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Publishers Plan Long Air Cruise

Will Leave Miami Thursday on New Flying Boat For 15,000 Mile Flight to South America

NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—(AP)—A group of publishers and aviation officials is scheduled to leave Miami tomorrow on a fifteen day, 15,000 miles flight to the West Indies and East Coast countries of South America.

The itinerary includes visits to 12 countries and colonies for the purpose of obtaining personal knowledge of commercial and social trends in South America.

The flight is to be made in the "Brazilian Clipper," new commercial flying boat which is to be christened at ceremonies in Rio de Janeiro by Senhora Getulio Vargas, wife of the president of Brazil.

In the group making the trip are these eight members and a special representative of the Associated Press:

Frank E. Gannett, chairman of the Gannett newspapers; James G. Stahlman, publisher of the Nashville Banner and president of the Southern Newspaper Publishers' Association; Roy Howard, publisher of the New York World-Tele-

Barnum, publisher of the Syracuse Post-Standard and vice president of the American Newspaper Publishers' Association; H. V. Jenkins, publisher of the Savannah Morning News and the Savannah Press; Amon G. Carter, publisher of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, and William F. Brooks, executive assistant to the general manager of the Associated Press.

Others are: Eugene Vidal, aeronautical director of the United States Department of Commerce; Edgar M. Swasey, vice president of the American Weekly; James H. Furey, vice president of United Press Association; John N. Wheeler, general manager of the North American Newspaper Alliance; M. C. Meigs, manager of the Chicago American, and officials of Pan American Airways.

Stopovers of two days each are scheduled for Rio De Janeiro and Buenos Aires before the party returns to the United States August 30.
