieldhouse.
