CANTATA TO BE MAY 9

Misses Parnell, Bowe, Barksdale,

and McKean Winners.

Competition for the part of the Indian princess and her maids in "The Sunset Trail" will be among Misses Maurine Parnell, Marvylene Bowe, Marie Weldert, Eloise Barksdale and Helen Whitley, who were selected from the fourteen candidates by the student body in chapel Friday and Monday. The identity of the princess will not be made known until the night of May 9, when the public presentation of the operatic cantata will be given.

Story Concerns Indians.
The story of "The Sunset Trail" centers around an Indian tribe which is trying to decide whether it should fight the whites or submit and go into the reservation in Montana. The council fire, the prayers in the mountains, and the warriors going to battle are all depicted in the story. The story closes with the defeat of the warriors and their submission to their destiny.

The Indian princess will take the part of Wildflower. She will be represented in the traditional love scene found in Indian lore. All of the authentic details of Indian life will be carried out in the presentation of the story.

The various choral organizations of the city which will be represented in the musical part of "The Sunset Trail" are having separate rehearsals. The general chorus, under the direction of Sam S. Losh, rehearses each Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the First Christian Church.

A large symphony orchestra will furnish orchestral accompaniment for the presentation of "The Sunset Trail." Rehearsals for the orchestra will begin soon.

Southwestern Journalism Congress,
Students' Club to
Be in Austin.

May 1 and 2 have been set as the dates for the annual meeting of the Southwestern Journalism Congress and the Southwestern Students' Club, according to word received from Prof. Paul Thompson of the University of Texas, president of the congress. The meetings of the two groups will be held at the University of Texas. Tentative plans for the joint meeting of the congress and the students' club were made when the executive board of the congress met in Austin recently. The co-operative program of the two groups will be comprised of prominent speakers in the newspaper field. A round-table discussion on the part of the faculty members and the opportunity for sightseeing for the students with the University of Texas students as guides, are also on the program.

Plans are being worked out for the informal dinner to be given for the delegates the night of May 2. Entertainment will be furnished by the students of the University of Texas. Officers of the congress, besides Thompson, are Miss Helen Zee Wortman of Baylor College, vice-president, and Miss Aileen Parten, Baylor College, secretary-treasurer. Kenneth Fink of the University of Texas is president of the students' group. Miss Mary Livingston of Trinity University is vice-president, and Miss Fay Foote of Texas Technological College is secretary-treasurer.

T. C. U. Debaters To Meet Hendrix

Fyke and Isely Will Up-
hold Negative of Free
Trade Question.

The debaters from Hendrix-Henderson College will invade Texas Christian University territory Saturday night for a debate upon the free trade question. The discussion will take place in the University auditorium at 8 p. m., with E. D. Fyke and Fred Isely upholding the negative for T. C. U.

Each year several debate teams from Hendrix-Henderson, which is located at Conway, Ark., make a tour of a different section of the country, meeting teams from the most representative colleges and universities that lie along their itinerary. This is the first time since T. C. U. has been admitted into Pi Kappa Delta, national debate fraternity, that they are touring the Southwest. The Hendrix debaters met S. M. U. in Dallas Wednesday night.

In the triangle of intercollegiate debates which were held last Friday night, Fyke and Isely on the affirmative won a 2-to-0 decision from A. & M. at T. C. U., while Paul Martin and Marion Hicks defeated the S. M. U. affirmative team of Glen McDaniel and Homer Jack Fisher by a 2-to-1 decision in Dallas. This is the second triangle which has been won at both places by the Frog varsity debaters, the other one being with Trinity and Southwestern Universities. One other triangle meet was originally scheduled between Baylor and Simmons University, but has been postponed because of the regional meet in Waco next week.

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EASTER.

The approach of the Easter season brings forth various thoughts in the minds of students. To some, Easter still means Easter bunnies and eggs and lilies. To others, it means a four-day vacation from school. To still others, Easter has a deeper meaning.

The real celebration of Easter is the anniversary of our Lord's resurrection, when He arose from the dead as predicted, after His crucifixion three days before. The resurrection is symbolic of new life, new hope, new beauty. With Easter springtime is ushered in. Everything bears a note of beauty.

However a student chooses to look at Easter, there should be some serious thought given to the reason for the celebration. It is more than Easter bunnies and eggs and lilies. It is more than a vacation from school work. Easter is the beginning of new life, re-creation. Its application can be made to students as well as to the flowers and the grass and the trees that awakened at the call of spring.

MUST THEY GO?

Do college students have to be made to do things?

This question seems to have been answered in the affirmative by the T. C. U. faculty and board through the continued means of compulsory chapel attendance.

Students in the University have commented pro and con on this chapel attendance question, and the majority have come to the conclusion that chapel would have more interest to the students if they were not forced to go, with the threat of the loss of hours if they miss.

