\$150,000 IS GIVEN T.C.U.

Many Pledges Made On the Endowment

Christian Churches of Texas pledged more than \$150,000 on debt of T. C. U. last Friday night at a meeting of church representatives in San Antonio. According to President Edwin M. Waits, this was one of the most significant gatherings in the history of Texas, and marks the beginning of a new era for the university.

Sam J. McFarland of Dallas was chosen to head the campaign to liquidate the \$300,000 indebtedness, the raising of the endowment to a half million dollars, and the enlisting of every church member of the State to pay \$1 per year to the maintenance of the school.

Fiftieth Anniversary.

It was pointed out that this is the most telling year yet faced by T. C. U., and it was urged that the people of the church throughout the State be enlisted for the making of this, the fiftieth year, the turning point in the building of the largest school in the brotherhood. Those present, all leaders of church and financial circles in Texas, pledged not alone the \$150,000 cash for the indebtedness, but the addition of several thousands to the endowment, and the further pledge to go in person to any part of the State on business for the school.

The institution was declared to be the child of the church, and "as the charge of the business men of the church," by speakers. Van Zandt Jarvis of Fort Worth pledged the securing of \$50,000; Ross Sterling of Houston confirmed his pledge of \$100,000 toward the endowment; Dave Reed of Austin gave \$25,000 toward the cleanup, and enough further toward the endowment to make his gift \$100,000, he having given \$33,000 already; Malcolm Reed of Austin gave \$25,000 cash; Harry Rogers of San Antonio gave \$25,000 cash and pledged to do more for the endowment; Mike Thomas of Dallas had pledged \$10,000 cash, but added that he would make it \$25,000.

Texas Christian University is planning to celebrate its golden jubilee with a great home coming in June, 1922. Dan Rogers of Dallas is heading the Ex-Students' Association in a publicity campaign among former students, and every effort is being made to round up the greatest gathering of Texas Disciples in the history of the church. The Texas Christian convention will meet in Fort Worth during the time of the jubilee, and with the usual commencement program it will mark the largest gathering of a religious body ever held in the State, it is believed.

Those who attended the meeting were Van Zandt Jarvis and President E. M. Waits of Fort Worth; Sam McFarland of Dallas; Dave Reed and Malcolm Reed of Austin; Ross Sterling of Houston and Harry Rogers of San Antonio.

HORNEFROGS AND COWBOYS BATTLE TO TIE AT WICHITA

Captain Judge Green's Texas Christian university Horned Frogs and Captain Barfield's Simmons Cowboys attacked each other from every angle at Wichita Falls Saturday afternoon in a bitter contest which ended in a 7-7 tie before a thousand North Texas football fans assembled to see the first T. I. A. A. game played by either of the teams this season. Demanding admiration for their swift get-away and Adams' touchdown in the first few minutes of play, Mr. McKnight's purple warriors were strong favorites throughout the first half until a touchdown by Simmons in the third quarter advantaged Wichita sport fans a popular exhibition of the keen sport rivalry spirit toward Fort Worth.

Carson kicked over the Simmons' goal line to open the game. The two teams then kicked back and forth three times and T. C. U. made her four first downs during the game. Honey plunged eight yards through left tackle. T. C. U. was penalized five yards for offside, angering Homer Adams, who grabbed the next ball and covered forty-five yards through a broken field for the Christians' only touchdown. Cantrell kicked a field goal.

With Yeager making first down after Cantrell's kick-off to Cowboys were becoming formidable when they fumbled, recovered and were set back by Green's tackling, supported by strong Frog defense. Simmons then tried their Yeager-Barfield pass which was unsuccessful. Johnson and Carson exchanged boots, leaving the ball in Cowboy possession on the Frog forty-yard line at the end of the first quarter.

It was the third quarter that the Frogs were forced to defense. Frogs kicked; the Cowboys bucked and kicked. Carson's pass was interrupted by Johnny Camp. Yeager kicked and Cherry returned to his twenty-yard line. Adams made five yards. Frogs fumbled and Kim

We will discriminate neither for great nor small, the selfish peddler nor the magnificent concern without a conscience. It is the height of foolishness for a self-respecting store in Fort Worth to flatly refuse to buy an ad in the Skiff, which has a make-up that would do credit to any small daily, and in direct contradiction to the spirit thus manifested turn around and send to the men of T. C. U. cards which upon presentation represent a discount of five per cent. Ye gods and little fishes; the world is becoming sublime. It did us good to see those yellow cards go into the wastebasket where they belonged. The Skiff carries messages from merchants who are not afraid to have their quotations spread out in the open on a newspaper. We are glad to see our advertisers write personal letters to our men, but the personal letter without the Skiff should be an impossibility.

We are acquainted with our advertisers and will be responsible for the manner in which our readers are treated when they patronize them. We are not asking the student body to do anything for the sake of the Skiff. It is not necessary for us to run a half page ad asking ourselves in T. C. U. to buy suits, dresses and shoes from our friends. It might be so, were we living the lives of hermits, but not so with a gang that can put more rosters in Gardner Park when we play Dallas University than the home team can put there herself. All that we have to know is wherein our friendships lie, and these friendships are with those merchants who appeal through the legitimate press, the most legitimate on this hill, being the Skiff, the Horned Frog's most vital organ, which in this case happens to be halfway between his heart and his liver. Every throb of the heart reaches 2,500 readers, the majority of whom trade in Fort Worth.

