

Trustees Will Consider Three Resignations Today

TCU will pass another milestone of its history today when the official resignation of three well-known and popular campus figures, Mrs. Bertie H. Mothershead, Prof. S. P. Ziegler and L. L. Dees are considered at the spring meeting of the Board of Trustees.

Mrs. Mothershead became assistant librarian in 1923 when the library was situated in the Administration Building. She assumed additional duties as acting librarian in 1933 and in 1938 was elevated to the post of head librarian.

She is the sister of Dr. Colby D. Hall, dean emeritus of Brite College of the Bible. Her niece, Miss Rita May Hall, is an assistant professor of French and Spanish.

Mrs. Mothershead, in a way, regretted the growth of the student body, for during recent years she has not been able to know each student personally.

"She derives her greatest pleasure in knowing people, and in helping them," Miss Hall said. "Her capacity for friendship is an art."

Active in the Woman's Club, Mrs. Mothershead has given invaluable service to numerous women who needed help in writing papers for their own clubs over a period of years.

"Since she enjoys people more than anything else, she will probably spend more of her time now in visiting with old friends. And her friends are too numerous to count," Miss Hall said.

Ziegler, musician as well as artist, is expected to continue to serve students here through occasional sessions given under an honorarium. His current one-man show in the TCU Gallery upholds the opinion held by his students, past and present, that he is one of the best artists in Texas—and in the United States.

Partial retirement will enable Professor Ziegler to devote more of his time to a series of interpretations of the works of Edgar Allen Poe, which he has been developing for several decades.

Mr. Dees has been the superintendent of buildings for 33 years, commencing his tenure here in 1920 when the campus consisted of Jarvis, Goode and Clark Halls, Brite College and the Administration Building.

Dees saw the ground-breaking of the Gymnasium and assisted in the erection of Clark Stadium, TCU's first.

The inveterate domino player still attends daily sessions with his helpers, and insists he will remain at TCU in the capacity of chief engineer, the job he will undertake Sept. 1, "as long as I'm able." Prof. L. W. Ramsey will succeed him.

Impressed with the University's growth since he first came here, Mr. Dees wants to be around to see the completion of the Student Union Building. It would be nice, too, he said, "to see a new field house and the law school back."

President M. E. Sadler said this week the primary purpose of the spring meeting is to give the board members an "over-all, total view of the University," as to enrollment, the teacher situation and anything else pertaining to the welfare of the institution.

Two new members, elected at the fall meeting, will attend for the first time. They are Mrs. Robert Windfohr and H. B. Fuqua, both of Fort Worth. Mr. Fuqua was elected as a replacement for the late R. E. Harding.

The meetings are invariably well attended," Dr. Sadler commented. "As many as 30 out of 32 members come here, some of them from distant points, Amarillo, Lubbock, Abilene, and Marfa."

Mrs. Gallamore To Be Dietitian After April 1

Mrs. Artie Gallamore, director of seven cafeterias in the Snyder public school system, will become dietitian here about April 1, Dr. Thomas F. Richardson, chairman of the Cafeteria committee, announced.

In almost 20 years of cafeteria work Mrs. Gallamore has supervised army, commercial and public school cafeterias.

"She has been trained to handle a job like ours," said Dr. Richardson. "The committee is very well pleased with her."

She replaces Miss Melbagene Tull, who resigned as cafeteria manager Feb. 1 to assume duties as a dietitian at TSCW in Denton.

New officers will be elected. Heading a full agenda will be the consideration and adoption of the yearly budget.

Ten or 15 teachers will be given various advancement in rank, and eight or 10 others will be placed on permanent tenure.

The board will pass on the names nominated by the Deans' Council for honorary degree awards, to be presented May 31.

President Sadler personally will give the board a complete analysis of enrollment which, he said, shows a slight upswing from last year's slump.

Robinson, director of the commission on religious organizations of the National Conference of Christians and Jews.

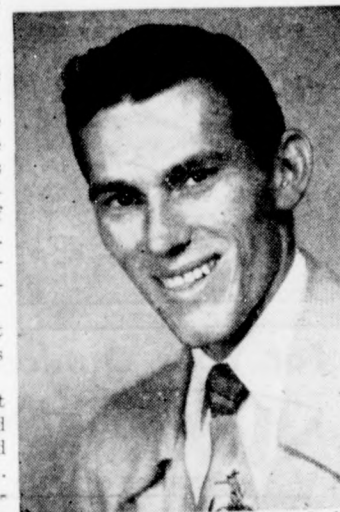

Tomorrow's program will be on "The Role of the Educator in Overcoming Prejudice" and will start at 9 a.m.