The idea seems to be that students would never enter a chapel door unless they thought they had to. This theory seems easily exploded when the great number of seniors and juniors are constantly attending the freshman-sophomore chapel, and vice versa. These students really seem to enjoy the programs more than they do the ones they are made to attend simply because they have gone because they wanted to.

There would be no vacant seats staring visiting speakers in the face, as seems to be the fear of some of the faculty. On the other hand, if a notice were posted on the bulletin board who the speaker was to be, there would always be an appreciative audience there to listen, rather than the uninterested group which is always present under the present system. This condition is the natural result of the herding together of a flock of different types of individuals and forcing them to listen to some speakers in which only a small majority could have an equal interest. Personalities and interests are too different to allow everyone to enjoy the same types of speakers, and as a result there is the grouping together of those who want to listen and those who are not interested, resulting in strained ears for the former, and an hour of boredom for the latter.

This can be remedied by a simple process.

Will the board and faculty consider taking this step toward making the student feel he is grown and that he can go where he wants to when he wants to?

The result will be well worth the trouble.

GOING DUTCH.

"There's a pal for you!"

Such was probably the cry of those fortunate freshman boys Wednesday night who dated the girls who "went Dutch" on the freshman banquet. If it were not the cry then it should have been.

Few entertainments in the past have exacted the informality and the democratic fellowship of the "Dutch treat" idea. The idea may be a bit distorted and out-of-step with those who feel that we should without exception stick to the good old American custom of: "It's the man every time who pays." For those who might think that, we hope that the next entertainment that comes along will find you dateless and with a notebook to get up.

Most class entertainments fall flat, if they do fall flat, primarily because those without dates fail to come. We don't blame them for not coming. In many cases, however, these dateless ones would be dated if they reserved their own ticket. Many times, you must remember, the man can't pay. That's a queer thing about college men, you'll find. ball distance throw contests and croquet will be the minor sports. From 3:30 to 4:30 o'clock finals will be played off in baseball, volleyball, while at the same time the swimming events will begin. In the minor sports' division the finals in the croquet matches will be played off from 3:30 to 4:30 o'clock. At 4:30 o'clock folk dancing contests will begin and last until 5 o'clock.

Swimming Is Major Sport.
 Four major sports and eight minor sports will be offered in the junior high school division, beginning at 2 and lasting until 5 o'clock. From 2 until 2:45 o'clock swimming in the major sports division will be offered and croquet, basketball distance throw, and archery in the minor sports division. Volley ball games will be played from 2:45 until 3:30 o'clock, while at the same time quoits, archery, and ping pong will be minor sports events.

Beginning at 3:30 o'clock tennis matches will be played in this group and last until 4:30 o'clock. The minor sports from 3:30 until 4:30 o'clock will be the broad jump and the 50-yard dash. From 4:30 until 5 o'clock baseball games will be played, while at the same time contests in archery, ping pong, quoits and archery will be staged.

Volley Ball to Be Played at 2 P. M.
 In the senior high school group four major sport events and eight minor sport events will be offered. Beginning at 2 o'clock volleyball games will be played until 2:45 o'clock. During this same period the 50-yard dash and the broad jump will be offered in the minor sport division. From 2:45 to 3:30 o'clock baseball games will be played, while those not caring to participate in these sports may play jacks, quoits, or enter the high jump contests.

The tennis matches will begin in this division at 3:30 o'clock and last until 4:30 o'clock, when the swimming events will be held. In the minor sports division from 3:30 to 4:30 o'clock archery, ping pong and a potato race contest will be offered.

BIRD LIFE AT THE POLE, Wolcott Gibbs; William Morrow and Co., New York City. (Fair Book Shop, \$2.)
 "If this was the South Pole," he said, "any way you went it would be north, wouldn't it?" "Yes," I

said, "I suppose it would." "Well," he said, "it isn't that way here. They're all south. We're at the North Pole, Cap. We must have turned the wrong way coming out of the Panama Canal."

This only gives one of the hardships and trying moments encountered by Commander Christopher Robin and his South Pole Expedition. The entire book is a satire on newspaper publicity and the means by which news is created in order that the sensational press will have headline stories for each issue.

"Upon arriving at the pole, the explorers were embarrassed when they came face-to-face with a party conducted by the Popular Polar Tours, Inc.," according to the commander. Although this was almost too much for the crew, they remembered that they must have news for Herbert's papers. So immediately they went about their exploring and completed the trip in such a fashion that even the sensational Herbert was satisfied with the amount of news created by the publicity stunt.

READER, I MARRIED HIM, by Anne Green; E. P. Dutton & Company, Inc., New York City. (Fair Book Shop, \$2.50.)

The Douglass family, exuding Southern charm in the American colony in Paris, are the light-hearted, irresponsible characters in Anne Green's new novel, "Reader, I Married Him." The book is a sequel to "The Selbys," the story of a Georgia family in Paris.

