## LOFTIN ADVISES "MA" NOT CALL SPECIAL MEET

Henrietta Man, Floor Manager for Ferguson's, Against Session

AUSTIN, Nov. 27.—While both friends and non-supporters of the Ferguson administration are predicting Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson may yield to the pressure of a legislative ultimatum and call a special session of the house and senate for investigations and urgent legislation, Rep. Ruben Loftin of Henrietta, floor manager for the Ferguson forces in the amnesty fight here last March, has predicted that she will not issue the call.

**Issues Statement.**  
Rep. Loftin made this statement after a conference with Gov. Ferguson and former Governor James A. Ferguson.

Amendment of the highway law, appropriations to meet the crisis in the foot and mouth disease situation in South Texas, after a deficiency appropriation had been rejected by bankers, and funds to continue tick eradication work, are matters which the legislators asked the governor to include in a call for a special session, if issued.

"I told the Ferguson's there was no occasion for a special session," Rep. Loftin said after the conference. "I explained that all the legislature could possibly do had already been done in the resignations of the two highway commissioners, and to call the session is a useless expense.

**Leave It to Grand Jury.**  
"If any person, in or out of the state service, has been guilty of any criminal act, the Travis county grand jury will bring a bill of indictment, as that body is now making an exhaustive investigation of highway affairs under the probing of the attorney general, who is the leader in the whole matter.

## Tells Teachers Evolution a Proven Fact 'SAFE FOR STUPIDITY' Nothing he Declares Deteriorates Race Like Good Environment

DALLAS, Nov. 27.—(AP)—An unofficial announcement of the result of election of officers by the Texas State teachers convention tonight indicated that J. M. Bledsoe of the Teachers college at Commerce was elected president by a large majority, receiving more than 800 of the 1,300 votes cast. Miss Mamie Bastian of Houston was second in the balloting with more than 250 votes, and Bonner Frizzell of Palestine, third, with more than 225 votes.

C. A. Gardner of Fort Worth was reported to have been elected first vice president over R. D. Green of Abilene.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Nov. 27.—(AP)—The Tennessee Academy of Science unanimously adopted a resolution asking the legislature at its next session to repeal the evolution law, because "it marks a backward step in our educational program."

**Handicap for Brains.**

"But an unskilled laborer can marry and begin to rear a family of unskilled laborers when he is twenty-one or twenty-two. When we give stupidity a ten year handicap over intelligence, we have built our whole civilization upside down.

"College graduates come only from the more intelligent ten per cent of the population. This ten per cent is not all found in the upper economic classes. But the most of it is found either there or in the professional

## Amon G. Carter Explains Why He Gave Three Cheers For Dan Moody In Hearing of Jim and Ma at A-M

If Texas Lost he Also Promised Varsity They Would Get Two Highway Contracts, Publisher Tells Press

HOUSTON, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Amon G. Carter, prominent Fort Worth publisher, today related in Houston his own version of the episode at the A. & M. Texas football game Thursday, during which he gave three rousing cheers for Dan Moody and was escorted from the grounds.

Governor Ferguson, James E. Ferguson, T. O. Walton, president of A. & M. College, and others of the executive party, occupied a box at the big Thanksgiving Day "Derby." It was in the presence and within the hearing of this box and its occupants that Mr. Carter gave vent to his hurrahs for the young attorney general who is now so largely in the public eye.

### HIS CHEERS SEEMED TO NETTLE FERGUSONS.

No offense was intended, Mr. Carter said. He hurrahed equally as lustily for the conquering Aggies, he explained. However, it was not the Aggie yell by Mr. Carter that appeared to nettle the executive party; it was the vocal panegyric for Mr. Moody.

No sooner had Mr. Carter been escorted out of the grounds than he was ceremoniously escorted back in again.

"I was unaware that I was anywhere near the box occupied by the executive party," said Mr. Carter to the Houston Post-Dispatch. "I had been pacing up and down the grand stand runway, following the position of the players on the gridiron and rooting for the A. & M. Players.

"My enthusiasm kept mounting as the Aggies scored their first and then their second touchdown. I was crying 'Hurrah for A. & M!' 'Hurrah for Dan Moody!'"

### NOTHING SAID ABOUT HIGHWAY CONTRACTS.

I did say later that if Texas lost we would give them two highway contracts.

"I was just merely enthusiastic over the turn of the football game and I was likewise hurrahing for Dan Moody. I feel that he has done a great service for Texas in his exposure of the highway situation and in my enthusiasm I was cheering for him too. I was directing my cries at the crowd, not at the governor's box."

### "BY ACCIDENT" HE PASSED JIM'S BOX.

"By accident it happened that I passed the governor's box when I was hurraing for A. & M. and for Dan Moody. Mr. Walton tapped me on the shoulder and said he would have to ask me to refrain from my cheering; that I was embarrassing the executive party.

"I told Mr. Walton, whom I know, that I had intended no embarrassment but that I felt, and I feel now, that I had a right to cheer for A. & M. and for Mr. Moody if it was my desire. Mr. Walton replied that if I did it again he would be compelled to have me escorted from the grounds.

"Of course, when he said that I retorted that I would continue to cheer for A. & M. and Mr. Moody and he called a colonel of the governor's staff, I believe, and I was escorted out."

As Mr. Carter was being taken to the exit this dialogue followed between him and his military escort:

"Is it against the law to cheer for A. & M.?" Mr. Carter asked.

"No, Mr. Carter."

"Is it against the law to cheer for Dan Moody?"

"No, Mr. Carter."

"Then what's all the shooting about, anyway?"

Mr. Carter was vouchsafed no reply and was escorted back to the grounds with the comment, "Aw, forget it."

## APPOINTMENTS SOON

Highway Board Meeting On Monday Necessitates Naming Successors

AUSTIN, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Attorney General Dan Moody returned to Austin tonight from Washington where he argued the old Greer county, Red river boundary case before the supreme court. Former Governor James E. Ferguson also said that the governor also had not appointed successors to Frank V. Lanham and Joe Burkett on the state highway commission. Indications were that W. D. Cowan of San Saba, former commissioner of the markets and warehouse division, T. G. Ridgel of Fort Worth would be the appointees.

Eugene Smith, secretary to the highway commission, said there would be a commission meeting at the highway department Monday. At least one commissioner will have to be appointed by Monday in order that the payroll road estimate vouchers may be approved.