T. C. U. students have a policy of returning good for good, and we mean to see that merchants not advertising in the Skiff shall hold the sack. Every one of our subscribers is sensible enough to know when he laid his dollar down for a year's reading he did not pay the cost of the paper. Up to the present moment there isn't one out of two thousand who doesn't like to read the Skiff. The editorial staff gathers the news and keeps up the spirit of every organization deserving the support of an honest sheet. 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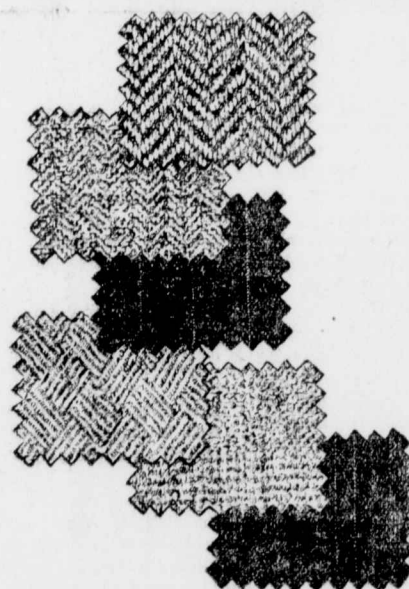

"Word mongers" and "chattering barbers," Gilbert called those of his predecessors who asserted that a wound made by a magnetized needle was painless, that a magnet will attract silver, that the diamond will draw iron, that the magnet thirsts and dies in the absence of iron, that a magnet, pulverized and taken with sweetened water, will cure headaches and prevent fat.

Before Gilbert died in 1603, he had done much to explain magnetism and electricity through experiment. He found that by hammering iron held in a magnetic meridian it can be magnetized. He discovered that the compass needle is controlled by the earth's magnetism and that one magnet can remagnetize another that has lost its power. He noted the common electrical attraction of rubbed bodies, among them diamonds, as well as glass, crystals, and stones, and was the first to study electricity as a distinct force.

"Not in books, but in things themselves, look for knowledge," he shouted. This man helped to revolutionize methods of thinking—helped to make electricity what it has become. His fellow men were little concerned with him and his experiments. "Will Queen Elizabeth marry—and whom?" they were asking.

Elizabeth's flirtations mean little to us. Gilbert's method means much. It is the method that has made modern electricity what it has become, the method which enabled the Research Laboratories of the General Electric Company to discover new electrical principles now applied in transmitting power for hundreds of miles, in lighting homes electrically, in aiding physicians with the X-rays, in freeing civilization from drudgery.

Frogs-Hill Bills at Ball Park Saturday

Next Saturday, when our eleven faces the Daniel Baker Hill Billies on the gridiron, they will be in the best condition that they have achieved yet this year. They will have to be to put a victory over the boys from Brownwood, who are coming here full of determination and confidence.

Coach McKnight says that the Horned Frogs were not in as good shape against Simmons as they should have been. He realizes that the intense heat and the sandy dust encountered at Wichita Falls had much to do with the apparent lack of condition, but he still says the condition can be improved, and he promises that this week will be devoted to hard work in an effort to get that end.

McKnight says he had rather have a team slightly under condition than one slightly over condition, so care will be exercised that the men are not over trained.

Scrimmage will be on the program three or four afternoons of the week. The backfield must be taught not to fumble, and the line must be taught to charge better. The lack of charge in the line is the coach's greatest worry right now. He and Captain Green are going to do their best to work out this difficulty during this week. It simply must be done. A chain is no stronger than its weakest link, as the saying goes, and the line has proved weak on its offense. With Coach McKnight on the job and Judge Green assisting him, both by word and by example, we may rest assured that our line will charge better or we will have another line.

McKnight announces that there are liable to be several changes in the lineup before next Saturday, but refuses as yet to tell us what we may expect. Some of these changes are due to injuries received by some of the men in the game with Simmons, others are due to other causes. Whatever these changes are to be, they will be for the best interest of the team, and next Saturday, when the Horned Frogs take the field against Daniel Baker, we may expect a stronger and a better and a harder-working team than we have had the privilege of watching yet.

With more fight in our men, and with the natural ability already displayed, we may feel perfectly secure in expecting one of the best seasons in Horned Frog history, although we are tackling one of the hardest schedules of any team in the State.

Bill Honey is coming around into top form with his passing, and Homer Adams is improving in step with Honey. The backfield is running hard and low, and with a line which will charge, should prove to be a terror at the line-bucking game. The backs are also fast enough to make good end-runners, the only weak point being in the interference running. This is another point to be stressed in the work of this week.

Carson is improving in his kicking, his shortest against Simmons being 45 yards, but he needs a little speeding-up in the process. Carson is finding an able rival for kicking honors in Dick Fender.

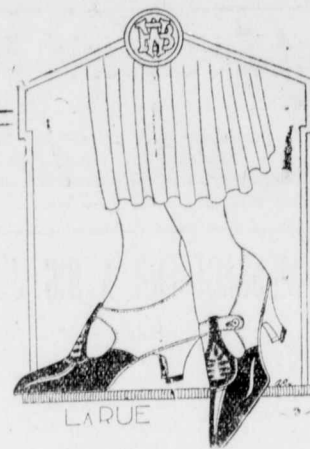
51-0 SCORE MAKES S. M. U. LOOK STRONG