"Reader, I Married Him" is concerned with Catherine, in particular, and her mad pursuit of Gilbert—as well as her clairvoyant spells.

Miss Green's greatest gift is found in her portraiture and characterization. It is highly improbable that such an irresponsible person as Andrew Douglass ever lived, or if such a peculiar situation as Miss Green's concoction could arise. Despite the impossible and superficial nature of the characters, they are certainly alive at all times. They talk cleverly and in a sophisticated fashion, but always for entertainment.

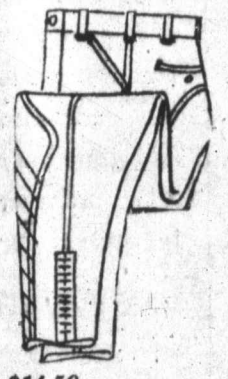

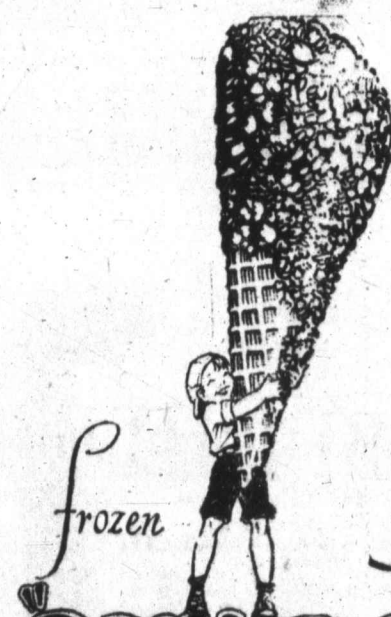

Don Nugent and Dan Salkeld have been chosen to lead the Texas Christian track team this year. Nugent is serving his third year as a dash man and Salkeld was the Frog mainstay in the weights last year and looms to repeat again this season. They were elected to fill the captaincy left vacant by "Red" Oliver, who is prohibited from participation, due to scholastic difficulties.

Three days previous to the election of the Nugent-Salkeld combination, the championship basketball team elected Ray McCulloch and "Doc" Sumner to lead the 1932 cage team. Harlos Green, captain of the 1931 grid team, will be assisted by Johnny Vaught, who will fill the capacity of sub-captain.

The idea of electing two captains was inaugurated at the close of the 1929 grid campaign, when the champions elected Noble Atkins as captain and Cy Leland as sub-captain. The idea of having two captains has increased in popularity until every major athletic team at Frogland, with the exception of baseball, has two leaders.

Mack Clark, varsity track coach, has already started looking forward to the 1932 season. The ineligibility of Oliver and the withdrawal of Leland left the Purple and White hopes waning. Clark says that Casper, all-around track and field star from San Antonio; Fridge, local hurdler and distance star; Wallace, Texarkana weight man, and a host of other men who will round into shape as the season progresses, will, with the aid of returning varsity men, make up the best track team ever to grace the Christian track.

Coach "Dutch" Meyer has been putting his diamond artists through two or three inter-squad games each week for the past several weeks. He is greatly encouraged by the hitting of Wright, Carrell, Hirstine, Williams, Clark, Hinton, Dennis and Woolwine. The entire team has been hitting better this year than any other T. C. U. team has hit in the past several years. The fielding has not been up to par this season, but Meyer expects this department to improve as the season progresses.

Coach Schmidt recently picked his all-time, all-star quintet from men whom he has coached during the years that he has guided Arkansas and Texas Christian teams to six conference championships. "I would prefer not to use our present Texas Christian team. I mean not to consider them at this time. Some will be back next year, and there must be peace in the family," the "Miracle Man" told an Associated Press representative.

Wear Schoonover and Elbert Pickell, forwards; Tom Pickell, center; Glen Rose and Curtis Parker, guards, compose the all-time, all-star team of Arkansas players whom Schmidt has coached. Rollo Adams, forward, and Eugene Lambert, guard, were chosen as alternates. During his playing days, Schoonover was all-conference selection two years and was given considerable recognition as all-American. Elbert Pickell, high scorer in the loop one year and near the top on two other occasions, an all-conference selection for two years, is Schoonover's running mate. He coach-

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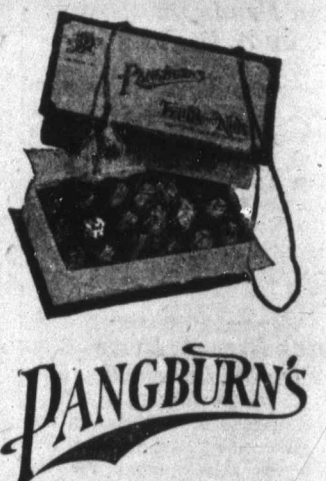
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