Dr. Nielsen, dean of the School of Education, will serve as a member of the Standards and Classifications Committee.

"Counseling: A Means of Reducing Academic Failure," is the sec-

tion in which Dr. Richardson, dean of students, will participate.

Dr. McCorkle, dean of the School of Fine Arts, will be a member of a discussion group on "Ways and Means of Interesting Texas High School Graduates in Higher Education."

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Cast Presents Competent Performance Of Young's Symbolic 'Stampede Bluff'

The current premiere production in the Little Theater of "Stampede Bluff" is enjoyable because of its overall competent cast, an imaginative replica of a Texas scene and a few moments of believable drama from the pen of a Dallas playwright-minister, John W. Young.

Mr. Young is concerned with symbolic overtones arising from the death plunge of a herd of stampeding cattle over the edge of an isolated, West Texas bluff.

Whether this is history or legend, it becomes highly applicable to the dramatic situation of the play, which reveals in metaphorical terms the parallelism of the stampeding herd and the equally frantic progression of humanity.

Such an original and inspiring theme is well worth stating, but Mr. Young's preoccupation with an omnifarious and sometimes homiletical reiteration of it subordinates some of his characters and places the play on unstable ground as durable stage literature.

Director Walther R. Volbach and his players have done an admirable job of transferring "Stampede" from its mimeographed script to the stage. They achieve some moments of tense drama that carries with it a strong impact and leaves an indelible mark upon the audience.

On the negative side, however, the theme definitely has received more than its share of the playwright's attention. Most of the characters consciously have symbolic meaning, and the symbolism often is in dire need of a more subtle touch.

In "Stampede," structural shortcomings inherent in the faulty motivation and general treatment of four main characters, Chuck, Lily, Jody and Uncle Joe, make them little more than illustrations for the theme. Mr. Young has lost sight of these people as individuals. They derive from the theme, and

it should be the other way around.

Reading the script after seeing the play is to realize how much size Bob Floyd (Church), Martha Reppetoe (Lily) and Ronald Dieb (Jody) have brought to the roles out of their own capabilities as dramatic performers.

The most believable character Mr. Young has created is Cynthia, who, as character portraiture, has artistic merits which should be reckoned with here.

The behavior of Cynthia, who seeks a closeness to nature, is similar to that of Teresa in "The Cradle Song." It would be difficult to determine whether it is the writing of Mr. Young or the performance of Joyce Rogers that makes Cynthia such a brilliant characterization. Probably it is the harmonic

nious combination of both. She gives to her present role the same magnetic intensity that made Teresa a character of strength and vitality.

Windy, free from the awkward symbolism that lessens the effectiveness of some of the other principals, receives a satisfying and inoffensive treatment from Sylvia Bokor. David Combs does a respectable job as Barney.

Uncle Joe, played with more submission than nobility by Lin Lattimer, is seriocomic in his preachy tirades against the onrush of civilization. His dislike for the business of progress resembles that of Natty Bumppo in Cooper's "Leatherstocking" series.

The production will be repeated at 8 p.m. today and tomorrow.—E. A.

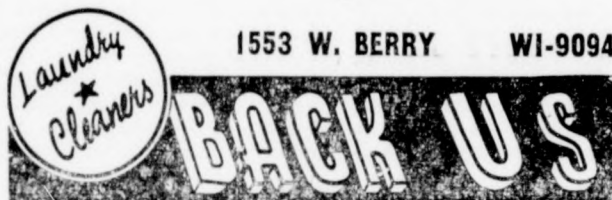

And more than half of the \$1300 has been borrowed by students still on the campus.

Don Brewer's committee has recommended to President M. E. Sadler that the University refuse degrees and transcripts to those who owe the fund. As yet no decision has been reached, but this seems like a reasonable proposal since even a parking fine can prevent one from getting a transcript.

But there is time, before either congress or the Administration acts, for students to make good, to make unnecessary administrative interference with student affairs and to preserve a service which we can all use. Let's show 'em we can do it!

Aim of Combatting Bigotry

The patterns for many of our prejudices are shaped early in life. Much of the bigotry existing today has grown from seeds sown in childhood.

Recognizing this early training for bigotry, TCU and other schools are trying to combat such circumstances. The Institute of Human Relations to be held here today and tomorrow, is one step toward the elimination of racial and religious prejudices.

