

Canadian Ship Halts U S Liner

Cruiser Removes 4 Homeward Bound German Aviators From President Garfield.

HONOLULU, April 30 (AP)—The Canadian auxiliary cruiser Prince Robert stopped the American President Lines vessel President Garfield on the high seas Monday, Capt. John E. Murphy of the Garfield reported by radio Wednesday, and removed four German aviators who had taken passage at San Francisco en route to their homeland via the Orient.

A terse report of the incident was given by Captain Murphy to the ship's agents here a few hours before the President Garfield put into port.

A naval party from the Prince Robert boarded the American ship, examined the passenger list and removed the four Germans, the report stated. The American ship was delayed less than an hour.

(Staff members of the British consulate at San Francisco said the Germans left the United States without contacting representatives of Great Britain. They added that the men were "not in the same classification as German invalids and men of non-military age" who previously had been accorded safe passage across the Pacific.)

Southern Coal Mines Ready

The last obstacle to reopening the Appalachian soft coal mines was removed Wednesday. Southern operators and the United Mine Workers agreed to immediate resumption of operations under temporary wage increases of \$1 a day.

Northern mines, meanwhile, were reported to be operating on a 50 per cent output basis, with full operation expected in a day or so. They were opened ahead of the Southern pits because the Northern operators and the CIO union had agreed earlier on a two-year contract calling for basic wage increases from \$6 to \$7 a day.

The House Rules Committee gave legislative right-of-way to a bill by Representative Vinson of Georgia requiring a 25-day cooling-off period before strikes could begin in defense industries.

The legislation also would freeze existing open and closed shop arrangements in defense industries, and is designed to prevent work stoppages in the defense effort.
