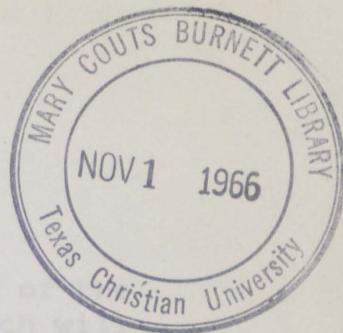
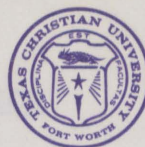
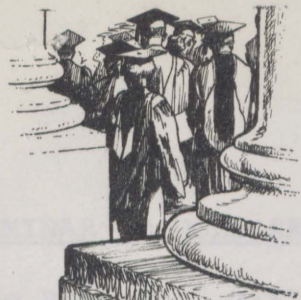

THIS WEEKEND IS FOR PARENTS

One of the most special events held on our campus each year is Parents' Weekend. For the students, this is the time when they show off "their" university to their folks. And for the parents, this is an opportunity to see the campus at a time other than the hectic days of moving into the dorms and getting settled for the semester ahead. This is the weekend when parents meet professors--take a less hurried look into the buildings and classrooms--visit the dorms--and take part in a variety of activities planned just for them.

Our distinguished guests will begin registering from 2-5 p.m. Friday. At 6 p.m. they will attend a special vespers service in the Chapel with Dr. Earl Waldrop, vice chancellor for external affairs, speaking on "The Hidden Future". At 8 p.m. Friday and Saturday evenings and at 3 p.m. on Sunday, the parents may attend a performance of the "Ballet Folklorico of Mexico".

On Saturday, registration will continue from 9 a.m. until noon. A "Chancellor's Reception" will be held in the Student Center Ballroom from 10-11:30 a.m. with Dr. Moudy and other administrators and faculty members greeting the parents. At 1 p.m. we kick off for the Baylor game. There will be dormitory open houses during the late afternoon and at 6 p.m. parents will be honored at a special banquet in the ballroom.

More than 2,000 parents attended the 1965 "weekend" coming from as far away as New York, Florida, Idaho, Mexico and California. The event is planned entirely by the students. Let's help give their parents a hearty welcome!

TCU METROPOLITAN POLICY SEMINAR TO HOLD SESSION

"Urbanization as a Man-Made Resource" will be the theme of the second session of TCU's Metropolitan Policy Seminar which will be presented on campus tomorrow from 11 a.m.- 4 p.m. in Dan Rogers Hall. Guest speakers will be Dr. Wilbur Thompson, professor of economics at Wayne State Univ., speaking on "An Urban Theory of Economic Growth", and Dr. Edward Higbee, professor of land utilization at the Univ. of Rhode Island, discussing "Interplay of Natural and Man-Made Resources in the Fort Worth Region". The seminar series of 12 sessions is being co-sponsored by TCU and The Brookings Institution of Washington, D.C. Tom Palmer, director of Evening College Courses, is coordinator of the program which is planned for faculty, students and professional persons. A second session for community leaders is set for Oct. 28 in the Texas Hotel.

BOARD CHAIRMAN AUTHORS BOOK

Lorin A. Boswell, chairman of TCU's Board of Trustees, has recently published a book titled "The Wayside School". Lorin traces the development of educational facilities in what is now the Eagle Mountain-Saginaw Independent School District. The Wayside School was established in 1898 at the urging of Lorin's grandfather, W. E. Boswell. Some 50 years later it became the Dozier School, then in 1958 it was given its present name. With the continuing increase in student enrollment, the District built a new unit in 1964--Wayside Junior High. A copy of the 165-page publication was presented recently to Mary Coutts Burnett Library. Boswell is a 1937 graduate of TCU, listed in "Who's Who in America", is chairman of the Board of Directors of Boswell Dairies, and has long been active in Fort Worth community affairs.

OCT. 31 IS DEADLINE FOR WOODROW WILSON NOMINATIONS

Next Monday is the final deadline for faculty members to nominate senior students for Woodrow Wilson Fellowships. Paul Wassenich passes on this word from Hans Rosenhaupt, WW Foundation director: "One of the assets of our selection process is its flexibility. We can look at seniors with only average grade records but who suddenly have come to life. At this time of year you may suspect that eventually they will crash through. By January, when they are interviewed, they may have developed considerable intellectual interests. The faculty members are encouraged to take calculated risks. When in doubt, nominate". Nominations should be mailed to Prof. Helmut Rehder, Dept. of Germanic Languages, Univ. of Texas, Austin, Texas 78712.

200 ATTEND ENGLISH WORKSHOP

Some 200 college, junior and senior high school teachers of English from a 16 county area met on campus Saturday for a half-day program. "Today's Dimensions in the Teaching of English" was the theme of the District V workshop which was held in the Student Center Ballroom. Eilene Rall, asst. prof. of English, was general chairman for the event; Karl Snyder was in charge of local arrangements; Troy Crenshaw gave the invocation. Dr. James Newcomer, vice-chancellor for academic affairs, welcomed the group. Planned annually by the Texas Joint English Committee for School and College, the workshop sessions covered topics on "Today's Aids, Courses, Problems and Teacher Standards".

TCU SAYS "THANK YOU" AT APPRECIATION DINNER

Monday night's Appreciation Dinner in the Hotel Texas Grand Ballroom was a very special occasion. As Chancellor Moudy remarked to the more than 275 persons attending, "An institution is made of people and TCU could not get along without the people here tonight who have volunteered their time and resources to the building of this university". Those present were trustees from TCU, Harris College of Nursing and Brite Divinity School Boards; Research Foundation directors; representatives from the Burnett Trust, Brown-Lupton, Amon Carter and other foundations; and other companies, organizations and individuals who have supported TCU.

Main speaker at the affair was Erik Jonsson, mayor of Dallas and chairman of the board at Texas Instruments. Jonsson said there were three purposes of education: 1) to preserve those things learned and known; 2) to transmit this knowledge to others; and 3) to look at the barriers that separate us from things we don't know and need to know and to break them down through education and research. Leigh Secrest reported on the progress of the Research Foundation and urged those present to study the Foundation's annual report which each received. The report was edited and designed by John Ohendalski, research editor in Public Relations. James Sowell gave the invocation and Earl Waldrop the benediction at the dinner.

It's difficult to say an adequate "thank you" to the many individuals whose efforts make the work of the university possible. This particular occasion was to express thanks to the groups mentioned above. Yet, no appreciation is complete without thanking the faculty and staff who are the heart beat of the institution. There was no way to invite some faculty and omit others to this event...but the deep and grateful thanks of a university is there, none the less.

RESEARCH FOUNDATION CAMPAIGN ANNOUNCED

TCU's major fund-raising effort in the Fort Worth area will get underway Nov. 15 in a campaign to raise \$403,000 to support the TCU Research Foundation during the coming year. Bayard Friedman, member of the Foundation's board of directors, former mayor of Fort Worth and senior vice president of Fort Worth National Bank, has been named general chairman of the drive. His campaign cabinet is composed of co-chairman Paul Mason, president of First National Bank; Jack Butler, editor Fort Worth Star-Telegram; and Marion Hicks, general counsel of General Dynamics/FW.

Most of the \$403,000 budget goal is earmarked for 24 research projects by faculty members in six departments. Funds also come from other sources and will help equip the new TCU Science Research Center and bring distinguished researchers to this area as part of the Foundation's Visiting Scientists Program.