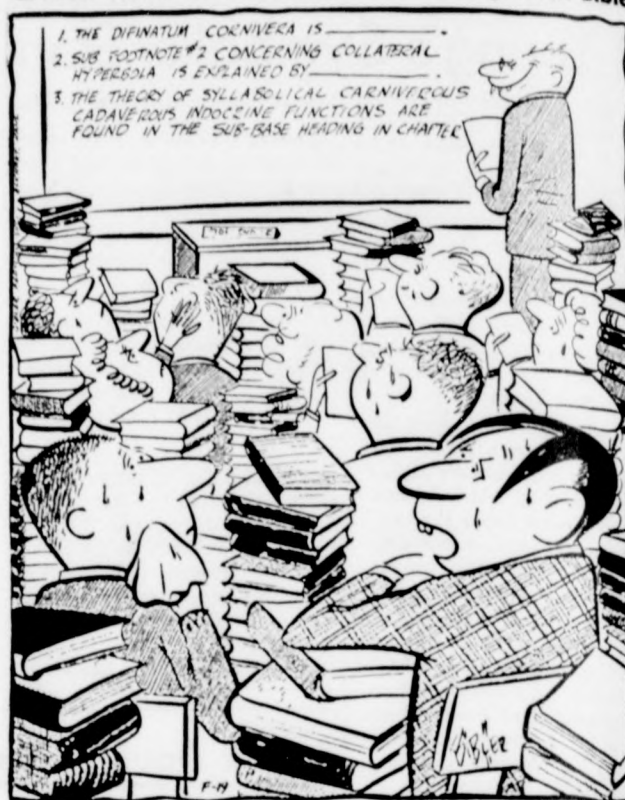
Sponsored by TCU, the National Conference of Christians and Jews and the Hogg Foundation, the institute has as its purpose—the spreading of good will, understanding and appreciation. Its primary goal is to educate leaders, and through them to educate unbiased future citizens of this country.

The institute, started in the fall of 1952, is designed to reach leaders in specific areas and to promote human understanding among them. It is differentiated from Brotherhood Week in that it seeks to reach leaders, not the masses.

TCU has recognized the importance of "good human relations" in bringing this institute to the campus. If we can recognize the significance of understanding between all peoples, then bigotry and prejudices are closer to being eliminated.

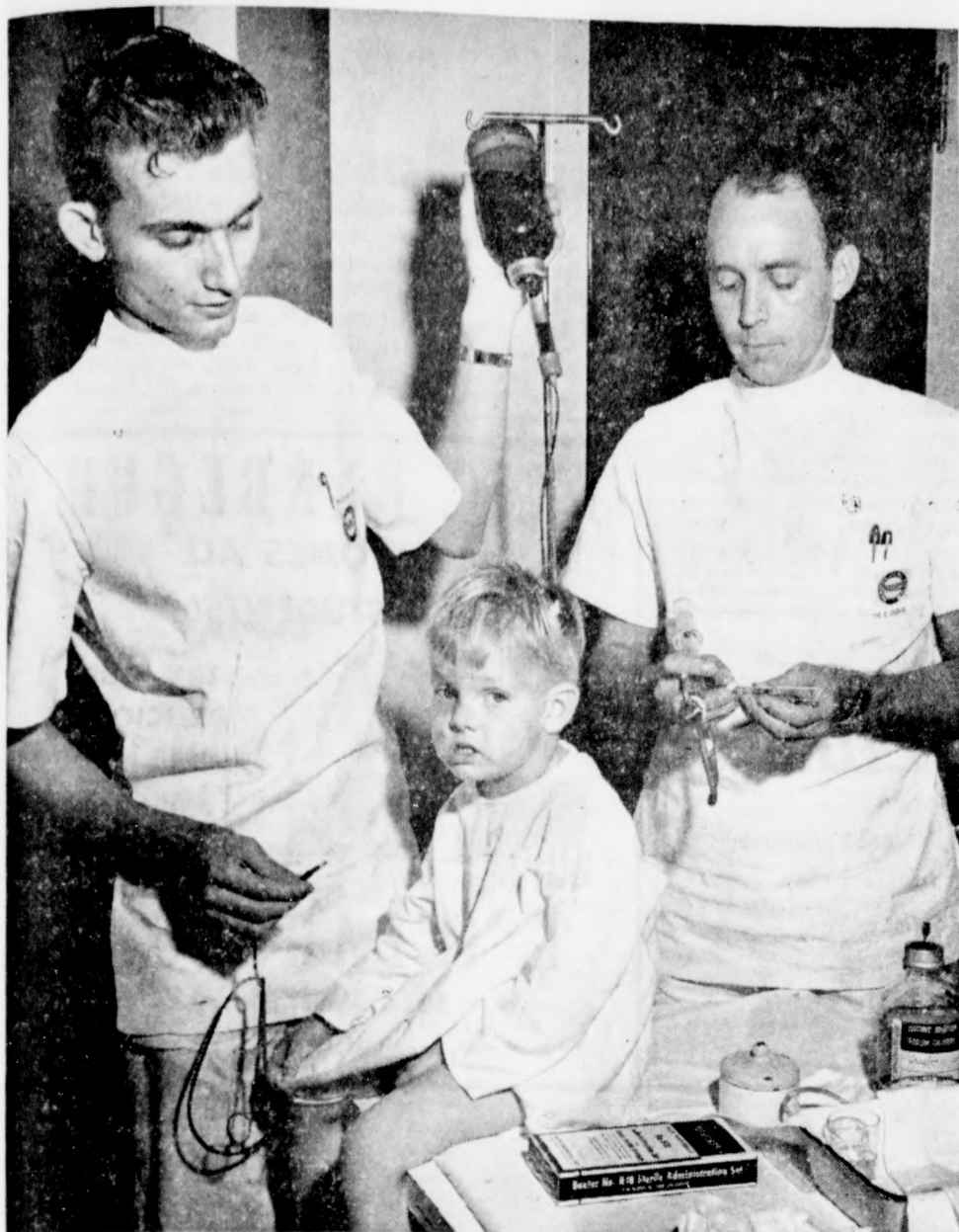
She will represent the Texas Chapter of Mica at the National Independents Convention in April at Purdue University, and she also will be entered in the National Sweetheart Race.

A May fete on the Rice Institute campus, a formal ball and luncheons honoring visiting university delegates are among the activities planned.



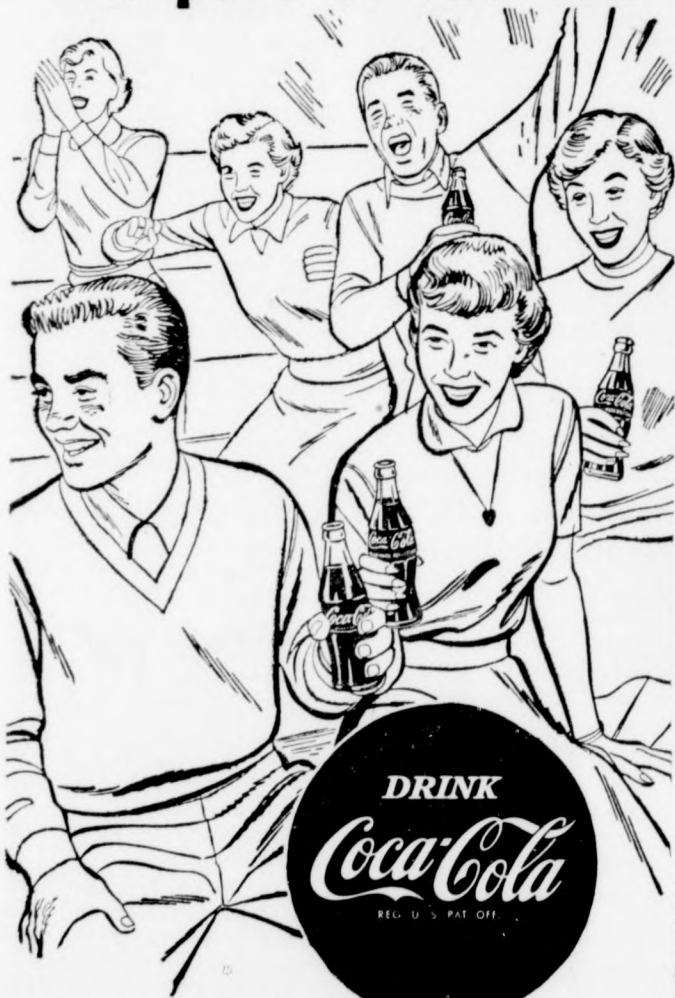
FROGGIES A LA MUD

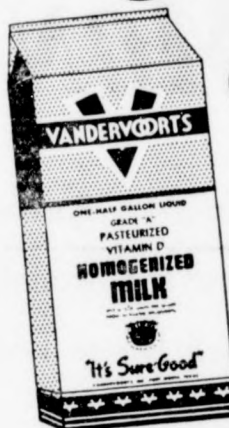
